(v) Emergency stops for refuelling and on account of weather or other ating operating conditions may be made at Halifax and Shediac and, subject to the consent of the conse the consent of the Newfoundland Government, at Gander Lake, provided that no control of the Newfoundland Government, at these ports. that no commercial traffic is loaded or disembarked at these ports.

- (vi) The permissions may be withdrawn at any time on six months' notice.
- 2. It is understood that the Government of the United States has also sought the necessary permissions from the Governments of the United Kingdom, Ireland and Newfoundland.

It is my understanding that the United States Government will for its part and so far as it is concerned grant similar permissions in the event that applications are received by it for similar Canadian air services, needed to assist in the effective prosecution of the war, to use similar facilities in the United States, its territories or possessions.
