



In many respects we are the sanitary nation in the world, and yet, this matter has never been adequately tackled by our authorities. 



### Rotary Club

The speaker at yesterday's Rotary lub Luncheon was Dr. Liddy, of Mt. Allison University, who gave a most interesting address on "The Treatplent Of Criminals." The speaker ouched upon his experience in dealing with criminals in Dorchester Penitentiary and at penitentiaries and fails in the Maritime Provinces.

He expressed the belief that most of the crime committed at the present time is due to feeble-mindedness of the party committing them. It often occurs that a man or woman who is strong physically is of a much lower mental age, and as this condition cannot easily be observed is follows that there must be in each community people at large who may be criminally nclined because of the low standard of intelligence.

People have contended that punishment for crimes committed should be n the nature of revenge on the part of the state rather than by an individual, or with a view to the repression, but a feeling is growing that the primary object of imprisonment should be the ultimate reformation of the prisoner so that he may become once again a good citizen. Most jails and penitentiaries are so conducted as to remove all hope of reformation, but the modern penitentiaries attend to the proper education and employment f prisoners so that their minds may be developed and they may realize

the duties to their fellow citizens. All men are subject to intervals of mind aberration and many crimes are committed by people while in that state. The only possible prevention gainst such a state of mind is the cultivation of right examples of thinking and lviing.

Dr. Liddy also spoke strongly in avor of juvenile courts and he pointed out the advantages of these courts to young people who early in heir lives disobey the law.

Rotarian James Ayre, who presided, xpressed the thanks of the Club to Liddy for his brilliant and instructive speech and the usual vote f thanks was carried with much ap-

So clever are the seals that it is a race between them and the fishermen every time a bobbing cork on the net shows that a salmon has struck The seals generally win.. Wolfike, a seal goes for the throat of a fish, and unusually a head is all that is left in the net. Fishermen have tried spreading a "blind" net to protect the actual fishing net, but the seals, evidently learning the trick rive salmon into the net to make capture easier.

Not only do seals live on salmon ut when their hunger is appeased, hey kill for sport, tossing the fish at of the water as a cat plays with mouse. A seal can throw a 30-lb. almon clear of the water, the fishrmen declare.



AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Prime Minister of Newfoundland and his Minister of Finance and Customs with the request that these matters have their early and careful consideration.

WHEREAS the amendment to the Lottery Act which permits Lotteries, by permission of the Magistrate, has resulted in a widespread abuse of the privilege, and tends to foster the spirit of gambling, to the demoralization of the community;
