### Teach Children To Be Neat and Orderly

Mothers are often heard to say, "My children have such untidy habits, and I don't seem to be able to break them off. I talk all day long, but it doesn't do any good."  
No mother needs to endure her children's untidy habits, or any other undesirable habits, if she goes about training them in the right way, and is willing to take a little trouble to carry it out.  
Four simple rules, based on psychology, may serve to give such mothers an insight into the means of forming right habits. If carried out faithfully these rules cannot fail to produce results.  
First, decide to yourself what habit you wish to form. Then start enthusiastically and determinedly to break the old and launch the new one. Say to your children, "Beginning today we are all going to hang up our wraps, and put our books and rubbers in the proper places when we come home from school. Let us see who remembers every time, and doesn't have to have mother tell her once about it. Arouse as much enthusiasm as you can about the matter. Be careful that you do not start break and form anew too many habits at one time. Select one or two habits to work on, and keep at them persistently until you are reasonably sure that they are well fixed.  
Second, permit no exceptions to occur after you have once started. No matter how good the intentions of the children are, they will lapse into the old ways after a few days. That is when you will have to work. You will find that eternal vigilance on your part will be the price of your children's good habits. When Mary comes home in a hurry to get out to play she will throw her books on the nearest chair. Don't say, "Oh, well, she is little, and it is hard to remember all the time. I'll let it go this time." That is where you will fail. Even though Mary has already gone away to play, she should be called back immediately and told in a kind manner, "You forgot your books today. Put them away and then you may go to play." One or two experiences of that kind will soon make Mary more careful.  
Third, repeat the desirable action as often as possible. We all know that the habit is most firmly fixed which we have been practicing longest. Seize every occasion to perform the act which you wish to become a habit, and its acquisition will come all the sooner.  
Last of all, don't talk. Don't preach too much or abound in good talk in the abstract. When Mary throws her coat on the floor and her rubbers in the middle of the hall, don't tell her that nice little girls don't do these things, or that she is a careless girl and should know better, and a great deal more to that effect. Simply call her as soon as you discover what she has done, and tell her quietly and good naturedly to put her things away immediately, and then see that she does it. Such treatment as this is far more effective than mere talking.

### Canadian-West Land Regulations

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age who was at the commencement of the present war, and who has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta, provided that he is a person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties—six months residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years.  
In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as an addition. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Reside six months in each of three years after earning homesteaded land and cultivate 50 extra acres. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.  
A better offer than homesteaded land, if it cannot secure a pre-emption, may be a quarter-section homesteaded in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and a house worth \$300.00.  
When Dominion Lands are "deeded" or posted for entry, return of soldiers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive one day priority in applying for entry at local Agents' Offices (not at Sub-Agency). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent.  
Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm laborers in Canada during 1917, as residence in Canada during 1918, as residence in Canada during certain conditions.

#### Rules Relating to Private Bills.

36 All petitions for Private Bills must be presented within fourteen days after the commencement of the session exclusive of adjournment.

37 No Private Bill shall be brought into the House, but upon a petition first presented, truly stating the case at the peril of the suitors for such Bill, and such petition must be signed by the said parties.

38 A committee shall be appointed at the commencement of every Session consisting of five members of whom three shall be a quorum, to be denominated, The Private Bills Committee to whom shall be referred every Private Bill, and no proceedings after the first reading shall be had upon such Bill until such Committee has reported thereon to the House.

39 So soon as the Committee has reported any Bill, such Bill together with any amendments that may be suggested by the Committee, shall be printed at the expense of the parties who are suitors for such Bill and printed copies thereof delivered to the members before the second reading if deemed necessary by the Committee.

40 No Bill for the partial interest of any person or persons, Corporation or Corporations or body or bodies of people shall be read a second time until all fees be paid for the same into the hands of the Clerk of the House.

41 No Bill having for its object the vesting in or conferring upon any person or persons, Municipality or Body corporate the title to any tract of land shall be received or read in the House unless at least four weeks notice containing a full description of the land in question has been published in the Royal Gazette and one other newspaper in this Province of the intention of such person or persons Municipality or body Corporate to apply for such Bill.

