Education and Agriculture

At the meeting held at Guelph last night in connection with the Ontario Provincial Winter Fair, Col. Matheson and President Falconer strongly emphasixed the imprrtance of education, and urged the payment of higher sal aries for teachers in rural districts. It was well, they said, to pay great attention to the breeding of live stock. but the training of children was of still higher importance. This is sound doc trine, and the place and time were well chosen for driving it home.

It must not be supposed, nor did these speakers suggest, that the two objects' are conflicting. On the contrary, there is the closest relation between them. Agriculture is becoming an occupation for educated men. should have prevailed, but it undoubtedly did prevail at one time. Agri culture was long regarded as a dreary and monotonous business, in which there was little scope for the work of a trained intellect, and there was a disposition to scoff at scientific agriculture as a fad. Agricaltural colleges, experimental farms, Governmeutal reports and bulletins have done much to destroy this strangely wrong and stupid conception. The farm is-now taking its true place as a place of deep and varied interest, and a worthy subject of scientific research. terest with the grains and fruits and roots which come under the farmer's care ? The farmer ought to be, and in many cases is, a lifelong student, a man whose work of scientific research ends only with the close of his life.

It is not necessary that agriculture in the technical sense should be taught in rural schools, but these schools can do much to impress upon the childish mind the dignity and importance of agriculture, and the advantage of applying a trained intellect to its problems. The school education will be regarded, not as something apart from the daily work of life, but as connected with it in the closest way, as affording the means of enriching and enobling it, and placing it in its true position of equality with the highest professions and callings .-





The Price of Ontario Wheat.

Our farmers are more to blame than anyone else for the present low price of Ontario wheat. When Western wheat first lecame a competitor of our Ontario grain our farmers made no effort to keep the intruder out. Instead of fighting against the introduction of Manitoba patent flours, they bought Western flours. Naturally, Ontario wheat was neglected, many mills closed down, and the demand for Ontario wheat became nil. Yet our farmers complain that there is no money in wheat.

There is good money in wheat, and our farmers can get it out by forcing up the prices. Since our millers have perfected blended flours there is no reason why our farmers should buy Western flours. Blended flours (containing Ontario wheat and a small quantity of Manitoba wheat) are better, both for bread and pastry, than any flour milled of a single kind of wheat. One of the leading bakeries of Toronto has tried out the blended flours, and it has been the means of doubling and trebling their business on "home-made bread." In the Mari-time Provinces blended flours are capturing the market and have driven "Western hard patent flours" out of many stores entirely.

What our farmers should do is to stop spending their money for Western flour and by blending flours milled by our own millers of our own Ontario wheat. In this way the money which now goes to the wheat growers in Manitoba and Alberta would stay right here at home. And as the de-mand for blended flours increases, the demand for Ontario wheat will increase and higher prices will be obtained for their crops by the farmers.

It is the farmers' fault too, that

dairymen and stockmen are paying such high prices for bran and shorts. When our mills do not grind much grain there is a corresponding shortage in the amount of bran, etc., for sale. Those who keep cattle and horses must get their feed from Manitoba and Alberta, where there is plenty of wheat raised, and where the mills are grinding out great quantities of feed. With a good healthy demand for blended flours, our mills will be running to their full capacity, plenty of bran and shorts would be produced and with no freight charges to pay, the prices would necessarily go

High Court of Justice.

The non-jury sittings of the High Court of Just opened at the court house, Sarnia, on Thursday, Dec. 12th, at 2 o'clock, before His Lordship Chief Justice Falconbridge.

Only one case came before the court being that of Edwards vs. McKay. The plaintiff, John Edwards, is a meat curer of Collingwood, defendant is a cattle dealer and lives in Sarnia, and during the years 1901 and 1902, the plaintiff and defendant had certain transactions in cattle and other matters, which according to the plaintiff, resulted in leaving the defendant indebted to the plaintiff to the amount of \$1,339.29. The action was to have been tried at Barrie, but the venue was afterwards changed to Sarnia. The case was referred to Judge MacWatt as local master, but later was settled between the parties; plaintiff accepting \$275 in tull of all claims. John Birnie, K. C., Collingwood, for plaintiff; Hanna, LeSueur & Co., for defendants. Only one case came before the court The reference of this action to the Local Master closed the business of the Court, which rose after having been in session a little more than twenty minutes.

Chief Use of Cobalt.

The principal use of cobalt, says the American Methodist, is in coloring glass. It has the property of coloring glass blue. The oxids is used for this purpose, and is melted with the glass, which dissolves it and is colored by it. The other uses of cobalt are small, although attempts are being made to use it in storage battery work. This, however, can hardly be said to have passed beyond the experimental stage. The principal supply of cobalt until recently bas been from Saxony, but the new discoveries of the large quantities in Ontario may be the means of opening fields for new domestic uses of cobalt heretofore unsought on account of the distant sources.

Mr. Smith presented the report of the-

Mr. Smith presented the report of the House of Refuge committee, showing the average number of inmates during the year to be 51, and the average expense of maintenance with manager's family and hiredhelp included \$1.50 per week. The committee reported that at the present time the Refuge is filled to it utmost capacity and recommended that some steps be taken at present session to provide more room, and it is at present impossible to to take in any more applicants. Tee total expenditureduring the year was \$5,628.46.

There are now 45 male and 6 female immates and the average age is 77 years. There were 44 inmates in the Refuge at the date of the last report, and 36 have since been admitted. There have been ten deathsduring the year, one inmate has been discharged, and eighteen have left the limitsduring the year, one inmate has been discharged, and eighteen have left the limitsduring the year. The number of inmates from the various municipalities is as follows—Brooke 1, Dawn 6, Eoniskillen 1, Euphemia 3, Moore 4, Sombra 7, Forest 1; Oil Springs 1, Point Edward 2, Sarnia Town 9, Watford 1, other municipalities none. The committee report no complaint from any of the inmates all of whom seem to be comfortable and contented. The food is pure and wholesome, the premises comfortable beds and bedding in excellent condition, and comfortable and contented.
