## IIGH'I' HOUSES.

Commissioners for Light Honses in the Bay of Fundy.-John Ward, Senior, Robert W. Cronkshank, John Ward, Junior, J. Wilsor, T Wyer, Lanchian Donaldson, W. F'. W. Owen, I. Woedward and Charles Hare, Esplires.

Cape Sable Seal Island Light.-The first Light in approaching the Bay of Fundy, is on the South Point of the Seal Island. 'This is a plain white Light, elevated about 80 feet above ligh water mark, and may be seen in approaching the Island fromany point of the compass. $\Lambda$ very dangerons rock, under water, bint upon which the sea always breaks, called Blonie Rock, lies ahont 2 miles s. S. W. by compass, from the Light Honse. Between this rock and the Istand, there are some dangers-the gronnd is rocky thronghont, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to nttempt passing between them.

Brier Island Light.-In advanciug up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, abont half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof. A plain white light.

Dighy Gat Light.- Dhe next light on the coast of Nova Scotis is placed side of the Digby Gilt-from Brier Lslaud N. E:titward. The const is vary bold and not indented; the Light is therefore chiefly intended as a gnide into Dighy Basin. The Lamps ant Lanterns were renewed in the Spring of 18:3, and reflectors firmished, so that this Light is in high order--A white Light.

Gannet Roch Light.-This Light bears from the Light on Brier Island, N. W. \& W. 21 miles. It is intended to warn vessels of their appronch to a very dangerons range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Scal Islands off Machias, a distance of abont twenty miles.

The half of the expense of the Cape Sabie and Brier Island Lights is paid by New Brunswick, as they are so highly useful to vessels trading with this Province.

West Quoddy Light.-This is an American Light, and is placed'on the West side of the entrance into the Saint Croix by Labec and Eustport; a new light house has lately been erected here, and the light much improved.

TIME FOR GOING THROUGH THE FALLS.
NEAR THE CITY OF SAINT JOIIN:
The Falls are level or still water at about three and a half hours on the flood, and about two and a half on the $c b b$, so that hey are passable four times, in twenty four hours, about ten or fifteen mihutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on lle floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to tho height of them.

Obseroations -1. The nearer the time of the moon's change, firs quarter, full and last quarter, are to midnight, the fairer will the wes ther be ouring the seven days following.
2. The space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.
3. The nearer to midday or moon, the phases of the moon happen, the more foul or wet weather may be expected during the next seven days.
4. The space for this calculation occupies from ten in the fore noon to two in the afternoon: Thesc observations refer principally to the summer, though: thęy affect spring and autumn nearly in the esme ratio.
5. The moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, happening during sis of the afternoon holrre, i. e. from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this, is mostly, dependent on the wind, as is noted in the table.
6. Though the weather, from a variety of irregular canses, is more nncertain in the latter part of autumin, the whole of winter, and the beginning of spring, yet, in the main, the above observations will apply to those periods also.
7. To prognosticate correctly, ospecially in those cases where the wind is concerned, the observer should be within sight of a good vano, where the four cardinal points of the heavens are correctly placed.

## MISCELLANEOUS.

Receipers follmaking Bafas.- This mothod of adeninistering medicines to horses and othor animals is preforable in most cnees to that of idrenches. The following are a few of the balle most commonly used by the farmer :
Milld l'hysic Ball.-Barbadoes aloes, 6 drachms; powdered ginger, 2 drnchins; castilo soap, 2 drachms; oil of cloves, 20 drops ; syrup of buekthorn sulliciont to form a bull.

Strong Physic Bull.-Barbadoes nlocn, 8 drachms; ginger, powdered, 2 iruchms; castilo soap, 2 drachms; oil of cloves, 20 drops; syrup of huckthorn sufficient to form a ball.

Calonel Ball for a Riding Horsc.-Calomel, 1 drachm; aloes, powdered, 6 drachms; ginger, powdered, it drachus; castile soap, 2 drachms; oil of cloves, 20 drops; syrup ol buckthorn sufficient to make into a ball.

Calomel Ball for a Cart Horse.-Aloes, powdered, 8 drachms; otherwise suno ds the last.

Diuretic Ball.-Castile sonp 4 ounces; nitre powdered, 2 ounces; rosin, powdered, $\mathscr{X}$ ounces ; vil of juniper, halt an omnce ; aniseod powder and treaclo sufficient to mako into cight balls.