### Simple Honesty

In a beautiful valley of the "Hunt Valais" tourists often love to stroll from the great hotel to the quaint little village around. One day an English lady lost a valuable gold brooch, and after

searching for it in vain all through the village where she had walked about, the thought occurred to her to ask the priest's help. She told him to let his people know that whoever found the trinket and restored it should have a reward. The good pastor replied: "No, madam, no reward is needed; they would be surprised at it, and it would spoil their native honesty. In these mountains the people are still simple and unspoiled. I shall ask them to look for it, and doubtless they will succeed, but, please, no reward. It would be an evil."

Two days after the brooch was found by a little shepherd boy and brought to the priest, who returned it to the lady.

This latter contented herself by dropping an offering into St. Anthony's box, which was in the little village church, but how in her heart of hearts she admired the simple honesty of those plain, rough mountaineers as she compared them with the city throngs and their struggle for more always more! Alas! If only the world could return somewhat to its primitive simplicity.

### Catholic Lawyers And Divorce.

The safeguarding of the moral life of the nation is the most important duty that devolves upon its citizens. And upon no class is the duty more binding than upon the men and women of the legal profession. Not only have they the common obligations of citizenship, but they are bound, by the sacred responsibilities of their calling to fulfill this duty in a special manner, which will be in harmony not only with the letter but with the spirit of the law.

It was the consciousness of this obligation that prompted M. Guillonard, an eminent French barrister, to propose that there be established a Federation of Catholic Lawyers, who would bind themselves never to plead any divorce case.

There is no doubt that the most pernicious evil that threatens America—and, indeed, many other nations in the world today—is the divorce evil. That is equally little doubt that a very large number of divorce cases are due to the manipulations, the urgings and the mendacity of unprincipled members of the legal profession.

In their rapacity for fees these degraded practitioners have no scruples about destroying family ties, violating the sacredness of the home, and robbing children of the love and care of parents.

They do not hesitate to flaunt their shameful intentions publicly. In almost any daily newspaper you will read advertisements which declare: "Attorney—Uncontested Family matters, low fees, no publicity. Attorney—Family matters, low fee, no charge unless successful." In many instances the fee, as low as fifteen or twenty dollars, is advertised.

Against these practices the Catholic lawyer should stand in the breach. He has at stake not only the responsibilities of his profession, but his more sacred honor as a child of the Church.

Unfortunately, many Catholic lawyers show little hesitancy in engaging in divorce proceedings. Many of them defend themselves on the ground that if they refuse such cases their professional rivals will take them, and that no real good will be served by their own refusal to accept them.

At The Federal Capital

As the Session just closed is the last at which His Excellency the Earl of Devonshire will officiate in his capacity of Governor-General of Canada it is fitting that Parliament should officially acknowledge this fact.

As with the Crown so with the Crown's representatives, it is not, under our British parliamentary institutions, the privileged rank or the exalted position that invites our admiration or wins our affection, but the degree to which and the manner in which place and power are made a directing force in all that pertains to justice, order, and law, and in all that ministers most nobly to human need.

Perhaps nothing truer, certainly nothing worthier, could be said of him than that he has discharged his manifold responsibilities of the high office, alike in private and in public life, with due regard to the best of British traditions and the strictest adherence to British constitutional practice and precedence.

In the words, therefore, of the Address, it is with no mere formal expression of regret, but with feelings of genuine appreciation of the service he has rendered alike to Crown and country, to the ties which bind the one to the other, and this new land to the old, that on behalf of the Canadian people we bid him an official farewell, with all the attendant good will which that word is capable of conveying.

To Her Excellency the Duchess of Devonshire, and to the members of their Excellencies' family, we would express in equal measure the appreciation we feel of all they have so generously accorded and left in remembrance, through hospitality, as in many other ways, of what is best in English political, social and family life.

Hon. T. A. CRERAR (Marquette): Mr. Speaker, it is a privilege to join with the right hon. leader of the Government, and the hon. official leader of the Opposition in support of the motion which is now before the House. It is, as all motions coming before this House are, more or less formal in character, but nevertheless it properly and correctly expresses the obligations under which the Canadian people rest to their Excellencies: the Governor General and the Duchess of Devonshire, not only for the fine manner in which their official duties have been discharged, but for the free and sympathetic way in which they have come in contact with the Canadian people in the various offices which they have had to perform.

