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

Sergt Dick was over four years in Newfoundland, where he was employed with Messrs. J. J. & Co., St. John's. He joined the Newfoundland contingent in the beginning of January last year. After coming over to this country with the contingent for training he left Aldershot for the East in August last. Some of his chums who were present at the funeral came through the sea-fighting of November last at the Gallipoli along with him. He afterwards sent to the Force on the Western front, where he received wounds that caused his death on the 12th. The news of his death was sent to his father by telegram from a military hospital there, and was confirmed the next day by an official letter.

**Military Funeral.**

The remains of Sergt Dick were brought to Largs from the hospital in London where he died, on Saturday and interred in Largs Cemetery with military honours. There was no funeral.



# ROBERT TEMPLETON, - - 333 Water Street.

### Sergeant George Dick.

We have little to add this week to what was said last week about the death of this brave young fellow, through wounds received on 2nd July in the forward movement by the British troops. Sergt Dick was over four years in Newfoundland, where he was employed with Messrs. Ellis & Co., St. John's. He joined the Newfoundland contingent in the beginning of January last year. After coming over to this country with the contingent for training he left Aldershot for the East in August last. Some of his chums who were present at his funeral came through the severe fighting of November last at the Dardanelles along with him. He was afterwards sent to the Force on the Western front, where he received the wounds that caused his death on the 12th. The news of his death was sent to his father by telegram from London, as he had been removed to a military hospital there, and was confirmed the next day by an official letter.

**Military Funeral.**  
The remains of Sergt Dick were brought to Largs from the hospital in London where he died, on Saturday, and interred in Larga Cemetery with military honours. There was no fir-



ing party, but a squad of deceased's comrades of the Newfoundland Contingent from their headquarters in this country at Ayr attended, and formed the guard of honour. A number of Largs soldiers on furlough from various units, including one representative from Australia, were present, while the 128th Glasgow Company of the Boys' Brigade, who had arrived the previous night for the purpose of holding a "holiday camp" in the Masonic Temple, attended in full strength, under Capt. ### Fishery Report.

Received at Board of Trade:—  
Aug. 12th. From T. Hogan, (Carbonear to Crocker's Cove). The total catch is 1,290 quintals. There was no fishing done part of the week, and the traps have been taken up. Squid is fairly plentiful, but prospects are not very good. The men are now getting ready for trawling.  
Aug. 12th. From V. Ward, (Mosquito Point to Bryan's Cove). Twenty-seven dories, skiffs and boats are fishing, and the catch to date is 6,336 quintals, but nothing was done the last week owing to stormy weather making it impossible for the boats to go on the grounds. Squid is scarce, and prospects are poor.  
Aug. 12th. From A. J. Hoffe, (Change Islands). Two schrs., the Togo and Annie B., with 200 and 300 quintals, respectively, have returned from the Straits. Prospects are poor, but some boats get from 1/2 to 1 qt. daily. There is sufficient herring for bait, and some squid, but the supply of the latter is uncertain. The total catch is 2900 quintals, with 500 for hind-week. Stormy weather is hindering operations.  
Aug. 12th. From J. White, (Colinet Island to Head of Salmonier). The latest arrivals from the grounds report that owing to the rough weather and scarcity of bait it is hard to do much with the cod. Prospects are fairly good, but there is not much bait of any kind. FIFTY dories and 50 boats are fishing, and the catch is 6,400 quintals, with 1,200 for last week.

**The Wide Outlook.**

Significantly close upon the sweeping defeats which Austria has sustained east and west, at Tarnopol and Gorizia, come a number of minor reports, little more than rumours, which by contrast with these greater matters pass almost unnoticed. But they must mean something, for they all point in the same direction. We hear of fighting, of which there can now be no doubt, north of Salonika; of a bid by Germany for Roumanian neutrality at the expense of Austria; of Portugal's intention to participate actively in the European operations; of something like a crisis in the Austrian cabinet; and finally a message, severely censured, telling of conferences in neutral Spain of the Spanish Prime Minister with both Entente and Austrian plenipotentiaries. Have matters in Austria reached a crisis?

