**Russia Rising
Against Soviets.**

Insurrections Are of Daily Occurrence—Revolution Wholly Popular—Simons Explains to Reichstag—Quintette of Youths to be Hanged For Treason—Auxiliary Policemen Shot.

A DOZEN INSURRECTIONS.
WARSAW, March 11. Leon Trotsky, Russian War Minister, according to Russians here who are in daily touch with their country, has offered a reward of five million rubles for the body dead or alive of General Koslovsky, the revolutionary leader in the Petrograd region. General Koslovsky in return is reported to have offered ten rubles for Trotsky's body. It is pointed out here that a million rubles is now worth about fifty dollars. A dozen more insurrections are in progress throughout Russia and the anti-Bolshevik movement daily is encouraging other uprisings, say local Russians, who, they assert, today, are gaining confidence of the ultimate success of the counter revolutionary movement as they learn of fresh anti-Bolshevik forces appearing from Odessa northward.

LEADERS UNKNOWN.
LONDON, March 11. Leaders of the revolutionary movement now developing in Russia are entirely unknown in Russian political circles, which indicates that the movement is not political and one of the broad masses of Russian people themselves, according to Antolin Bankaioff, President of the group of Russian Social Democrats in London. M. Bankaioff to-day communicated to the British Labor leaders important private information which has filtered into Russian political and commercial circles in London, from what he characterized as most reliable sources of information in Russia.

DISCUSSING CONFERENCE.
BERLIN, March 11. Foreign Ministry Simons discussed the events of the London Reparation Conference with the Foreign Relations Committee of the Reichstag until late last evening, when the session was adjourned until to-day. Although the deliberations were supposed to be confined to the Cabinet and committee members only, it was observed that Hugo Simons, who was one of the Government's pre-conference advisers, also was present. After the meeting ended it was learned that Dr. Simons admitted having exceeded the limit which German experts thought safe in presenting counter proposals to the Entente and also that he was more optimistic than his colleagues regarding Germany's ability to float an international loan. Dr. Karl Helfferich, former Secretary of the Treasury, also a Nationalist, and Dr. Gustave Strazmann, of the People's Party, were among the Foreign Minister's critics. The Reichstag on Saturday will discuss the situation resulting from the failure of London negotiations.

SENTENCE TO DEATH.
DUBLIN, March 11. Five young men, Bernard Young, Patrick Boyle, Thomas Bryan, Frank Flood and Dermott O'Sullivan, have been sentenced to death by hanging by court martial, after being convicted of high treason in carrying on war against the King. The trials were connected with the ambush at Dromconda in February. The Viceroy has commuted the sentence of O'Sullivan to life service on account of his youth. O'Sullivan is only seventeen years of age.

MORE MURDERS.
BELFAST, Ireland, March 11. Three auxiliary policemen from the Gorbahamstown Depot in Dublin, used for British troops, were shot outside

a Music Hall here this evening while conversing with several young women. The group of men who did the shooting were not identified. The wounded men died shortly after their admission to hospital.
EXPORTS TO HOLLAND STOPPED.
AMSTERDAM, March 11. Exports from the Rhineland to Holland have stopped altogether, says the Essen correspondent of the Rotterdam newspaper, neither buyers or purchasers being willing to risk the imposition of Allies tax levies.

OBERHAUSEN OCCUPIED.
LONDON, March 11. Oberhausen, six miles East of Ruhrort and seven miles Northwest of Essen, has been entered by the Allies, according to a Central News despatch from Paris. The entry was made without incident.

THE Lotion for Skin Disease
Revolution in Berlin.

From the beginning of March, 1848, Berlin—the Prussian capital—were an unwonted aspect, for in this city of military discipline, public meetings had been held day after day and the streets were blocked by excited crowds. Their deputations to the government received halting and evasive answers, and the excitement increased until on the 18th, encounters began between the citizens and the troops, which served to exasperate the people and their leaders, although they were insignificant. The King—Frederick William IV.—appeared to be wavering between resistance and concession until the news of the revolution in Vienna became known on the 15th, and brought affairs to their crisis. On the 17th, the tumult in the streets suddenly ceased, as it was understood that the following day would see the Government either reconciled with the people, or forced to deal with a great insurrection. On the morning of the 18th, crowds made their way to the Palace, which was surrounded by troops. A Royal edict appeared about midday summoning the Prussian United Diet for April 2, and announcing that the King had determined to promote the creation of a Parliament for all Germany, and the establishment of Constitutional Government in every German State. This drew fresh masses to the Palace, where the King vainly attempted to address them. When called upon to disperse, the multitude refused, and answered by cries for the withdrawal of the soldiers. In the midst of this confusion two shots were fired from the ranks without orders; a panic followed, in which—for no known reason—the cavalry and infantry charged the people, putting them to flight, but the combat was taken up by the populace of Berlin. Barricades appeared in the streets, and fighting continued during the evening and night. The King received deputations begging that the troops might be withdrawn from the city; he endeavored to make the surrender of the barricades the condition for an armistice; but as night went on the troops became exhausted, and though they had gained ground, the resistance of the people was not overcome. The King gave way, and at daybreak on

Are You a Tidy Man?