Hon. W. L. MACKENZIE KING (leader of the Opposition): Mr. Speaker, I feel it a privilege to have the honour of seconding the motion which has just been made by the Right Hon. the Prime Minister.

There is something peculiarly fitting, and indeed very happily appropriate, in that the birthday of His Majesty the King should be the day on which this Parliament, through the circumstance of chance, should express to His Majesty's representative in Canada those feelings of high regard with which, through the circumstance and faithful expression of his high responsibilities, His Excellency has inspired the Canadian people during the critical years of his official connection with Canada.

As with the Crown so with the Crown's representatives, it is not, under our British parliamentary institutions, the privileged rank or the exalted position that invites our admiration or wins our affection, but the degree to which and the manner in which place and power are made a directing force in all that pertains to justice, order, and law, and in all that ministers most nobly to human need.

leaving us after a full period of official duties, and they carry back to the homeland not only the abiding regard and affection of the Canadian people, but as well our very best wishes for their future happiness.

Right Hon. Sir ROBERT BORDEN (King's): Mr. Speaker, having served for nearly four years as Prime Minister under His Excellency, I may be permitted to associate myself with what has been so eloquently and appropriately said by the speakers who have preceded me, and also to add a few words. It was at no small personal sacrifice that the Duke of Devonshire accepted the position which he has filled with such distinction and acceptance since the autumn of 1916.

He came to us endowed with an experience which is most important, if not necessary, for a Governor General of this Dominion. More and more in all the Dominions the constitutional relation of the Governor General to his ministers has approximated to the relation of the King to the British ministry. Especially is this true of Canada. The Duke of Devonshire was educated in public life, and thus he thoroughly understood and appreciated the trend and development of constitutional relations. One could always observe that his mind was thoroughly receptive of constitutional developments which have been somewhat marked in recent years.

As Prime Minister my relation to him was necessarily of a very intimate nature. On all occasions I gave to him my entire confidence in all that concerned public affairs, and I have a very grateful recollection and appreciation of the thoughtful suggestions and wise counsel which he gave to me on many occasions of stress and difficulty.

As Governor General he has thrown himself wholeheartedly into the current of our national life, and there are few Canadians who know our country as thoroughly as he does. The Duchess of Devonshire who ever since her girlhood has been intimately associated with the history of this country, and whose charm has won all hearts, has displayed the same active and earnest interest in all that concerns the welfare of our people.

Doubleless many years of active and honourable public service remain before His Excellency after his return to the United Kingdom. He and the Duchess and all the members of their family will carry with them to the homeland the warm affection and universal respect of the Canadian people. In bidding their Excellencies and the members of their family God-speed, we hope that we may say not farewell but au revoir; and we feel that in spirit and in heart in leaving us they are still Canadians.

Motion agreed to.
R. Hon. ARTHUR MEIGHEN (Prime Minister): I beg to move, seconded by the leader of the Opposition, that a message be sent to the Senate, informing their honours that this House has passed an address to His Excellency the Governor General, on the occasion of the approaching termination of His Excellency's final connection with this country, and requesting their honours to unite with this House in the said address.

Motion agreed to.
PROBATION OF PARLIAMENT.
On Saturday, May 4th, at 6.30 p.m. His Excellency the Governor General proceeded in state to the Chamber of the Senate, in the Parliament Building, and took his seat upon the Throne. The members of the Senate being assembled, His Excellency was pleased to command the attendance of the House of Commons, and that House, being present, 198 Bills passed during the Session were assented to, in His Majesty's name, by His Excellency the Governor General. To these Bills the Royal Assent was pronounced by the Clerk of the

Senate in the following words: "In His Majesty's name His Excellency the Governor General doth assent to these Bills."
Then the Honourable the Speaker of the House of Commons addressed His Excellency the Governor General as follows: "May it please Your Excellency: The Commons of Canada have voted the Supplies required to enable the Government to defray the expenses of the Public Service."