Her military crisis, undoubtedly, is approaching. We should not have said this looking at the Russian operations alone, which, brilliant and effective as they are, have yet always contained the germ of a possible setback, and in any case, it is not to be carried very far vitally to cripple Austria. But the position has been completely altered by the successful entry of Italy into the arena. It was a fine achievement, this capture of Gorizia, perhaps the greatest of the war considered as an isolated event; but it has a meaning, as it will have an effect, far larger than the local consequences may suggest. For it has unbarred the mountainous door, chosen by the Austrians years ago with great skill and prescience, which has hitherto shut out the Italian armies and neutralised their numbers and power. These will now surge through the opening into the Austrian plains and be converted from a potential into an actual factor of the first magnitude. There is no longer any occasion to inquire petulantly why Italy should not break entirely with Germany and send men to the West front. She can send them where they will be of even greater use. Not merely Trieste and Pola but all West Austria is threatened, in which some writers have not considered it fanciful to include Vienna itself. A few months ago this would have been an absurd exaggeration, but Russia's progress and still more her lot of Austrian man-power have made all the difference. It is not strange, therefore, that Roumania should be looming daily larger on the horizon and that concern should manifest itself even in Berlin. The San Sebastian conferences, too, may mean nothing, or they may mean a great deal. Some day the Central Powers will sue for peace, and Austria will almost certainly be the first to do so.

Meanwhile, the news from the West front is most encouraging. The meaning of the latest Franco-British gains

**What Air Pilots Must Know.**

To the ordinary observer the air may seem quite gullible of dangers, but in reality, this is by no means the case. Aviators rarely make a flight without encountering some invisible, and therefore all the more dangerous peril. During the earlier days of aviation these dangers often proved fatal, but nowadays an aviator, by means of his chart, can avoid, or at least be prepared for, them.

A considerable amount of time and

money have been expended on these charts, which are of incalculable advantage to aviators.

From towers in various parts of Europe kites bearing with them apparatus which records fluctuations in the strength of winds, are constantly sent aloft, sometimes to astounding heights. On these towers, also, are placed special instruments which record the force of the wind near the earth. From the data thus collected experts are constantly preparing new air charts.

These charts show where the disturbed areas exist, at what heights they are encountered, and what is the

maximum force of gusts over localities known to be dangerous during various strengths of wind.

Aviators themselves play a big part in the making of air charts.

At the Front, for instance, our aviators are constantly coming in with news of fresh dangers they have discovered. The air-pocket, eddy, or whatever the newly-discovered peril may be, is promptly marked down on the chart of that region for the guidance of other aviators flying over that part of the country.—Anewers.



**War News.**

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

CAPTURE LINE OF GERMAN TRENCHES.

PARIS, Aug. 16. The Entente Allies after a brisk combat to-day, captured a line of German trenches on a front of 1,500 metres to the north of Maurepas in the Somme region, according to an official communication issued to-day. The statement adds that the French troops have occupied all the German positions east of Maurepas on the Clerf road, and that in addition German trenches 1,200 metres long to the south, to Belloy-en-Santerre were captured.

RUSSIAN CAPTURES.

PETROGRAD, Aug. 16. Between June 4th, when the Russian offensive was inaugurated, and August 12, General Brussiloff's forces captured more than 355,000 men. The War Office announced to-day that the Russians have captured a series of heights to the west of Varoshia and Ardizemy in the Carpathians. In the Vookhita and Delatyn regions the Austrians are retiring to the west.

SUBMARINE IN MID-ATLANTIC.

NORFOLK, Va., Aug. 16. Capt. Olsen of the Norwegian steamer Alf, reported to the hydrographic office here to-day that he passed a submarine in mid-Atlantic in a line from Norfolk to the mouth of the English Channel on Aug. 5. The German U liner Deutschland passed out through Virginia Capes on the night of Aug. 2, but she hardly could have gotten so far as the position Capt. Olsen reports, by Aug. 5.

NAVAL ENCOUNTERS.

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 16. Two encounters between British and German warships were observed from Flushing, Holland, last night, according to a despatch from Flushing to-day to the Telegraph.

A BERLIN OFFICIAL.

BERLIN, Aug. 16. An official issued to-day says that during July 74 merchantmen belonging to the Entente Allies were sunk by German and Austrian submarines.

and mines. The ships had a total tonnage of 103,000.

