### ECLIPSES OF 1846.

There will be but *two* Eclipses this year; and of course both will be of the Sun.

I. The first will be an Annular Eclipse, on Saturday, the 25th of April, and partly visible here as follows:—

Digits eclipsed,  $6^{\circ} 49'$  on Sun's southern limb.

The eclipse will begin at about  $128^{\circ}$  from the Sun's Vertex, or

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the highest point of his Disc. round on its west or right hand side. The sun will be centrally eclipsed, on the Meridian, in the vicinity of the Bahama Islands, and of the Florida States, at 0h. 17m. aft. The second also will be an Annular Eclipse, on Tuesday, the 20th of October, & at 3h. 3m. 13s., meantime, in the morning; ☽'s Lat. at true time of conjunction is 8° 22' S. ascending, or tending north; and the eclipse will, by reason of both these circumstances, be of course invisible to us.—The Sun will be centrally eclipsed, on the Meridian, in the vicinity of the Isles of Bourbon and the Mauritius, in the Indian Ocean, at 3h. 11m. morn. of our time. It will be a partially visible Eclipse at the Cape of Good Hope.

#### MORNING AND EVENING STARS OF 1846.

The Planet Venus (♀) will be the Evening Star till March 2d; then Morning Star till December 15th; then again Evening Star. Mars (♂) will be Evening Star till September 10th; then Morning Star to the end of the year.—Jupiter (♃) will be Evening Star till May 14th; then Morning Star till December 3d; then again Evening Star.—Saturn (♄) will be Evening Star till February 10th; then Morning Star till August 20th; then Evening Star to the end of the year.

## LIGHT HOUSES.

*Commissioners for Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy.*—John Ward, Senior, Robert W. Crookshank, John Ward, Junior, J. Wilson, T Wyer, Lauchlan Donaldson, W. F. W. Owen, I. Woodward and Charles Hare, Esquires.

*Cape Sable Seal Island Light.*—The first Light in approaching the Bay of Fundy, is on the South Point of the Seal Island. This is a plain white Light, elevated about 80 feet above high water mark, and may be seen in approaching the Island from any point of the compass. A very dangerous rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called *Blonde Rock*, lies about 2 miles S. S. W. by compass, from the Light House. Between this rock and the Island, there are some dangers—the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.

*Brier Island Light.*—In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof. A plain white light.

*Digby Gut Light.*—The next light on the coast of Nova Scotia is placed side of the Digby Gut—from Brier Island N. Eastward. The coast is very bold and not indented; the Light is therefore chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin. The Lamps and Lanterns were renewed in the Spring of 1835, and reflectors furnished, so that this Light is in high order.—A white Light.

*Gannet Rock Light.*—This Light bears from the Light on Brier Island, N. W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W. 21 miles. It is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles.

### *Bearings from the Gannet Rock Light House.*

- To the Old Proprietor, which dries at  $\frac{1}{2}$  ebb; (very dangerous), E. by N.  $\frac{1}{2}$  N. 7 miles.
- " Black Rock, (always above water 25 feet) off White Head, N E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E.
- " South West Head of Grand Manan, N. W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  N.
- " Northernmost of the Murr Ledges, (dry at two thir  $\frac{1}{2}$  ebb), N. W. by W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W.
- " Southernmost of ditto, called Saint Mary's Ledge, (always out of water), S. W. by W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W.
- " Machias Seal Island Lights, distant about 13 miles, W. by N.  $\frac{1}{2}$  N.

*NOTE.*—Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them always above water, and which extend Westward from the Light House about four miles; from this range, farther Westerly, about eight miles, lies a dangerous breaker called the Roaring Bull. This

may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan, open.—The red glass having been removed from the Lantern, there is now a flash light—white—twenty seconds dark and forty light in each minute.—The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical, black and white.

Two fixed white lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, were put into operation in 1832—they were elevated about forty-five feet above high water, and bear from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W. distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights upon the coast, (British or American)—the following are the bearings from them, viz:

- To the Southernmost Murr Ledge, (St. Mary's) E. S. E. easterly.
- " Gannet Rock Light, E. by S.  $\frac{1}{4}$  S. 13 miles.
- " Southern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N.  $\frac{1}{4}$  N.
- " Northern Head of Grand Manan, N. E.  $\frac{1}{4}$  E.
- " N. E. Rock, distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.
- " Little River Head, N. by W.
- " Libby Island Light House, (American,) N. W. by W.

Vessels standing into the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these Lights in one, as they will not then be more than three fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the East of the lights.