"In the name of the Commons I present to Your Excellency the following Bill:
199. An Act for granting to His Majesty certain sums of money for the public service of the financial years ending respectively the 31st March, 1921, and the 31st of March, 1922, to which Bill I humbly request Your Excellency's assent."

To this Bill the Clerk of the Senate, by His Excellency's command, did thereupon say: "In His Majesty's name, His Excellency the Governor General thanks His Loyal Subjects, accepts their benevolence, and assents to this Bill."
After which His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to close the Fifth Session of the Thirteenth Parliament of the Dominion of Canada, with the following Speech:—
Honourable Gentlemen of the Senate, Gentlemen of the House of Commons:
I am glad to relieve you from further attendance in Parliament after a Session which has been marked by legislation of an important character.

Steps to increase the trade of the country have been taken by the ratification of commercial agreements with France and the British West Indies. It may be hoped that the latter agreement will also result in strengthening the ties which bind together His Majesty's dominions.

Consequent on Canada's position as a member of the League of Nations, Acts have been passed to define Canadian nationals, and to authorize the ratification and carrying into effect of the Protocol accepting the Statute for the Permanent Court of International Justice.

The attempt to arrange for joint control by the Dominion and the Province of Ontario of the levels and flow of the Lake of the Woods water system having become abortive, by reason of a Bill concurrent to The Lake of the Woods Control Act failing to pass the Legislature of Ontario, legislation has been enacted declaring certain works in that system to be for the general advantage of Canada and providing for control by the Dominion in the public interest of all parts of the country having rights therein.

A Committee on Pensions, Insurance, and Re-establishment has given thorough reconsideration to these problems and their recommendations have been embodied in legislation which will make more adequate the assistance which the country owes to its ex-service men.

A Bill to regulate the grading of dairy produce has become law. This legislation should conduce to the more systematic and satisfactory marketing of a very important Canadian product with better results to both producer and consumer.

The Act to repeal the Conservation Act and to make provision for the carrying on by the appropriate department of government of the necessary services hitherto conducted under the Commission of Conservation will result in a reduction of public charges which is so important at the present time.

A further step towards the solution of the problem of the National Railways has been taken in the passage of an Act by virtue of which possession and control of the Grand Trunk Railway System has been acquired and provision made for reviving the arbitration proceedings to ascertain the value of the stocks. A special committee has conducted an inquiry into certain phases of the problem of the operation of these railways.

The proposals as to revenue contained in the Appropriation Act will it is confidently hoped meet with the necessities of the year with a minimum of burden on the people and on the conduct of industry.

**AT THE FEDERAL CAPITAL.**

(Continued from page 2.)  
provision you have made for the public service.

Honourable Gentlemen of the Senate:

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

This is the last occasion I shall have the honour of addressing you, as my term of office will have expired before you meet again.

May I assure you that I shall always retain a very real affection for Canada and its people, and I shall watch your progress with the greatest interest in the sure belief that an ever increasing measure of happiness and prosperity will be the lot of the Dominion.

The Speaker of the Senate then said:  
It is His Excellency the Governor General's will and pleasure that this Parliament be prorogued until Thursday, the 14th day of July next, to be here held, and this Parliament is accordingly prorogued until Thursday, the 14th day of July next.

After the formal proceedings just described, the Countess of Devonshire took her seat beside His Excellency, and the address, already referred to as having been moved in the Commons by the Prime Minister, was read to their Excellencies, in French by the Speaker of the Senate and in English by the Speaker of the Commons.

His Excellency replied to the address as follows:  
It is no easy task to find words adequate to express my gratitude to you for the address which you have presented to me and to acknowledge the great honor conferred upon me today by the Parliament of the Dominion.

"On my return to the Old Country it will be my privilege to submit to His Majesty the expressions of your loyalty and devotion to his throne and person, and to give renewed assurance to the people of the British Isles of your well-established sympathy and good-will."

"Today Canada is formally and justly recognized as one of the nations of the world, and while she will work out her own destiny in her own way, she will, I know, ever be faithful to British institutions, and proud to take her place and share her responsibility as one of the sister nations which constitute the British Empire."

