

ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:

1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or arned \$1,000 or more.

2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or

3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A. CORPORATIONS and joint

stock companies must use Form

Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in nation required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction; to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.