*Head Harbour Light.*—Next in order after passing Grand Manan, and the plain white Light, (American) on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of Campo Bello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main Channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; it enables vessels at all times to enter Head Harbour—it is a fixed white light.

*Point Lo Preau Lights.*—Upon this projecting head land two lights are placed, one above the other, and distant 28 feet.—Both lights can be seen from every point of the compass, where they may be useful—both are fixed and white. In consequence of orders from the Home Government, this Light was, in 1840, painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad each, horizontally, in order that it may be seen more distinctly at a distance.

*Partridge Island Light.*—This light, at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been established upwards of forty years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed white light, and that the Light House is red and white, in vertical stripes.

*Beacon Light.*—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or bar, which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a light is established, which is eminently useful to the coasting trade of Saint John, and to all other vessels having pilots on board, as it enables them to enter the harbour at all hours of the night. A fixed white light. The House is white and black, in stripes vertically.

*Cape Forchu Light.*—The Light House on Cape Forchu, on the W. side of the entrance to Yarmouth, (Nova-Scotia,) in lat. 43, 39, N. long. 66 3, West, was put in operation on the 15th January, 1840, and exhibits a plain revolving light—visible one minute and a

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quarter, and invisible half a minute. The building is painted white, and is elevated 135 feet above the level of the sea.

**Quaco.**—A revolving white light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. The Light House is painted white and red in horizontal stripes.

**Cape Enrage.**—A new Light House, nearly opposite to Apple River Harbour. A plain white light. The House is painted white, and about 120 feet above tide mark.

The half of the expense of the Cape Sable and Brier Island Lights is paid by New Brunswick, as they are so highly useful to vessels trading with this Province.

**West Quoddy Light.**—This is an American Light, and is placed on the West side of the entrance into the Saint Croix by Lubec and Eastport; a new light house has lately been erected here, and the light much improved.

*Light Houses in Nova Scotia—in addition to those previously noticed.*

**Sambro**—Sambro Island, mouth of Halifax Harbour—a fixed Light.

**Roseway**—M'Nut's Island, mouth of Shelburne Harbour—two Lights, one above the other.

**Liverpool**—Coffin's Island, mouth of Liverpool Harbour—one revolving Light.

**Canso**—Island, Gut of Canso, two Lights, one above the other.

**Halifax**—Meagher's Beach, Halifax—one Light.

**Pictou**—Entrance to Pictou Harbour—one fixed Light, for eight months in the year.

**Cross Island**—Cross Island, near Lunenburg.

**Low Point**—Entrance to Sydney Harbour—one fixed Light.

# CITY OF SAINT JOHN.

RATES OF PILOTAGE,  
*Established by a Law or Ordinance of the Common Council of the City  
of Saint John—passed July, 1835.*

Five Shillings per foot, for bringing any Ship or Vessel into the Harbour of Saint John, and mooring her into a safe place or berth, or securing her alongside of one of the Wharves; and Five Shillings per foot for removing and taking any Ship or Vessel out of the Harbour.

In cases where Pilots shall be detained on board of Vessels, under and by virtue of the Quarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from Masters of such Vessels, the sum of Ten Shillings per day, for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowance aforesaid.

Coasting Vessels, going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another, British or Foreign Steam Boats, or British Vessels drawing under six feet of water, are not compelled to take pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to the rate above mentioned.

For removing Vessels from any mooring ground to any Wharf, or from one Wharf to another Wharf, and seeing them properly moored, or secured, the following rates: For Vessels not exceeding One Hundred Tons, Seven Shillings and Sixpence; for Vessels over One Hundred and not exceeding Two Hundred Tons, Ten Shillings; for Vessels over Two Hundred and not exceeding Three Hundred Tons, Fifteen Shillings; and for all Vessels over Three Hundred Tons, the sum of Twenty Shillings.

*First Distance.—From Partridge Island to Musquash Cove Head, bearing North West, Five Shillings per foot.*

*Second Distance.—From Musquash Head to Point LePraux, bearing North West, Six Shillings and Threepence per foot.*

*Third Distance.—From Point LePraux to North Head of Grand Manan, bearing North West—or North Channel, bearing South East, Seven Shillings and Sixpence per foot.*

*Fourth Distance.—From the North Head of Grand Manan—or North Channel as aforesaid—to Machias Seal Island, bearing South, Eight Shillings and Ninepence per foot.*

*Fifth Distance.—Any where outside the aforesaid distance, Ten Shillings per foot.*

