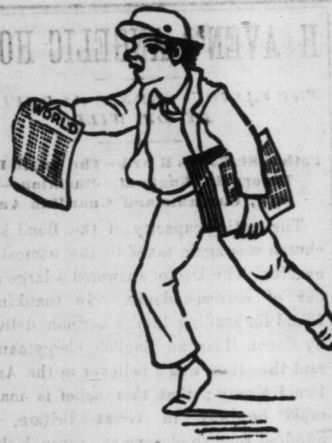

Then if the amount of the taxpayer's interest in the administration of civic affairs is not capable of being determined by the amount of property he holds, and if it is in direct proportion to his ability to pay the taxes he owes to the corporation, no taxpayer should be prevented from voting.

Under our present constitution, every man who pays taxes to the dominion ought to have a vote in the election of those who have the management of the money he contributes.

There is no reason why liquor laws should not be as rigidly enforced as excise laws. Permits to sell liquor are issued to the brewer, and quite fast enough for the march of public opinion, as forfeitures and business changes took place, without confiscation of the large amount of property which has been invested in the trade with the sanction of the law of the land.
