Kentville News.

Mr. W. C. Bill drove into Kentville on Tuesday last. This is the first time he has been here for a long time.

T. R. Harris, of Aylesford, and Capt. Mall, of the Wilcox Spa Springs, came to Kentville and took a trip over the C. V. R. to witness the launching of the Canada. One of them sought shelter in a cellar at Kingsport during the thunder storm.

Rev. T. F. Draper, of Lunenburg, is spending part of his vacation in Kentville.

Rev. J. Hogg, wife and family, have been visiting the relations of Mrs. Hogg, in Kentville and Port Williams during the past week.

Mr. Wood, who was appointed postmaster at this place over three months ago, and subsequently gave up his position on account of ill health, was taken away to Halifax in a postal car on Tuesday. Mr. Wood has been closely confined at the Lyons Hotel since his sickness, and when he left town he was in a critical condition. Mrs. Wood was present and her countenance betrayed deep anxiety. It is to be hoped that more favorable reports of his condition will soon reach here.

A number from Halifax and other places along the line could not get back in the C. V. R. trains early enough to take the express for Halifax and so remained in town all night.

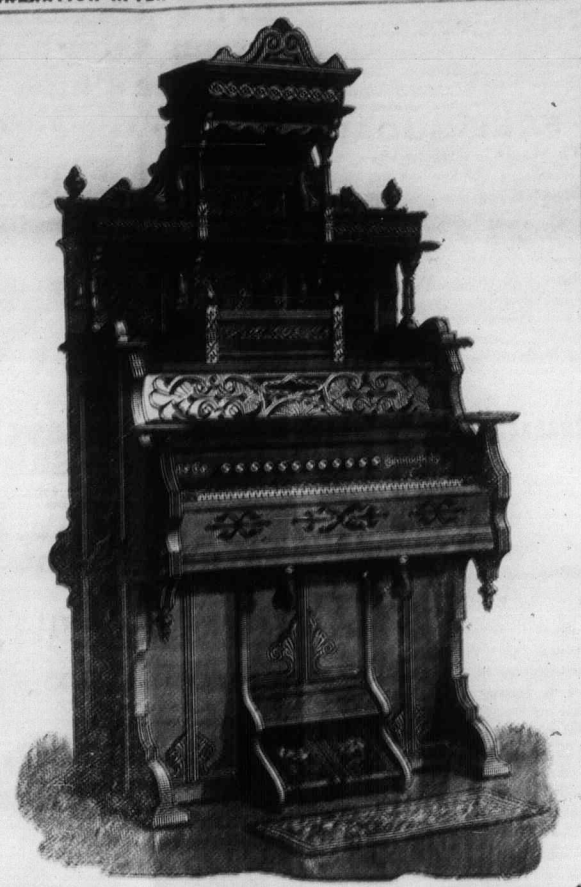