## HARBOUR MASTER'S FEES.

On Vessels of 30 Tons and under 50, 2s. 6d.; Vessels of 50 Tons and under 75, 3s. 9d.; 75 and under 100 tons, 5s.; 100 and under 150 tons, 6s. 3d.; 150 and under 200 tons, 7s. 6d.; 200 and under 300 tons, 10s.; 300 and under 400 tons, 12s. 6d.; 400 tons and upwards, 15s.; Decked Vessels, under 100 tons, owned and registered at Saint John, and all British Vessels under that tonnage trading within the Bay of Fundy, or arriving from Ports to the Northward of Cape Cod, or the Westward of Cape Causo, or from any Port in Nova Scotia, to pay annually as follows: Under 30 tons, 3s. 9d.; over 30 and under 50 tons, 5s.; over 50 and under 75 tons, 6s.; over 75 and under 100 tons, 10s.

## RATES OF SLIPPAGE AT THE CORPORATION SLIPS.

All Decked Vessels, same rates as for Wharfage; Wood Boats—Three half-pence for every Ton burthen, and allowed to remain six days each trip, for the purpose of discharging: if they remain longer to pay One Penny per ton additional for each day. No Boat to remain longer than twenty days.

## RATES OF FERRIAGE.

*Between St. John and Carlton—from Ferry Landing at the foot of Princess street to the Landing at the end of Rodney street, in Carlton—and to the Landing at Sand Point, called Steam Ferry.*

Every grown person, 3d.; Children under 14 years of age, 1½d.: every Horse, 3d.; every Ox, Cow, or other large animal, 4d.; every Calf, Swine, Sheep, Lamb, or Goat, 1d.; every Waggon, Cart, Sled, Carriage, or other Vehicle, (loaded or not loaded with goods) usually drawn by cattle. 3d.; every Hand Cart, Sled, or Wheelbarrow, 1d.; every Barrel, 1½d.; every Pipe, Hogshead, or Puncheon, 9d.; every Cask of Lime, 3d.; every Firkin, Keg, or Small Box, not exceeding in size a Firkin, 1d.; Grain, Salt, Potatoes, Turnips, or Vegetables, usually sold by the bushel, per bushel, 4d.; Iron, Steel, Copper, and the like, per cwt. 1d. And the rates of Ferriage for the Short Ferry, so called, and also for Ferriage across the Steam Ferry, so called, when the Steamer is lying by to clean boilers, or other circumstances preventing the plying of the Steam Ferry Boat, as follow, viz.:—Foot Passengers, 3d.; Two Horses, with Waggon or Stage, 2s. 6d.; One Horse and Gig, Sleigh, Sled, Cart, or Waggon, 1s 6d.; an Ox, Horse, or Cow, 1s.; Swine, 5d.; a Sheep, 4d.; a Barrel of Flour, 3d.; a Keg of Powder, 3d.

## RATES AT THE PUBLIC WEIGHING MACHINES.

Every Load not exceeding 1000 lbs. weight, One Shilling; and One Penny for every additional cwt.; payable, half by the seller, and half by the purchaser.

## PUBLIC PORTERS AND HAND CART MEN.

For loading, carrying, and housing any goods, or any other articles, on any Hand Cart, from the Market Slip in King's and Queen's Wards, or from any other place within the limits of the first district, to any other place within the said several Five districts, the rates of prices are as follow:—For the first district 3d.; second district 3½d.; third district 4d.; fourth district 4½d.; fifth district, 5d.

#### TIME FOR GOING THROUGH THE FALLS.

##### NEAR THE CITY OF SAINT JOHN.

The Falls are level or still water at about three and a half hours on the *flood*, and about two and a half on the *ebb*, so that they are passable four times in twenty four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

This table and the accompanying remarks are the result of many years' actual observation, the whole being constructed on a due consideration of the attraction of the sun and moon, in their several positions respecting the earth, and will by simple inspection show the observer what kind of weather will most probably follow the entrance of the moon into any of its quarters, and that so near the truth as to be seldom or never found to fail.

*Observations* —1. The nearer the time of the moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, are to *midnight*, the fairer will the weather be during the seven days following.

2. The space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

3. The nearer to *midday* or *noon*, the phases of the moon happen, the more foul or wet weather may be expected during the next seven days.

4. The space for this calculation occupies from ten in the forenoon to two in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to the summer, though they affect spring and autumn nearly in the same ratio.

5. The moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, happening during six of the afternoon hours, i. e. from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the *wind*, as is noted in the table.

6. Though the weather, from a variety of irregular causes, is more uncertain in the latter part of autumn, the whole of winter, and the beginning of spring, yet, in the main, the above observations will apply to those periods also.

