



South Side of Water Street, I beg to submit the following:-As this is the first time that the matter has come up for consideration before the present Council, it might be well to note some of the principal points considered as the matter progressed.

The Commercial Cable Co.'s request for permission to lay the cable, first came before the Council, for consideration, upon the Co.'s application of date June 11th, 1909, in which was set out the streets through which the cable was to run. At that time the Council decided to grant permission to lay the cable, subject to certain onditions, amongst the principal of which were that the work should be lone in such a manner as not to interfere with any of the mains, pipes, or sewers already in the streets; that the Company would make good any damage caused the pipes, mains, sewers, etc.; and would put the surface of the streets and roads back in its normal condition; that the excavation

work should be carried on so as no to unnecessarily interfere with traffic; that the Council had the right to lay down water pipes, sewer mains or electric wires under or over the Co.' cable, without being liable for company sation in respect of the same. In all,

that if the Commercial Cable Company were domiciled within the city limits, had their cables in operation, and their staff operating same, and were sending and receiving messages for the Government, or private companies or individuals, that they would be doing business within the city limits, and would be liable for an annual tax, the maximum of which would not exceed \$400.

I would, therefore, suggest that the Council, when fixing the amount to be paid by the Company for the privilege of laying their cables through the city streets, would take the liability of the Company, for the payment of their annual tax, into its consideration.

I don't know that there is any other legal phase of the question presenting itself at the present time for my consideration, As I take it, the main point at issue is the fixing of the amount which the Council shall charge the Company for the privilege of opening up and using the streets for the purpose of conveying its cable from Cuckhold's Cove to its projected building on Water Street, and this is entirely a matter for the Council to pass upon.
