By Justice Gorell Barnes, speaking before order in Council passed in May the minister advanced the salaries of 174 temporary, or outside employes by an aggregate sum of \$202,404 a year. Then on August 6 b, 8 were appointed at salaries aggregating \$7,350, but dating back to April, 1908, and given 56 special increases totalling \$4,300. On August 31st. the very day before the new classification went into effect increases amounting to \$7,150 were given to 60 officials. In all, the minister had thus suddenly added \$24,500 in increased salaries to the chosen ones of his outside force, the additions running from \$50 to \$350 per man. It was taking the 174 who could get the ear of the minister or his deputy and advancing them over all the others not so fortunate in respect to influence. Neither was it fair to those ministers who had taken the correct ground that there should be no special increases in advance of the reclassification.