7. To prognosticate correctly, especially in those cases where the *wind* is concerned, the observer should be within sight of a good *vane*, where the four cardinal points of the heavens are correctly placed.

## MISCELLANEOUS.

**RECEIPTS FOR MAKING BALLS.**—This method of administering medicines to horses and other animals is preferable in most cases to that of drenches. The following are a few of the balls most commonly used by the farmer :

**Mild Physic Ball.**—Barbadoes aloes, 6 drachms; powdered ginger, 2 drachms; castile soap, 2 drachms; oil of cloves, 20 drops; syrup of buckthorn sufficient to form a ball.

**Strong Physic Ball.**—Barbadoes aloes, 8 drachms; ginger, powdered, 2 drachms; castile soap, 2 drachms; oil of cloves, 20 drops; syrup of buckthorn sufficient to form a ball.

**Calomel Ball for a Riding Horse.**—Calomel, 1 drachm; aloes, powdered, 6 drachms; ginger, powdered, 2 drachms; castile soap, 2 drachms; oil of cloves, 20 drops; syrup of buckthorn sufficient to make into a ball.

**Calomel Ball for a Cart Horse.**—Aloes, powdered, 8 drachms; otherwise same as the last.

**Diuretic Ball.**—Castile soap 4 ounces; nitre powdered, 2 ounces; rosin, powdered, 2 ounces; oil of juniper, half an ounce; aniseed powder and treacle sufficient to make into eight balls.

**Cordial Ball.**—Cummin seed, powdered, 4 ounces; aniseed, powdered, 4 ounces; caraway seed, powdered, 4 ounces; liquorice powder, 4 ounces; ginger, powdered 2 ounces; honey sufficient to make into balls the size of a hen's egg.

**BEANS.**—In some places bean meal is mixed with other meal in making coarse bread; or the beans are boiled into a mess with fat meat, in which state they are very nutritious. Bean meal given to oxen soon makes them fat; mixed with water and given as a drink to cows, it greatly increases their milk. A small quantity of beans is generally mixed with new wheat when ground to flour: the millers pretend that soft wheat will not grind well without beans, and they generally contrive that there shall be no deficiency in the necessary proportion. Thus a quantity of beans is converted into what is considered as wheaten flour.

The bean came originally from the East, and was cultivated in Egypt and Barbary in the earliest ages of which we have any records. It spread thence into Spain and Portugal, from whence some of the best varieties have been introduced into this country. The proportion of nutritive matter in beans, compared with other grain, is, according to Einhof, as follows:—

**Bots.**—These are a kind of worms very troublesome to horses. Bots are the larvæ or maggots of a species of gad-fly (the *Estrus equi*), which deposits its eggs on the legs, mane, or those parts of the horse that the animal is most apt to lick. The egg is immediately hatched by the warmth and moisture of the tongue, and the little worm conveyed into the mouth, whence it crawls down the oesophagus into the stomach. It adheres, to the cuticular coat of the stomach by means of little hooks, with which its mouth is furnished; and there it remains from the summer of one year to the spring of the next, nourished by the mucus of the stomach, or the food which it contains. Then having attained its full size as a maggot, it loosens its hold, and is carried along the intestines with the other contents of the stomach, and evacuated with the faeces. Before it drops, it generally clings for a while to the verge of the anus, and tickles and teases the horse to a very great degree. Except they exist in most unusual numbers, bots do neither good nor harm during their residence in the stomach of the horse. It is the habitation which nature has assigned to them; and the safety of so noble an animal as the horse would not have been compromised for the sake of a maggot and a fly. The best advice that can be given therefore is to let them alone, or at most to be content with picking them off when they appear under the tail. There are two good reasons for this. The first is, that there is not any medicine that will expel them; the strongest and most dangerous purgative is insufficient. The second reason is, that if the bots are left alone they will, in due time come all away without our help or meddling. Green food however expels them readily, as does common salt in the proportion of two to four ounces to a quart of water. The most simple and efficient remedy is a quart of milk, mixed well with a quarter of a pound of honey or brown sugar, given fasting. This is much better than aloes. The following are stated to be the symptoms shewn by the horse when he is much infested by these insects. He loses flesh, coughs, eats sparingly, and bites his sides; at length he has a discharge from his nose; and these symptoms are followed by a stiffness of his legs and neck, staggering, difficulty in breathing, convulsions, and death. The preventive means are very simple, consisting only in scraping off the eggs or nits of the fly every day.

