To test Solignum as a preservative for Wood against the attacks of Worms, we tried a piece of 2 x 4 Spruce, about two feet in length, by painting one-third with Solignum, leaving the balance clear wood, this we suspended by a wire through the centre, in the water about one foot from the bottom, immediately over a pile of stones the remains of a sunken wharf (which is the place where our Wharf Shores are eaten off first) for Three Months.
