The Late Henry S. Piper.

It has become a melancholy duty to announce the death of our esteemed townsman, Henry S. Piper, late editor, proprietor and publisher of this journal.

The deceased was the only son and the only surviving child of the gentleman named, and he too received the rudiments of education here.

In 1873, while he yet lacked some months of his majority, he formed a partnership with Mr. John E. Sanction, of this town, and having bought the plant of the Free Press office, the firm of Sanction & Piper began the publication of the Monitor, which they ran, with more or less success, until 1879—just ten years ago—when Mr. Piper became the sole proprietor, publisher and editor of that paper, having bought out his partner in the business.

With limited means, but unlimited determination to acquire increased facilities for his business, he fought the battle, in which the odds were against him, bravely and successfully. New presses, new types, and other costly materials were, from time to time, added to his office, until at his death he possessed one of the most complete offices in the province.

He was a member of the Church of England and never absent from the sanctuary, time the paper, under his management, became more and more popular; its circulation soon doubled itself; new job presses enabled him to cheapen his productions, and the work required to be done increased measurably with the increase in the circulation of his paper, until in 1882 he saw his way clear to make that important change in life which for well over half a century determines a man's destiny in the future.

In 1882 he married Miss Kate Hatch, late of Dover, N. H., and his choice proved a prize in the high life lottery, having since her marriage been a true helpmate to her late husband, at whose call her sympathetic assistance was ever ready, and her fine literary taste largely governed the choice of selected matter for the columns of the Monitor.

At the grave the rector resumed the beautiful service which had begun at the church, reading the prayers with deep

emotion. At the conclusion of this part of the ceremonial his brother Masons proceeded to their part of the solemn and affecting duty of the day. The fine ritual service by that body was then proceeded with in the form and with much solemnity. It was listened to with marked reverence by all those who heard it. At its close the casket was lowered into the grave, and hundreds of inmates were reverently dropped upon it, and a folded man's apron was deposited with them, and all was over.

The procession, as we have stated, was very large, but it did not include very many who, desiring of gaining a place in the first economies, hastened to witness the report of the cemetery. We observed people from Halifax, Kentville, Margareville, Middleton, Round Hill, Annapolis Royal, and Clementsport, in addition to those who came in from the more immediately surrounding country, who desired to show their respect at the close of a useful life which had excited their esteem and interest in their affectionate regard.

We append the following notice of our deceased friend, which we take from the Halifax Chronicle of the 30th inst. We do so the more readily because it presents a true and correct picture of the subject which failed to touch, though we entirely agree in the sentiments it expresses—

Early on Sunday morning last Henry S. Piper, editor and proprietor of the Bridgetown Monitor, passed peacefully to his rest, after a long illness, leaving a widow with two little children and a mother, together with a numerous circle of relatives and friends to mourn their bereavement.

Mr. Piper had not been ill a year, and although he had been unable for the past few months to attend strictly to business, so rapid was his decline near the last, that it was not until a very short period previous to his death that he was unable to discharge his duties. He was a man of a broad face, a broad forehead, and a broad heart, and his death had marked him for his own. He was comparatively a young man, not yet having reached his eightieth year, yet up to the time he had made a mark as a journalist not soon to be forgotten by his numerous patrons and friends who had learned to appreciate his ability in catering to the literary taste of the public.

Mr. Piper was a Liberal, but it was not in his nature to be a party man, and he adhered to the principle and carried it out with an independent impartiality. He was a man of a broad face, a broad forehead, and a broad heart, and his death had marked him for his own. He was comparatively a young man, not yet having reached his eightieth year, yet up to the time he had made a mark as a journalist not soon to be forgotten by his numerous patrons and friends who had learned to appreciate his ability in catering to the literary taste of the public.

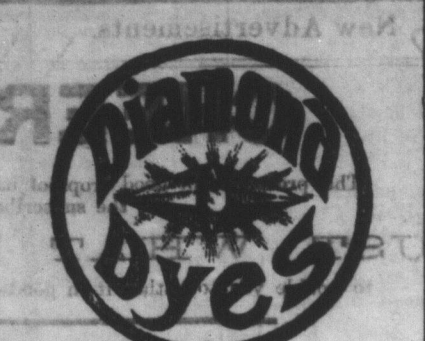

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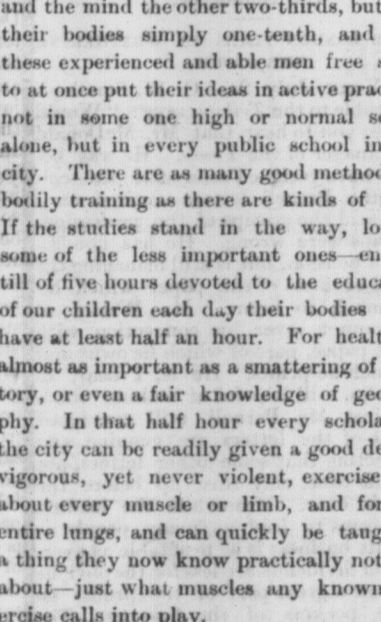

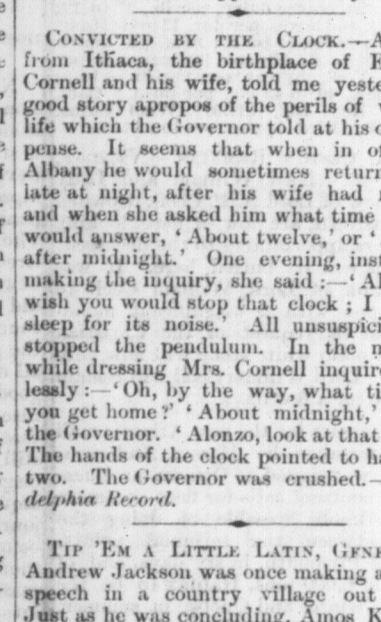