At a friend's house the other night an argument arose as to whether a man who always appears well dressed, is of necessity a man of tidy habits. Dodson claimed that the cultivation of tidy habits pays. "Tidiness is no virtue of mine," said he. "No good housekeeper can be patient and see the room in which I have been working or idling. My newspapers are fallen on the floor; there are books upon chairs; there is ash of tobacco where such ash should never be; I never put away my clothes neatly, but one morning last week my good angel whispered in my ear, 'Be tidy this morning.' For once I heeded the voice. I stooped down and picked up an scrap of crumpled paper; it turned out to be a dog-eared five dollar bill, crushed and unclean. Thus was I rewarded for a trifling deed of tidiness." Uncle Ned, who has been quietly sitting on the lounge, suddenly broke into the argument. "Tut, tut!" he exclaimed, with some heat; "Tidy men do not make good husbands. It is the custom, I know, for women to bemoan the untidiness of their husbands and of men folk in general, but in their heart of hearts they approve of untidiness in men. The normal woman is always happy when tidying up after a man. 'From my youth upwards,' continued Uncle Ned, 'I was brought up to be neat, orderly and precise. There was a place for everything, I was told, and everything ought to be in its place. Consequently method and order became a mania with me. I carried the cultivation of tidiness to a fine art. Now that I am older and wiser I have learnt that my early training was all wrong. The world does not expect a man to be tidy in his habits, should he show any tendency to be methodical, he is looked upon with suspicion, even with scorn. It may be natural for a woman to be tidy—but a man, never.

Amazing Escapes from Death. There is no man living to-day who has actually been hanged, but there are many records of resuscitation after hanging.

One of these belongs to the year 1854. Miss de Bisham was condemned to death for harbouring thieves. She was hanged and left suspended on the gallows from Monday morning until sunrise on Thursday. Yet, on being taken down, she revived. Henry III. granted her a pardon.

In 1650 an Oxford servant girl was hanged for the murder of her child. When handed over to the doctors for dissection she revived. Inquiries were made as to her sensations during suspension, but she remembered nothing, saying her revival was just like waking from a deep sleep.

A housebreaker named Smith was hanged at Tyburn in 1765, and a reprieve arrived after he had been suspended for fifteen minutes. On being taken down he revived.

A man named William Duell had a hard fate. He was hanged in London in 1749, and was carried to Surgeons' Hall to be anatomized. Before the doctors could start he came to life again, but it did not. He was transported, a fate not always preferable.

At Cork a man was hanged in 1767 for street robbery. On being taken down he was hurried to a surgery, where an incision was made in his windpipe. He recovered so rapidly that he went to the theatre the same evening.

After Fautleroy, banker and forger, was executed in 1824, a rumour got about that he had escaped death by the insertion of a silver tube in his throat. This prevented strangulation, and he was restored to consciousness. There is, however, no confirmation of this strange story.

In the Condemned Cell. A prisoner was taken from Cardiff Prison and placed in the dock in London on a charge of murdering his wife. Full then he had never heard of her death, but before he could realize his position he was convicted and sentenced to death!

Then he implored the warders and the governor to tell him the date of his wife's death. "My good man," said the governor, "you have only a short time to live. Don't worry about such a detail."

Day after day, however, the prisoner asked this question, until he got the answer. "But I was safe in prison on that date," he exclaimed.

"Then why didn't you see me at the trial?" "Because I was neither asked nor allowed to say anything." He was released.

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TODAY'S MESSAGES.

BORDEN REFUSES.
OTTAWA, March 12.
Sir Robert Borden has refused an invitation of the League of Nations to become a member of the committee charged with the duty of reporting upon amendments to the Covenant.

PARIS DEMONSTRATES.
PARIS, March 12.
Scores of officials and cheering crowds greeted Briand on his return to Paris from London last night.

QUITE SOLDIERLY.
DUBLIN, March 12.
Members of "Irish Republican Army" last evening, ducked James Joyce, salesman for a firm of Belfast drapers, in the Grand Canal white waterway looked on in amazement. The incident is said to be part of a campaign of boycott against Belfast.

SILK WAREHOUSES BURNED.
SHANGHAI, March 12.
Several silk warehouses were burned here yesterday, with an estimated loss of six millions.

