### ROSEBERY MAY STRIKE OUT

MARQUET'S BUDGET CURVES TOO MUCH FOR THE LIBERALS.

To-Morrow on the Second Reading the Government Relies on a Bare Majority of Nine Liberals and Parliamentarians to Declare They Cannot Support the Bill

LONDON, May 8.—The Parliament has decided to vote today against the second reading of the Budget bill, three or four Liberals intend to abstain from voting and three Nationalists, are ill. In addition, the Government anticipates the defection of William Sanders, a Radical, and James Keir Hardie.

Thus it is that the Government is relying upon a majority of nine votes only. The Conservatives predict that the Government will be unable to carry the Budget bill through its committee stage, where its fate is believed to rest. The Conservatives also predict that if the Budget bill is carried, it will be defeated on a second reading.

Canadian securities yesterday closed somewhat steadier. There was comparatively little stock for sale, and Toronto operators took fresh courage. A rumor that one of the small brokers in Montreal was in a tight place produced the unsettled feeling on Monday.

There is a likelihood that in the near future the stock of the Toronto Street Railway Company will be listed on the local exchange. Present quotations of this stock are from 50 to 55.

May wheat sold in Chicago yesterday at 56 1/2, the lowest price this option has ever sold at. Prices of wheat are low that is dangerous to sell, but there is on the other hand, little inducement to buy.

Mr. R. H. Greene, of a cheese, McLaren & Co., wholesale boots and shoes, has been proposed for membership in the Toronto Board of Trade.

The liabilities of the 21 failures reported in the Dominion in the week of April 28, says R. G. Dun & Co., aggregate \$84,067, of which \$29,935 was in manufacturing industries, and \$54,132 in trading concerns.

It is estimated that the condition of winter wheat in the States will be 3.3 per cent, 3.5 higher than in April.

Canadian bonds are higher in London. Toronto 3 1/2's are quoted at 92, Montreal 3's at 81 and Canada 3's at 89 1/2.

The fortnightly settlements on London Stock Exchange will begin to-morrow.

Manitoba sold in New York to-day at 100 1/4. Montreal funds are 10c per thousand discount.

At New York \$200,000 in gold was engaged to-day for export on Thursday. Shipments, however, are not expected to be heavy this week.

The United States Treasury gold reserve within a week has fallen \$2,000,000 to \$24,000,000, after the export of gold this year aggregated \$24,000,000.
