The plant at St. John's is capable of storing 20,000,000 pounds of fish and can freeze 250,000 pounds daily/ Smaller storages will be built at different points along the coast, which will take care of the fresh products of the various bays and ensure a regular supply of bait during the fishing season. The Reid fleet of bay steamors will be fitted with cold storage for the transfer of fish to the storage plants, and the steamers ply-ing on Cabot Strait will be equipped with refrigeration chambers for the shipment of the various products to American and Canadian ports.—N.
