A STRANGE SCENE.

A Landlord with his double-barrelled gun.

The Freeman's Journal says: To day (June 24,) a most exciting scene, which it was feared at one time would end badly, took place at Burncarroll Chapel, near Claremorris. Shortly before mass Mr Walter Bourke entered the chapel armed with a double barrelled gun, which was partly concealed by the corner of his rug. The congregation immediately became fearfully excited. Before taking action, however, a deputation of the principal inhabitants of the neighborhood waited on Canon Bourke, who had come from Claremorris to celebrate mass, and demanded that Mr Bourke should be asked to leave his gun outside during the mass. This, it appeared, Mr Bourke refused to do, and for a while it seemed that a terrible encounter was inevitable. Every effort was made by Canon Bourke to pacify the congregation and induce them to allow the mass to be celebrated, but to no purpose. The people, enraged at Mr Bourke's refusal to remove the gun, insisted that he should be put out himself. After a long parley Canon Bourke finally prevailed upon Mr Bourke to retire to the sacristy, which he did through the sanctuary, carrying his gun under his arm, followed by the other members of his family and his servants. But this did not settle matters. The congregation would not allow Mr Bourke to retain his gun even in the sacristy. Canon Bourke refused to remove him from the place. With that every single man, woman and child left the chapel, carrying with them in the rush both the Canon himself and his clerk. The proceeding now assumed a most serious aspect, but in the end quiet was restored by Mr Bourke and his family and servants leaving the sacristy and going home. The people then returned to the church and mass was celebrated. A large force of police attended in the chapel yard, but did not interfere.

ANOTHER SIDE TO THE STORY
AND SUCH A SIDE!

About a fortnight ago, the steam dredge "St. Lawrence," employed on the Horseshoe bar at the mouth of the Miramichi, came up to Newcastle to have her machinery repaired. It so happened that while the machinery was undergoing repairs, something that had happened in the case of the "St. Lawrence" a score of times before, as it has happened, and will happen in the case of every vessel doing heavy work, like dredging,—the election at Pictou came off. Five or six of the crew of the Dredge it appears, had votes in Pictou, and while their vessel was lying up, and as they had nothing else to do, they took the train for Pictou, where they arrived on polling day and deposited their votes. On the way down they were joined by seven or eight non-resident voters, who had been living in Boston and other New England towns for years, on their way to vote for Mr. Carmichael, the Grit candidate. It appears the non-residents from Boston, &c., were on a "good time," were drinking brandy and champagne, and in their hilarity informed the crew of the "St. Lawrence" that they had "plenty of money," that it was sent to them from "Carmichael's backers" in Pictou, to come over and vote for Carmichael. They offered champagne to the dredge men, told them to make merry, not knowing who they were, that Carmichael's backers were "paying for it." The dredge men pretended to drink at each round, but the aliens from the States drank in right earnest; and when they got pretty boozed began to wander all through the train. Three of them got away on a car to themselves, and two of the dredge men followed them with another bottle of champagne. As "Carmichael's backers" were "paying for it," they finished this bottle too, and then keeled over on the seats, gloriously drunk. Meanwhile the train reached the station at which they were to take the line for Pictou; the dredge men left the cars quietly, and the three aliens slept the sleep of the just, and were whisked away off to Halifax where they arrived safe and sound,—just about the time they should have been in Pictou voting. They created a great row at the Halifax station,—and wanted to be brought to Pictou. A police man got one of them, and the other two went off and spent all they had left of the Grit "purity" money. Had it been in the good old days of Brydges, an express and palace car would have been placed at the disposal of the three voters.

But to the dredge: if the truth of the story be, and no one can contradict it, that the dredge was laid up for repairs, that the repairs were not quite completed when the crew arrived back from Pictou, that no time was lost by the absence of the crew, then it can be seen how really little the whipped Grits have to talk about.

And suppose the story is not true: suppose the dredge was put up to give the men an opportunity of going to Pictou, and that the repairs were only a cloak: what are they going to do about it? Would not the pure and high minded Grits, who sent money over to aliens in Boston, out of their "purification" fund, to come over to Pictou and vote for Carmichael not have done the same had it been in their power? Would not the men who gave \$50,000 for a hotel built out of slabs for an election fund, who bought the same piece of land nine or ten times over from the same man, paying him every time, not have "laid up" the dredge had she been in their hands? The offence is not that the dredge was laid up to let the Pictou men go vote, if we could but see the inwardness of those men who talk, but that she was not in the hands of the Grits to "lay her up for repairs."

The whole thing was excellently done; it was managed first rate. It teaches both parties a lesson worth remembering. It teaches our party in Northumberland the lesson of watchfulness, of being alive in every possible legitimate way to the interests of their cause; and it teaches the opposition that in their future battles the enemy they must meet is a popular cause, backed up by a watchful, vigorous and united organization.

A CLAIM FOR ANOTHER REPRESENTATIVE.