Cordial Ball.-Cummin seed, powdered, 4 ounces; aniseed, powdered, 4 ounces ; caraway seed, powdered, 4 ounces ; liquorice powder. 4 ounces; ginger, powdered 2 ounces; honey sulticient to make into balls the size of a hen's egg.
Yienss.-In some places bean menl is mixed with other meal in making coarso bread; or the heans are boiled into a mess with fat meat, in which state they are very nutritious. Bean meal given to oxen soon makes them fit; mixed with water and given as a drink to cows, it grently inerenses their milk. A small quantity of benns is generally mixed with new wheat when ground to flour: the millens pretend that soft wheat will not grind well without beans, and they generally contrive that there shall be no deficiency in the necessary proportion. Thus a quantity of beans is converted into what is considered as wheaten flour.
The lican came originally from the Enst, and was cultivated in Egypt and Barbary in the earliest ages of which we have nny records. It spread thence into Spain and Portugal, from whence some of the best varieties have been introduced into this country. The proportion of nutritive matter in beans, compared with other grain, is, according to Einhof, as follows:-

Bots.-These area kind of worms very troublesome to horses. Bots are the larver or muggots of a species of gad-fly (the Cistrus equi). which deposits its eggs on the legs, mane, or those parts of the horse that the animal is most apt to lick. Tho egg is immediately hatched by the warmth and inoisture of the tongue, and the little worm conveyed into the mouth, whence it crawls down the oesphagus into the stomach. It adheres, to the cuticular coat of the stomach by means of little hooks, with which its mouth is furnished; and there it remains from the summer of one year to the spring of the next, nourished by the mucus of the stomach, or the food which it contains. Then having attained its full size as a maggot, it lonsens its hold, and is carried along the intestines with the other contents of the stomach, and evacuated with the fæcus. Before it drops, it generally clings for a while to the verge of the anus, and tickles and teases the horse to a very great degree. Except they exist in most unusual numbers, bots do neither good nor harm duting their residence in the stomach of the horse. It is the habitation which nature has assigned to them ; and the safety of so noble an animal as the horse would not have been compromised for the sake of a maggot and a fly. The best advice that can be given therefore is to let them alone, or at most to bo content with picking them off when they appear under the tail. There are two good reasons for this. The first is, that there is not any medicine that will expel them ; the strongest and most dangerous purgative is insufficient. The second reason is, that if the bots are lot alone they will, in due time come all away without our help or meddling. Green food however expels them readily, as does common salt in the proportion of two to four ounces to a quart of water. The most simple and efficient remedy is a quart of miik, mixed well with a quarter of a pound of honey or brown sugar, given fasting: This is much better than aloes. The following aro stated to be the symptoms ghewn by the horse when he is much infested by these insects. He loses flesh, coughs, eats sparingly, and bites his sides; at length he has a discharge from his nose; and these symptoins are followed by a stiffuess of his legs and neck, staggering, difficulty in breathing, convulsions, and death. Tho preventive means are very simple, consisting only in scraping off the eggs or nits of the fly every day.

Farm Accounts.--Let any farmer make the experiment of keeping accounts and he will find it both interesting and useful to know from year to year the actual products of his farm. Let every thing therefore which can be weighed and measured be so tested; and let that which caunot be brought to an exact standard be estimated as if he himself were about to sell or to purchase it. Let him likewise, as near as possible, measure the ground which he plants, the quantity of seed which he uses, and the manue which be applies. The labour of doing this is nothing compared with the satisfaction of having done it, and the benefits which must arrive from it. Conjoctuio, in these cases, is porfoctly wild and uncertain, varying ofien, with different individuals, almost 100 per cent. Exactress euables a man to form conclusions which may most es-

It is that alune which can give any value to his experience; it is that which will make his expericnce the sure basis of improvement ; it will put it in his power to give safe counsel to his friends; and it is the only ground on which he can securcly place confidence in himsolf:

Salt as a Manure.-- We know that plants require for their sustenance and growth a certain supply of each of the constituents of common salt, which supply in general they must obtain from the soil. If the soil in any ficld contain naturally a sufficient quantity of common salt, chlorine and sodit in any other state of combination, it will he unnecessary to add this substance; or, if added, it will produce no beneficial effect. If. on the other hand the soil contain little, and has no natural source of supply, the addition of salt may cause a considerable increase in the crop.

