



Petrolea Advertiser:—All is not pi in a newspaper office—the Watford Guide-Advocate lost an issue because the electric melting pot on its lino-type went on strike. So many are striking these days that one can hardly blame an intelligent melting pot for following the crowd. But the worst of it was that the disk wheel, the first and second elevators and all the rest of the unions went out in sympathy.

The anthracite miners agreement has been ratified and it is expected that several hundred tons of hard coal will be on the market before the end of the week, but the normal output of two million tons a week will not be reached before the 1st of next month. Under the agreement 155,000 miners have returned to work, but it will be some weeks before much anthracite comes to Ontario, so the dealers say.