"I wish to join with my personal thanks those of the Duchess and my family. I assure you that it is with feelings of very deep and sincere regret that we realize that the moment has arrived when we must say good-bye. We came among you at a critical and anxious period. The Empire was engaged in a life and death struggle, but from the moment I landed on the shores of Canada I was impressed, as I could not fail to be, by the splendid devotion and determination of her people to give their all and to make every effort till our purpose was accomplished and victory certain."

"We had the privilege of being associated with you in those dark and anxious days, and of taking part in various spheres of work necessary for the successful prosecution of the war."

We also had the privilege of being associated with you in the hour of triumph, and since the conclusion of hostilities we have watched the transition from conditions of war to those of peace. Necessarily the progress is difficult and slow, but I think that without any undue optimism I am justified in congratulating you on a record of substantial progress."

"While I leave Canada with deep and sincere regret, I shall take with me a firmly rooted conviction in her future greatness and prosperity. With an active and virile population and liberally endowed with incalculable resources, she will take an ever increasing part in the trade and commerce of the world, and can confidently look forward to an era of still further expansion."

"The Duchess and I shall always have a very warm affection for Canada and our many personal friends there, and we shall always take a most sincere interest in your progress and welfare. If at any time any of you may be visiting the Old Country we shall look forward to meeting you and renewing our acquaintance."

At the conclusion of his Excellency's address, three rousing cheers and a tiger were given for him and the Countess. The Senators and Commons and the ladies in attendance passed by their Excellencies and bade them good-bye.

**THE PRIME MINISTER.**

Right Hon. Arthur Meighen, Prime Minister, after prorogation on Saturday evening, was the recipient of a magnificent dinner set of Royal Crown Derby China and a large chest of sterling silver from his supporters in the House. The presentation was made in the railway committee room at the conclusion of the last caucus of the session. J. E. Armstrong (Lambton East) presided, and the presentation was made by Hon. W. A. Charlton (Northwest), Senator Rufus Pope and Hon. William Smith (Ontario S.). The presentation came as a complete surprise to the Prime Minister, so much so that it was found impossible to secure the presence of Mrs. Meighen for the ceremony.

Mr. Meighen warmly thanked his supporters for their generous gift and for their expression of esteem. He felt that he owed his supporters far more than they could possibly owe him.

"When I think of the words Mr. Charlton has addressed to me, after his 50 years in public life, I stand in wonder as to how it all happened," Mr. Meighen said.

Mr. Meighen said that he would always give his best to the problems of Canada. At the conference of British Premiers he did not hope to distinguish himself, but would state the problems of Canada fairly and frankly. It would be impossible to take any such place as that taken by Sir Robert Borden, who had established a leadership in world affairs.

"I am at your service in intent, in deed and in determination, if not in capacity," the Prime Minister concluded.

Three spontaneous cheers saluted Mr. Meighen as he sat down, and these were followed by three cheers for Sir Robert Borden.

The Prime Minister left Monday by train for Montreal, from thence to Quebec to take passage on the Empress of Britain, for England to attend the conference of Prime Ministers. He is accompanied by Mrs. Meighen and by Loring Christie, legal adviser of the Department of External Affairs, and by his private secretary, Capt. Armstrong.

Arsenault was sworn in by Chief Justice Matheson, as Vice Chancellor of the Court of Chancery and associate Judge of the Supreme Court, and took his seat on the Bench. An address from the Bar of Prince County was read and presented to him. Congratulatory remarks were made by Attorney General Johnston and others.

Canadian-West Land Regulations  
The sole head of a family (over 15 years old, who was at the commencement of the present year, and who has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta applicants must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency in District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties—six months residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years.

In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter section as pre-emption. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Reside six months in each of three years after clearing homestead (a rent and cultivate 50 extra acres a May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.  
A settler after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a unoccupied homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and a bonus worth \$300.00.  
When Dominion Lands are being held or posted for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive one day priority in applying for entry at local Agency's Office (not Sub-Agency). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent.  
Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm laborers in Canada during 1917, as residence duties under certain conditions.