Now there are certain localities in which we can say beforehand that common salt is likely to be abundant in the soil. Such are the lands that lie along the sea coasts, or which are exposed to the action of prevailing winds. Over such districts the spray of the sca is constantly borne by tho winds high in tie air, from which it descends afterward in the rains. The application of common salt is moat likely to be beneficial in districts which are remota from the sea, or are sheltered from the prevailing sea winds. This consideration, it may be hoped, will induce many practical men to proceed with more confidencee in making trial of its effects on inland situations.

Some plunts are more likely to be bencfitted by the application of common salt than others Observations are still wanting to show which of our cultivated crops is most favored by it. Some crops may delight more in salt than others; and if we co.ssider how much allialine, fixed salt, matter is contained in the top and bulbs of the potato and turnip, we are almost justified in concluding that generally sali will benefit green crops inore than crops of grain, and that it will promote more the development of the leaf and stem than the filling of the ear.

If this be so, we can readily understand low a soil may already contain abundance of salt to supply the wants of one crop, and yet too little to meet the demands of another.

To bave Oats in Ferdina Horses.--Bruise or crush your oats in a nut mill, or otherwise, as convenient, and the horse will become fatter on half the usual allowance, than on double the quantity unprepared. If you cannot bruise the oats, pour hot water on them, and let them soak for a few hours.

To Find the Weiget of Cattle.-Take the girth behind the shoulder, and the length from the fore part of the shoulder-blade to the buttock, both in feet. Multiply the square of the girth by 4 times the length, and divide by 21 ; the quotient is the weight, nearly of the four quarters, in stones of 16 lb ., each lb . 17 f ounces avoirdupois.

Never keep your cattle short:-fes farmers can afford it. If you starve them they will starve you.

Curting of Grans.-It is the opinion of experienced hasband :men, that wheat shonld be colt down sone days before it is fully or deai ripe. The grain hardens well in the sheaf; the sample is bet ter: and there is nothing lost in measure by this mode of manage ment. The harvest thas begins carlier, and its labors are more easily distributed. Barley onght likewise to bo cut down before it is ripe ; otherwise the stray hecomes brittle, and much loss is occasioned by the heads breaking off. 'Ihongh oats are reckoned a hardy grain, vet the more early varieties, being liable to damage by high winds, or by exposine to much beat, onght to be cut as soua as they are nearly ripe, in oder to lessen the risks to which they aro exposed. An experienced Farmer states, that all surts of grain ought to be cat whenever the strav, immediately below the car, is so dry, that on twisting $\therefore$ no juice can be expreseed; for then the grain camot improve. as the circulation of the juice to the ear is stopped. It matters not, that the stock beiow is green. Every hour that the grain stands uncut, iffer pasing this stage, is attended with loss.

Devetic Maxims.-In summer, the food should consist principally of vegetables; in winter, a larger amont of animal matter may be Thea, especially by the laborer. Boiling renders tood more digestitha, but it deprives it of a considerable portion of its nutritive principle. Amimal food should not be orer-boiled-vegetables shonld be woiled until perfectly tender. Roasting dissipates less of the mutritive parts of the ineat. Roasted ment is, therefore, more nomrishing than bolled, but much more stimnlating. Brearl constitutes a wholesome aldition to all our meals. It should be perfect's raised, fully baked, an:d one day old. Salt, and, on occasions, a very moderate quantity of pepper, are safe and gratefnladditions to our food. Beyoud this, towever, all seasoning becomes injurious.

Tea.-In 1663, the East India Company "imported 100 pounds weight of good tey." In 1669, 14312 pounds and in 1678,-4,713 poutds; bit this proved a glat in the market. Great Britain now himorts annually about $23,000,000$ pounds of ten; and the United States, from 12 to 15 million pounds.

Fow:r of Steam--One pound of cotton, (says Mr. Gordon, in his lectures at the London Literary and Scientific Institation,) which foruserly could only be spuninto a thread of one hundred and eighty yarts long, can now, hy the application of steam, produce a thread of one hundired and sixty-seven miles in length.

Cork....Corks are formed from the dead bark of the cork tree, which is taken off at certain seasons of the year, being separated without difficulty from the portions of more recent growth. The vigor of a tree is said to be improved by being barked once every eight or ten years afier it is fifteen years old; some, which have been regnlar!'y submitted to this operation, living for 150 years.

T'en Reverse of a Dry Jore.-. A hardy seaman who had escaped one of the recent shipwrecks on onr coast, was asked by a good hady how he felt whea the waves dashed over him ; he replied--" Wet, madam, very wet."

Words. Words.-- Demaratus, king of Sparta, being asked whether he was silent through folly or wisdon, replied, "A fool camot be silent."
