

# The Evening Chit-Chat

With all my heart I echo it.

For it seems to me that it is just as much a parent's duty to his children to play with them as to work for them: just as much a parent's duty to himself to get the happiness out of his children as to get recreation elsewhere.

One of O. Henry's most powerful stories is called "The Guilty Party." The scene of this story is a home on one of the most crowded streets of the East-side, on which "as twilight falls Satan sets up his recruiting office."

"Papa, won't you play a game of checkers with me if you aren't too tired?" "The red-haired, unshaven, untidy man sitting shoeless by the window, answered with a frown:

"Checkers! No, I won't. Can't a man who works hard all day have a little rest when he comes home? Why don't you go out and play with the other kids on the sidewalk?"

"The woman who was cooking, came to the door. "John," she said, "I don't like for Lizzie to play in the street. They learn too much there that ain't good for them. She's been in the house all day long. It seems that you might give up a little of your time to amuse her when you come home."

"Let her go out and play like the rest of 'em if she wants to be amused," said the red-haired, unshaven, untidy man, "and don't bother me."

So ends the first part of the story. Ten years later Lizzie who has very fully obeyed her father's advice to play in the street, kills her lover in a fit of drunken jealousy and commits suicide.

Then O. Henry has one of his favorite "dreams."

He dreams he is in the next world

and sees Lizzie brought before the bar for judgment for punishment. And what is everybody's astonishment when the angel court officer says to the angel policeman: "Now you quit making these false arrests or you'll be transferred. The guilty party you've got to look for in this case is a red-haired, unshaven, untidy man, sitting by the window reading in his stocking feet, while his children play in the streets."

Now perhaps that's a too highly colored illustration of my thesis to appeal to you.

Well, here's a much simpler one. One of the women who work for us was telling me the other day about her only little girl who died when she was ten years old.

"Oh, Miss Ruth," she said, "I think so often how my little girl used to beg me to come out after supper to play croquet with her. And I'd say, 'Mercy, no, I've got too much to do.' And now how I wish I'd played the croquet and had some fun with her sometimes, and been sort of friends with the other mothers are. I thought then that the most important thing in the world was to keep the home and her clothes spot and stain, but now I wish I'd known enough to let things go more and sometimes play with my little girl."

Of course that's not so picturesque as O. Henry's story, but it has the merit of being absolutely true.

One of the greatest safeguards against evil a child can have is the genuine friendship and comradeship of its parents.

One of the greatest keep young tonic a father or mother can have is the habit of playing and romping and being friends with the children.

Every home where there are children has a Ponce de Leon fountain right within itself if the grown ups only know enough to find it.

Everyone knows that children are so bubbling over with lightheartedness and love of life that anyone who is with them much can't help getting some of the overflow.

If you don't play with your children, fathers, and mothers, you are neglecting one of the greatest of life's opportunities—both for them and for you.

# Coronation Day in Bonavista.

Bonavista's tribute to the crowning of our King was worthy of that great occasion.

Coronation Day broke misty and grey, enough to dampen the ardour of the most enthusiastic patriot, but still the programme, pre-arranged, went on to its fulfilment.

The Church of England's Coronation Service was attended by the children of the Sunday School, the Magistrate and Justices of Peace, and by deputations from all of the Societies in full regalia. The Service throughout was most impressive, and when at the very moment of the crowning of King George, a silent moment of obeisance was allowed for homage to the King of Kings, one felt that George the Fifth was crowned indeed. Then rose the people and sang "God Save the King."

After service came the children's hour. One thousand children walked with flags and banners flying, walked in concert, children of all denominations uniting to show honour to their King; nor did they forget to cheer the Rev. H. G. Pegg, the loyal chorus of Thanksgiving. Eucharistic celebrations in the early morning are seldom well attended. As on this day our King's examples seemed to send a wave across the sea of loyalty to God (as well as man) that bore upon its bosom many sympathetic souls who sought the altar in their humbers.

Headed by a band of brass the various societies paraded in good force. Outside the Court House a halt was called, while musical honours were paid to His Majesty's representative. The Magistrate courteously acknowledged their tribute, and after calling for three hearty cheers joined the glad procession through the town. A touching feature of the parade was the drawing of a carriage decorated with patriotic emblems, of the two oldest members of the Fishermen's Society, whose age and infirmity precluded them from walking with their brethren. And so the King was honoured through the day. The night, a windy night of rainy sleet and darkness, but one by one like stars through breaking clouds, the windows of the leges traced in points of light a scintillating picture of the town. Then a flash of rockets lit the gloom. The streets were thronged. Old men and maidens, infant toddlers, babies yet in arms, circled round the Court House watching the illuminations till the last great cannon cracker struck the curfew bell. Then, one by one, the lights went out and the town grew quiet. All to sleep a final prayer was breathed to God to guard Our Sailor King.

# Special Evening Telegram. LIVERPOOL, June 29.

The Seamen's Strike has had a serious effect on the distribution of Canadian and American food-stuffs. The buyers are littered with huge quantities of bacon, cheese, lard and butter, which the dock-wards are preventing the carters from handling. The merchants are much perturbed, as their stocks on hand are limited. Trade in Manchester is equally disorganized. From forty to fifty ships, including many trans-atlantic vessels, are tied up. An equal number of fruit-laden vessels are in the same position, and these have perishable cargoes. The Cunard S. S. Company, this afternoon, agreed to recognize all Seamen's Unions, including the Dockers' organization. The strikers are consequently returning to work.

# Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, June 29.

Rudyard Kipling has brought a poem into the political arena, on behalf of the opponents of the Declaration of London, which the Government is pushing through the House of Commons. Basing his rhymes on the reported intention of the Government not to allow its followers to vote independently, but to insist upon the support of the Declaration by the Coalition, Kipling apostrophizes the Government as "patting to shame the nation," even before the Coronation guests have departed.

The situation resulting from the Seamen's Strike, was much involved to-day, but standing out boldly was the fact that the strikers' measures for obtaining increased wages were effective in many places. The Canadian Pacific Railway and the Alban Line yielded this morning, and the Cunard Line is expected to follow suit. The Stewards of the European of Britain have returned to work, and the loading of the Tunisian has been resumed. The Stewards of the Arabie of the White Star Line, due to sail for Boston on Saturday, and the Bore and Suetie of the same line, quit work to-day, and have picketed their ships.

# Special Evening Telegram. LIVERPOOL, June 29.

The Seamen's Strike has had a serious effect on the distribution of Canadian and American food-stuffs. The buyers are littered with huge quantities of bacon, cheese, lard and butter, which the dock-wards are preventing the carters from handling. The merchants are much perturbed, as their stocks on hand are limited. Trade in Manchester is equally disorganized. From forty to fifty ships, including many trans-atlantic vessels, are tied up. An equal number of fruit-laden vessels are in the same position, and these have perishable cargoes. The Cunard S. S. Company, this afternoon, agreed to recognize all Seamen's Unions, including the Dockers' organization. The strikers are consequently returning to work.

# Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, June 29.

Rudyard Kipling has brought a poem into the political arena, on behalf of the opponents of the Declaration of London, which the Government is pushing through the House of Commons. Basing his rhymes on the reported intention of the Government not to allow its followers to vote independently, but to insist upon the support of the Declaration by the Coalition, Kipling apostrophizes the Government as "patting to shame the nation," even before the Coronation guests have departed.

### Children's Century.

In 1871 the total annual sum available for elementary education in England and Wales was \$4,500,000. Since that time the advances have been by steps and bounds. In 1908-9 from the public exchequer and from different municipalities the sum allocated had mounted to over \$100,000,000.

This should be an eye-opener to those who imagine that education is at all well provided for in Newfoundland. Even if our present education grant was doubled, we should not be providing for all purposes connected with education a scale equivalent to per capita of population what is provided for elementary education only in England and Wales. Much as has been done in the past ten years, it after all compares but feebly with what ought to be done.

And yet this is the Children's Century.

### Dogs Attack Woman.

The vicious dogs which roam about the country in the vicinity of Broad Cove Road have destroyed to date something about 10 head of horned cattle, and a few days ago another cow was killed near the edge of Windsor Lake by them. Fearing that all the cattle will be exterminated, the people have driven them in from the woods where they were allowed to graze during the summer and fall months. Saturday night last as Mrs. Jonathan Tucker was proceeding home to Broad Cove, when near the hatchery she was set upon by a number of these brutes, but seizing a heavy stick she beat them off before they could do her much injury. She was badly scared, however, and will not travel the road alone at night time again.

That the formalities necessary to the final conclusion of the Arbitration Treaty between America and Britain could be completed within four hours, assuming that the machinery was running properly and smoothly, is the official declaration. The difference between the two countries now retaliate merely to phraseology, and can be easily adjusted. The British Ambassador has full powers to sign the treaty. The Administration has failed to find any sign of objection to compact on the part of the Senate.

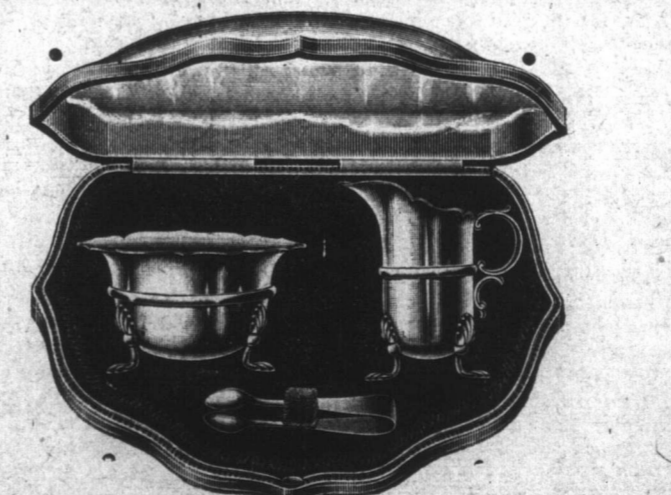

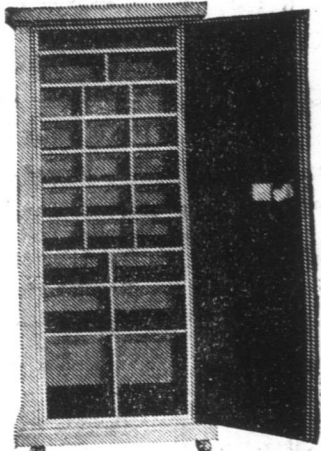