It seems to be generally conceded that the result of the census just completed will give our Province an additional representative in the Dominion parliament. According to the British North America Act, the representation is to be adjusted every ten years, the population and representation of Quebec being the basis on which the representation is made up. Our Province gained a member in 1871, which was given to St. John City and County. If we are to have another member, as the result of the census of 1881, then we claim that such member should, in fair play, be given to the North. We perceive that already, the southern counties, notably Westmorland and York, are putting in a claim, but we do not consider that they have any right to the additional representation. They have already a fair share; while considering the extent and resources of the North, it assuredly, is in justice entitled to the new member. The Southern counties have now ten out of the sixteen members, and nearly all the senators. They should be satisfied with this, and not expect more. The only claim they can make is on the score of population, but such a claim is not tenable. Electoral districts are not divided according to population but according to extent, interests &c., and any one looking at and comparing the population of the different electoral districts, will see that a claim based on population is simply ridiculous.

The four northern counties comprise nearly one half the Province. They are all on the sea board, and have many and varied interests. The inhabitants are engaged in farming, fishing, lumbering, etc. They are shipbuilders and ship owners, and are also manufacturers. All these interests demand that the new member should be given to them.

And if given to the North, there can be no question as to the right of Northumberland to the seat. It is the largest county in the Province. It is the most populous of the northern counties, and its population is rapidly increasing. It is after St. John the most important county in New Brunswick. The trade on the Miramichi River is very large, second only to St. John in this Province, and as regards shipping it stands fifth in the Dominion, following after Quebec, Montreal, St. John and Halifax. It is easily divided, the river forming a natural dividing line. We trust then that in 1883 Northumberland will send two members to Ottawa, one from the North riding and one from the South. We expect the Government to give due consideration to our claims, and as in 1871 they gave the new member to the most important of the southern counties, that in 1881 they will give the seat to the most important of the northern counties.

SIR JOHN MACDONALD.

Sir John Macdonald has had an interview with Cardinal Manning on the subject of Irish emigration to Canada. His eminence seemed to agree with the views, and share in the hopes of the Premier, with regard to the future of Irish immigrants in the North West. Now as when Sir John was last in England, he finds himself thwarted in his schemes for the welfare of Canada by no one save his political opponents in this country. He reads in home papers every day, disparaging accounts of Canada furnished by loyal followers of Mr. Blake. The North West is described as having passed into the hands of a huge monopoly, and as now lying in chains. When Sir John speaks of our unlimited prairies, and their fertile soils, he is answered by an agent putting a glowing account of Kansas by the patriotic Mr. Blake into his hands!

Sir John will leave for home probably in the *Parisian* on the 21st of next month, and will remain in Riviere du Loup till the end of August.

It is said Sir John may return a peer, and it is likewise spoken as not unlikely that the fall of the leaves will not see the Marquis of Lorne with us but that our Chief Governor shall be Sir John A. Macdonald. Unlike other things have happened, and it is the surmise correct, never has high office been more worthily filled. This last, and highest attainable honor in his own country, would form a fitting crown to the brilliant career of a statesman who stands head and shoulders above any other this country has yet developed. Indeed in him we see the Tennysonian picture of the man—

—Who makes by force his merit known,
And moving up from high to higher,
Becomes on Fortune's crowning slopes

ANOTHER TIEBORNE "CLAIMANT."

A Tieborne claimant has turned up in San Diego, according to a San Francisco despatch. The claimant called on Gen. Barnes for information as to how he could obtain documentary evidence to show that he never was in Rio Janeiro; and was never wrecked and picked up by the "Opsey," as stated by Arthur Orton. Gen. Barnes subjected the visitor to a rigid examination, in which he told straight a story, including many points in which Orton failed, and others which did not come out in the trial, and exhibited physically such identity with the lost heir, that General Barnes reluctantly arrived at the conclusion that he is either Tieborne or an adroit swindler. The Duke of Sutherland and Dr. Russell had an interview with the man, and a full statement was mailed to England. Tieborne has been a great portion of his time in the United States, served through the war, married in Brooklyn, and says his silence is the result of a determination to remain *incognito* for a number of years, which have now elapsed, and this determination was brought about by chagrin at the opposition to his marriage with a cousin. The question of being able to establish his identity does not seem to give him the slightest concern.

COMING TO AMERICA.

Father O'Connor, the priest known in connection with the part taken in advocating the interests of the Harencce tenantry, has arrived in Cork en route to America. Two priests and Slack, vice president of the Land League of Listerwell, accompany him. The object of their visit is to raise funds to meet the heavy expenses incurred by the Harencce tenantry in unsuccessful efforts to purchase their farms. They propose to lecture through the United States to the

land question. Father O'Connor has a letter from Archbishop Croke commissioning him to proclaim everywhere in America what Irishmen want, and to tell the Americans that the Irish people are determined to carry on the present constitutional agitation.

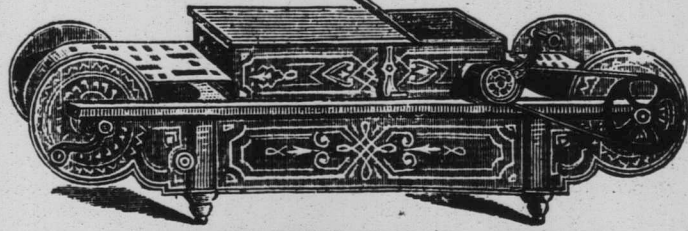
