The N. S. Dept. already has received a large correspondence from farmers now keeping sheep and planning to increase their flocks as well as from farmers who intend to actablish new flocks.

This all me ans that Nova Scotia farmers are realizing the manetary advantage of increasing their sheep holdings as well as its usefulness from the patriotic standpoint.

This branch of stock raising cannot be overdone. In 1871 there were 389,000 sheep in Nova Scotia, now they are probably less than 250,000 with a larger farming area.
