The services on Ascension Day, 11th May, will be: Holy Communion at 8 a.m., and Morning Prayer and Holy Communion at 10.30. On the Sunday evening after Ascension Day the sermon will be preached by the Provost of Trinity College.

The Sth, 9th and 10th days of May are Rogation Days, and May 24th and 26th are Ember Days. According to the Rubric these days should be observed as fast days.

The confirmation classes have been continued all through April, and on Wednesday, 3rd May, the rite of confirmation will be administered to about twenty-five persons.

Special preachers during the month have been the Rev. the Provost of Trinity College, the Rev. Professor Clark, and Rev. E. C. Cayley.

The music and special anthems for Eastertide were all paid for by the girls of Miss E. M. Cayley's Bible Class.

The members of the Chancel Guild have undertaken to work new cushions for the altar step, as the old ones have become moth-eaten. The last meeting of the Guild took place on 2nd May, when all the cushions were divided amongst the members to finish at home.

EASTER DAY.

The Easter services were all bright and beautiful, and the sun shone all day. Within the Church the flowers were all yellow, and the effect very fresh and spring-like. The music was well rendered by the choir, and everyone much enjoyed Mrs. Houston's solos in the authem, and also during the offertory. The sermon in the morning was preached by the Rector, the Provost giving the evening sermon and assisting at all the services.

ST. AGATHA'S GUILD.

GIRLS' BRANCH OF W. A. ST. GEORGE'S.

In presenting the sixth annual report of the Girls' Auxiliary, and fourteenth annual report of St. Agatha's Guild, I beg to call attention to the progress made by the society during the year.

Twenty-eight meetings were held, with an average attendance of twenty-one out of a total membership of fifty.

On June 13th, 1898, the Guild closed for the summer with their annual tea.

On October 3rd the Guild held the first winter meeting, and a week later (October 10th) an opening service was held in the Church.

In the month of November a parlour concert was held at the home of Miso Williamson, one of our members. No admission fee was charged, a silver collection being taken up.

In Christmas week there was sent out the usual bale of goods to Mr. Hay at Murillo, Algoma. The Sunday School Christmas entertainment was also under the direction of the Guild, and the same society presented the Sunday School with the gas fixtures in the class room.

In February, the Girls' Auxiliaries of St. James' and St. Thomas' were invited to a supper in the school-house, when music and refreshments were provided.

During this month permission was asked of the Rector to have associated with the Guild a Mission band composed of the younger girls in the Parish who are attending school and unable to take up the work in the evenings; the result being a very satisfactory junior auxiliary.

On March 13th, Miss Alice Turner, matron of the Blackfoot Hospital, visited the Guild and gave an interesting account of the work among the Indians, showing some curiosities of Indian manufacture.

At the last meeting in March it was brought to the attention of the Guild that Miss Street was to be made a Life member of the Woman's Auxiliary, and the Guild, recognizing the work of Miss Street, and her interest in all the meetings, took the necessary steps to assist in bringing about this most desirable and well-merited recognition of past services.

On St. Agatha's Day, which fell on a Sunday this year, all the members of the Guild who were able to attend, received the Holy Communion.
