

The Disappearance of the Male Teacher.

ECONOMY AT THE EXPENSE OF EFFICIENCY IS DEPLETING OUR COUNTRY OF OUR MALE TEACHERS.

Halifax Acadian Recorder. The Penticton, B. C., Press of a recent date has the following paragraph: For the two vacances in the teaching staff of the Penticton public school there were sixty-five applications, forty seven male and eighteen female. Out of that number eleven held the degree of M. A., and only eight d d not hold

Many of the applicants express a de-sire to come to Penticton on account of the Okanagan climate. We do not quote this item in order to induce our teachers to go West, but on the contrary to warn them that for every vacancy there may be now sixtyfive after it, indicating that the western land is filling up, and that our own people had better think twice before throwing up good opportunities

here for the chances there. But secondly it should bring home to our school boards and trustees the wisdom of paying good salaries. 