NOT FOR AGGRANDISEMENT.
PARIS, March 12.
Premier Briand, last night, expressed pleasure at the solidarity shown by allies during the London Conference. He denied that France desired to annex German territory as a result of the occupation of the Rhine, and declared that the occupation should be extended if it would be because the allies had decided on further penalties.

PATROLS REMOVED.
DESSELDORF, March 12.
Belgian patrols, which took control of the Rural Commune of Hamborn, Wednesday, have been removed, and this action has tended to ease the situation at Duisburg. Cooperation between German security police and Allied troops has been effected.

BOMBARDMENT MORE INTENSE.
STOCKHOLM, March 11.
The fight for Petrograd has again flared up, the Kronstadt bombardment which recommenced last night, continuing throughout the day. In intensity the firing surpassed all previous efforts. At Terikoff on the Russo-Finnish border and at other Finnish places the ground was shaken and windows were broken. The Germans neither reports that Kronstadt last night, by means of electric wire signals, demanded the immediate surrender of Krasnaya Gorka, in pain of complete annihilation. During the day Krasnaya Gorka made only feeble reply to the heavy fire from the battleships Sebastopol, and Porpoorovsk.

FLEEING FROM BATUM.
CONSTANTINOPLE, March 11.
The Turks have occupied Batum, Georgia's principal Black Sea port. Late despatches from Batum told of a Bolshevik uprising, with thousands of persons in addition to the Allied Commission and members of the Georgian Government, leaving that port. The Bolsheviks are holding the railway running from Kutais to Batum, upon which the Turkish Nationalists were said to be making their next move.

WINSTON'S WELCOME.
ALEXANDRIA, Egypt, March 11.
Native police in breaking a demonstration against Winston Churchill, Secretary for the Gallies, who was to take charge of Egyptian affairs, were stoned to-day and compelled to flee. Reinforcements for police who came up, killed three persons and wounded others. Churchill arrived in Cairo, Thursday, accompanied by War Office representatives in connection with Arab and Palestine affairs. He avoided a hostile demonstration by students, who were waiting him at the station, by leaving his train few miles outside the city and motoring to his hotel. Small epidemic demonstrations took place in Alexandria Tuesday and Wednesday.

TRAIANE JOINS REVOLUTIONISTS.
CONSTANTINOPLE, March 12.
Three cities in Southern Russia, Kiev, Katerinostav, and Odessa were recently captured by Ukrainian revolutionists, led by Simon Petlura, peasant leader, and General Makno. Recent advances would seem to indicate that Odessa had been occupied. General Makno appears to be in authority at Ekaterinostav, and reports allege that Jewish pogroms have been in progress. Petlura's army took Kiev



TRINITY.

The safety and the speed that now attend our crossing the harbor, from Trinity to Trinity East and back again by the Motor Ferry, preclude many thoughts of the danger, and the tardiness that were so often associated with the same trip some sixty years ago. Although the sail boats that did duty there from the first, to the last of such boats, were built for comfort and safety rather than for speed, yet, owing to the treacherous squalls of wind that often drop so suddenly from Gun Hill to the calm water of the harbor—safety always lay largely with the watchful eye of the ferryman, and the ease with which the sheet of the big matsail could be let go, at a moment's notice.

All went well, however, for many years, oftentimes "more by good luck than good management"; and all has gone well in this respect from those years to the present, with the exception of the event I am about to recall. On April 3rd, 1865, there came the combination of circumstances that were only necessary at any time to bring about disaster:—a calm, a sudden squall of wind from Gun Hill, the shifting of loose, unprotected ballast, and a sheet belayed so tightly that it could not be released in a moment—and within a few minutes the boat had capsized and had gone to the bottom; and the ferryman, who in frantic but unsuccessful efforts to release the sheet, got tangled in it, went down with the boat and was drowned.

This combination of circumstances and with these results, though always sad, are so common in the history of our country, that they call for no special reference, after so many years; and were it not for the exceptional circumstances in which three of the passengers found themselves and were saved from drowning, there would be but little about the incident to justify my recalling it. There were four passengers from Trinity East: Mrs. Richard Fowle and her infant child, Mary Hogarth, and Rebecca Eastman. Henry Hancock, of Trinity, was the ferryman. As the boat went over, the passengers floated about in the water. In these days it was fashionable for the women to wear cane or steel-bow skirts, and as Mrs. Fowle and Miss Hogarth were thus equipped, the air underneath their skirts prevented them from sinking, and they sat in the water—as one of them described it to me, "as comfortable as if I was sitting in dough." Rebecca Eastman, who was scantily clad, and with no hoops, sank at once, and was rescued as she was sinking for the third time. Mrs. Fowle held on to her infant son—Thomas Jenkins Fowle—such as only a mother could do in such circumstances, and he lay still in her arms, sound asleep, too young and too comfortable to be conscious of danger.

