THE YEAR ENDING IN THE POSTAL SAVINGS BANK.

27,000,000 New Accounts Opened and Nearly \$27,000,000 in Deposits
The Postal Savings Bank for the year ending June 30, 1916, has closed with a record that is a credit to the institution. The total amount of new accounts opened during the year was 27,000,000, and the total amount of deposits received was \$27,000,000. This represents an increase of 100 per cent over the year ending June 30, 1915, when only 135,000 new accounts were opened and the total amount of deposits received was \$27,000,000.

Cost of Management
The system was established in 1887, with 81 postoffice savings banks. The following year there were 231 banks, and in 1894 there were 1,000. The system cost to manage that year 0.67 per cent of the total amount in the banks. In 1894 the cost was 0.24 per cent, or \$35,751. In 1916 the cost of management was 0.35 per cent, or \$9,450,000. Shanghai, Aug. 3.—The Shanghai Express prints a telegram from Foo Chow under the date of Aug. 3, reporting a Chinese massacre at Kucheng in the Province of Kansu Sinkiang. Among those murdered were five Chinese women.

Curious State of Affairs Will Exist in Event of the Queen's Demise
London, Aug. 4.—The Attorney-General and legal advisers of the Government are in a curious state of affairs in connection with the death of the Queen. The act of 1892 which provided that the Queen's death should be followed by a regency for six months after the demise of the monarch. This applied to Scotland and Wales, but not to England and Wales. A clause referring to the regency was inserted in the Bill of 1892, but it was not passed. Hence, in the event of the Queen's death, the regency would have to be provided for by a new act of Parliament.

Large Apple Crop in Britain
May, Oats and Wheat Are Short, Potatoes a Moderate Average
London, Aug. 4.—England has this year the largest apple crop that has been seen for many years. In all the European countries the crop is larger than usual, with the exception of France, where the crop is only good. The average production in oats and wheat there is 25 per cent below the average production in 1915. The average production of potatoes is 10 per cent below the average production in 1915.