ALLIED FORCES ON SALONIKA FRONT.

PARIS, Aug. 16. The Allied forces at Salonika front captured the railroad station of Doreten and four villages at other points on the front, according to an official statement issued by the French War Office to-night. The statement covers continuous fighting extending from Aug. 1 to the present time.

VIOLENT BOMBARDMENT.

PARIS, Aug. 16. Violent bombardment was carried on last night on the Verdun front, at Thiaumont, Fleury, Vaux and Chapitre. East of the Meuse and along the greater part of the front the night passed quietly, the official report issued to-day, says.

PORTUGAL.

LONDON, Aug. 16. Portugal is on the verge of larger co-operation in the world war. She is taking thorough stock of her available military and naval resources with a view of not only further strengthening her ancient alliance with Britain but with the idea of bringing a considerable factor in the broader arrangements of the Entente Allies. Dr. Machado, President of the Republic of Portugal made the above announcement of Portugal's future war policy in Lisbon to-day.

ALLIES TESTING OPPONENTS' STRENGTH.

BERLIN, Aug. 16. The forces of the Entente Allies on the Balkan front continue to test the strength of the opposing lines, making attacks in small forces. Another engagement in the region of Lake Doiran, to the northeast of Salonika, was reported to-day.

IN MESOPOTAMIA.

LONDON, Aug. 16. A British official this evening concerning operations in France, says there is nothing special to report. Another communication dealing with the situation in Asiatic Turkey says the Mesopotamia situation is unchanged both on the Tigris and Euphrates lines.

PRESIDENT POINCARÉ CONFERS WITH KING GEORGE.

PARIS, Aug. 16. President Poincaré had a long conference with King George during the British monarch's recent visit to the Somme front. The visit of the King and President to the fighting line

was coincident with the arrival of the German Emperor on the German front. An order was found on a captured German officer which gives the details of a military review which was held before the Emperor. The order directed that the exhausted soldiers be sent to the rear so that the Emperor should see the best element troops. It also directed that those who fought at Verdun should occupy the first ranks.

BILL POSTPONED.

LONDON, Aug. 16. Owing to strong opposition and the differences of opinion revealed in the debates in the House of Commons, the Government is obliged to postpone until the autumn session further consideration of the bill regarding the registration forms. Winston Spencer Churchill, in opposing the measure, said though he hoped it would not be necessary to hold a general election during the war, circumstances might arise which would force this on the country. In such case it would be manifestly unfair to exclude the soldiers and sailors from voting. Andrew Bonar Law, speaking on behalf of Premier Asquith, announced that after a formal second reading further consideration would be postponed until the autumn.

A SAFEGUARD.

LONDON, Aug. 16. Persons who are not British subjects and who desire to go to India to undertake missionary or educational work, must in future obtain permission from the Indian authorities, according to an official notification. In order to avoid any misunderstanding the authorities explain that the new arrangements are not intended to discourage the important self-sacrificing work done in India by many American and other neutral missionaries, but as a safeguard against missionaries who are in sympathy with the foes of the Empire or lacking of good will towards the government of India.

WAR OFFICE REPORTS NO CHANGE.

LONDON, Aug. 16. With the exception of minor infantry engagements in the vicinity of Pozieres, where our line is being consolidated, there was no change between the Ancre and the Somme, the War Office report of to-day says.

GERMAN SUBS FOR AMERICA.

LONDON, Aug. 16. Two new German submarines of very large size will depart shortly for America, according to a Central News despatch from the Hague. It is said the submarines made their trial trip off Heligoland.

GERMANY AND ROUMANIA.

BUCHAREST, Aug. 16. The Epoca announced to-day that Germany has offered territorial compensation to Roumania at the expense of Austria in return for Roumania's neutrality in the war.

FRENCH AIR SHIP LOST.

ROME, Aug. 16. A squadron of French and Italian aeroplanes made a raid near Trieste to-day and is reported to have inflicted extensive damage. One French aeroplane was last.

KING VICTOR ON INSPECTION TOUR.