It was with the greatest difficulty that the rescuers could induce the mother to relax her hold on him, or to induce Miss Hogarth to release the grip that she had taken on Mrs. Fowle's skirt, in order to get them into the boats. Poor Rebecca Eastman was taken ashore to Trinity, apparently dead, and was carried on a fish-barrow to the house of Thomas and Sally Lucas, where, after proper treatment under the direction of Dr. White, she was brought back to consciousness. Mrs. Fowle and her child, and Miss Hogarth were taken back to Trinity East—quite dry from the waist up, but with their lower limbs chilled with the ice-cold water of an April day.

After their nerves were restored to normal, they felt but little the worse for the shock, though it took some time for them to muster courage enough to take passage again in either of the ferry-boats that succeeded the ill-fated one. All of them, but Rebecca Eastman, are alive and well to-day. Mr. Thomas Jenkins Fowle (who was the infant passenger) is interested in the story as told to him many times since; whilst Mrs. Fowle, and Mrs. Watts, nee Hogarth, gratefully recall the days when "book-skirts" were fashionable, and when as in their case, they were first-class life preservers.

In the days of the old muzzle-loading cannon, the sailors used to say, that the safest place in the ship during a fight, was the place where a shot had already hit; giving as their reason for this assertion, that "two shots never strike in the same place." With the return of February this year, and remembering the blizzards of last year, and the sixteen days we were cut off from the outside world, we took our stand just where it had hit at that time, with a sense of full security from a second hit in the same place. How badly we "got left" is now ancient history, and when last year's shot of sixteen days of isolation was followed this year by another in the same place, but of twenty-two days' duration, we lost our faith in the old sailor's conclusions, and took our medicine with the best grace we could call to our assistance. If the Summer of 1921 will only hit us in the same place, and with the same results of 1920, we shall forgive and

Interesting Records of the Royal N.F. Fencible Regiment.

Official Dispatches of Commanding Officers.

...of complaints preferred by James Kelly, Private soldier in His Majesty's Royal N.F. Regiment of Fencible Infantry.

(Continued.)
No. 12.—That the said Thomas Bradley had met with from an immediate report to different officers belonging to the Royal Newfoundland Regiment of the accusation, which the complainant had preferred against him, and also made a public boast of the favorable reception he (Bradley) had met with from the officers and the highly indiffering account, that had been given to them as to the complainant.
No. 14.—That the said Thomas Bradley had the complainant cited, before Lieut. and Paymaster Davis, Royal Newfoundland Regiment, who at that time and is now doing duty as Deputy Assistant Quartermaster-General, on the 19th of August, 1914, who would not as much as pay attention to the smallest attention to any substance, on the part of the complainant, although he had produced in evidence the Royal Artillery as witness to support his charge, but the contrary, said it was well known what a rascal the complainant was, and fully and openly accused, and empowered, the said Thomas Bradley to beat, and maltreat, the complainant, if he ever again attempted, to impeach him (Bradley) with any such imputation.
No. 15.—The Deputy Quartermaster-General has not only given full countenance and implicit belief, to the Thomas Bradley, of the Embodied Militia, with regard to what he has charged against the complainant, but he (Lieut. Davis) has moreover commended the said Thomas Bradley for his former situation as pilot, on board the "Thunderer," Gunboat, by which means the powers and authority, which were vested in the said Bradley, by the Deputy Quartermaster-General, as far as regards the treatment of the complainant were made the more stable and effective.
No. 16.—The complainant on his part made a representation to Lieut. Colonel Cartwright, commanding the station, to which Bradley did believe, and was ordered to attend the following morning. The complainant stated to the Lieut. Colonel, agreeing to his directions, but to the complainant's astonishment, received for answer that in consequence of the character that had been given of the complainant by Major Heathcote, the Lieut. Colonel could not possibly pay attention to what the complainant had advanced and that he knew of full liberty to look for seizures of his references in any other shape or through any other channel he might think proper. The complainant in order to more fully ascertain, what he had been given to understand, immediately waited on Major Heathcote and requested to know from him, the truth of the discourse between him and the Lieut. Colonel, as far as it related to his regard to the complainant's character. The Major was fully explicit and laconic in his reply, viz: that the representation he had given of the complainant was a true and faithful one.
No. 17.—Major Heathcote has not only refused his assistance as commanding officer of the Royal Newfoundland Regiment, in obtaining redress of the complainant, but he (Major Heathcote) has completely cramped and effectually prevented the complainant, from taking any steps or entering into any measures for the obtaining of satisfaction, by persistently handing him over, in charge to Lieut. and Paymaster Davis, in reply to the Deputy Quartermaster-General with directions immediately to place him (the complainant) on board His Majesty's Armed Brig, the "Horn."
