



NOTICE WEIGHTS AND MEASURES

Traders, Manufacturers and Owners of Weights. Measures and Weighing Machines senerally are specially requested to read carefully the following instructions and act accordingly:

1. The Weights and Measures Act provides for a regular biennial inspection of all Weights and Measures used for trade purposes, as well as for irrogular inspections of the same, which may be made at any time when deemed necessary by the inspector, and it also imposes a heavy penalty on any trader or other person who wilfully obstructs or impedes an inspector or assistant inspector in the performance of his duty under said Act, or who refuses to produce the whole of his weights and measures for inspection when called upon to do so by an inspecting officer.

2. Every Tracer, Manufacturer and Owner of Weights, Measures and Weighing Machines when paying moneys to inspectors or Assistant inspectors of Weights and Measures for verification feesis entitled to, and is specially requested to, demand from the officer who makes the inspection an official certificate ("Form-0.6" with the words "Original for the Trader" printed at the head thereof) properly filled out and stamped, and also at the same time to carefully ascertain whether or not the stamps attached to such certificates represent exactly the value the smouth of casa paid. Traders are requested to bear in mind that certificates of verification are of no value whatever unless stamps covering the full amoust of fees charged are attached.

3. Owners and holders of these official certificates are specially requested to keep them carefully for two years, and in order to secure their safe keeping it would, be advisable to placard them in their places of business in the manner is which ordinary licessee certificates are done, for

t must be distinctly understood that all traders who are unable to produce their properly tamped certificates when asked to do so by an aspector or assistant inspector may, in all robability, have to pay over again their verification fees.