GORITZA, Aug. 16. Although the city is still under bombardment by long range Austrian guns, King Victor Emmanuel stopped here on his tour of inspection along the Italian lines and watched the effect of the hostile artillery fire. He also visited the tunnel by which the Italians penetrated and surprised the place. While he was entering his automobile to leave Gorizia, the King saw a soldier wounded in a hand and foot standing to attention. "Don't bother to salute me, comrade," said the King, who shook hands and then saluted the soldier.

THE RAILWAY STRIKE.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16. President Wilson late to-day completed a definite plan for settlement of the threatened railroad strike, which he will submit to-morrow to a general committee of 640 representatives of employees and managers. The plan involves acceptance of the basic eight-hour day with regular pay for overtime and investigation by a committee into the other issues.

DAMAGES CAUSED BY HURRICANE.

KINGSTON, Ja., Aug. 16. A hurricane which struck the east coast of Jamaica last night resulted in considerable damage to the banana plantations, but as far as can be ascertained the cocoa nut trees and sugar canes are not seriously affected. Wires in all directions from Kingston are down. No details have been received from the north and west coasts of the island. Several coasting vessels and lighters were driven ashore in Kingston harbor. Two were drowned. Damage done to buildings was slight.

**HARVARD SURGICAL VISIT FOR ENGLAND.**  
CAMBRIDGE, Mass., To-day. Eleven surgeons and eleven nurses, comprising another detachment of the Harvard surgical unit, left to-day for New York and sail to-morrow on the steamer Lapland for England. The party will replace at the British base hospital in France other members of the unit whose term of service ends on Sept. 9th.

**ST. CROIX FAVORS SALE.**  
ST. THOMAS, Danish West Indies, To-day. Apparently the inhabitants of the Island of St. Croix are in favor of the sale of the Danish West Indies to the States, from an unofficial balloting held there yesterday. The votes cast were 5,000 in favor of the proposition and only 11 against. The population of St. Croix in 1901 was 18,890.

**FINE PROGRESS ON WEST FRONT.**

LONDON, To-day. The French and British are striking with terrific force in three directions on the Somme front and have advanced nearly three miles of German trenches, driving forward at points to a depth of 300 to 500 yards. The most important gains were made by the British and French troops striking north from the point where the Allies' lines meet at Maurepas and Clergy. The two most important points held by the Germans in this sector have been flanked on both sides, according to an official statement issued by the British. The road has also been reached between Maurepas and Gulleumont, the latter town being the immediate objective of the British. This advance, if maintained brings the Allies directly in front of the large railroad town of Comblès. South of the Somme the French have stormed the German trenches over a length of about three-fourths of a mile, driving forward in a southerly direction from Bellefontaine.  
Paris reports a considerable number of prisoners taken in these operations. For the first time in many days no important gains were reported from the Russian front. The same dearth of news prevails with regard to the Italian operations. The most interesting item of news regarding the Italian advance against Trieste is contained in a news despatch from Milan, which says that German troops are being employed in the defence of the big Austrian port. It corroborated, this means that Italy and Germany will at last enter into an active state of war.

**AUSTRIA MAY TRY TO MAKE PEACE WITH ITALY.**

LONDON, To-day. Two important cabinet meetings were held in Vienna yesterday, in which the possibility of a separate peace with Italy was discussed, according to an Exchange Telegraph despatch from the capital. The plan under discussion is said to have been considered with a view to enabling Austria-Hungary to make an undivided effort against the Russians. The report by Field-Marshal von Hindenburg of his requirements for defending the Austrian line, and the Polish question were also discussed, the despatch adds.

**FRENCH BREAK DOWN BARRIERS.**

PARIS, To-day. The operations on three different parts of the Somme front yesterday resulted in the removal of some of the barriers of the German defensive system. The resumption of the methodical drive of the French troops after the disappearance of these obstacles is expected to bring further gains in the region of Gulleumont and Maurepas. In the action yesterday the French overcame an ascendancy over their adversaries during the fighting around the Gulleumont-Maurepas road. The Germans still have a hold in the northwest part of Maurepas, but the French by reason of their success in that vicinity have a dominating position and besides are menacing the German communications south of the Somme. The German trench system around Bellefontaine was a real fortified work which had resisted numerous previous bombardments. Its capture will permit further advance in that section.