**FARM ACCOUNTS.**—Let any farmer make the experiment of keeping accounts and he will find it both interesting and useful to know from year to year the actual products of his farm. Let every thing therefore which can be weighed and measured be so tested; and let that which cannot be brought to an exact standard be estimated as if he himself were about to sell or to purchase it. Let him likewise, as near as possible, measure the ground which he plants, the quantity of seed which he uses, and the manure which he applies. The labour of doing this is nothing compared with the satisfaction of having done it, and the benefits which must arrive from it. Conjecture, in these cases, is perfectly wild and uncertain, varying often, with different individuals, almost 100 per cent. Exactness enables a man to form conclusions which may most es-

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sentially, and in innumerable ways avail to his advantage. It is that alone which can give any value to his experience; it is that which will make his experience the sure basis of improvement; it will put it in his power to give safe counsel to his friends; and it is the only ground on which he can securely place confidence in himself.

**SALT AS A MANURE.**—We know that plants require for their sustenance and growth a certain supply of each of the constituents of common salt, which supply in general they must obtain from the soil. If the soil in any field contain naturally a sufficient quantity of common salt, chlorine and soda in any other state of combination, it will be unnecessary to add this substance; or, if added, it will produce no beneficial effect. If on the other hand the soil contain little, and has no natural source of supply, the addition of salt may cause a considerable increase in the crop.

Now there are certain localities in which we can say beforehand that common salt is likely to be abundant in the soil. Such are the lands that lie along the sea coasts, or which are exposed to the action of prevailing winds. Over such districts the spray of the sea is constantly borne by the winds high in the air, from which it descends afterward in the rains. The application of common salt is most likely to be beneficial in districts which are remote from the sea, or are sheltered from the prevailing sea winds. This consideration, it may be hoped, will induce many practical men to proceed with more confidence in making trial of its effects on inland situations.

Some plants are more likely to be benefitted by the application of common salt than others. Observations are still wanting to show which of our cultivated crops is most favored by it. Some crops may delight more in salt than others; and if we consider how much *alkaline*, fixed salt, matter is contained in the top and bulbs of the potato and turnip, we are almost justified in concluding that generally salt will benefit green crops more than crops of grain, and that it will promote more the development of the leaf and stem than the filling of the ear.

If this be so, we can readily understand how a soil may already contain abundance of salt to supply the wants of one crop, and yet too little to meet the demands of another.

**TO SAVE OATS IN FEEDING HORSES.**—Bruise or crush your oats in a nut mill, or otherwise, as convenient, and the horse will become fatter on half the usual allowance, than on double the quantity unprepared. If you cannot bruise the oats, pour hot water on them, and let them soak for a few hours.

**TO FIND THE WEIGHT OF CATTLE.**—Take the girth behind the shoulder, and the length from the fore part of the shoulder-blade to the buttock, both in feet. Multiply the square of the girth by 4 times the length, and divide by 21; the quotient is the weight, nearly of the four quarters, in stones of 16 lb., each lb. 17½ ounces avoirdupois.

Never keep your cattle short:—few farmers can afford it. If you starve them they will starve you.

**CUTTING OF GRAIN.**—It is the opinion of experienced husbandmen, that wheat should be cut down some days before it is fully or dead ripe. The grain hardens well in the sheaf; the sample is better; and there is nothing lost in measure by this mode of management. The harvest thus begins earlier, and its labors are more easily distributed. Barley ought likewise to be cut down before it is ripe; otherwise the straw becomes brittle, and much loss is occasioned by the heads breaking off. Though oats are reckoned a hardy grain, yet the more early varieties, being liable to damage by high winds, or by exposure to much heat, ought to be cut as soon as they are nearly ripe, in order to lessen the risks to which they are exposed. An experienced Farmer states, that all sorts of grain ought to be cut whenever the straw, immediately below the ear, is so dry, that on twisting it, no juice can be expressed; for then the grain cannot improve, as the circulation of the juice to the ear is stopped. It matters not, that the stock below is green. Every hour that the grain stands uncut, after passing this stage, is attended with loss.

**DIETETIC MAXIMS.**—In summer, the food should consist principally of vegetables; in winter, a larger amount of animal matter may be taken, especially by the laborer. Boiling renders food more digestible, but it deprives it of a considerable portion of its nutritive principle. Animal food should not be over-boiled—vegetables should be boiled until perfectly tender. Roasting dissipates less of the nutritive parts of the meat. Roasted meat is, therefore, more nourishing than boiled, but much more stimulating. Bread constitutes a wholesome addition to all our meals. It should be perfectly raised, fully baked, and one day old. Salt, and, on occasions, a very moderate quantity of pepper, are safe and grateful additions to our food. Beyond this, however, all seasoning becomes injurious.

**TEA.**—In 1668, the East India Company “imported 100 pounds weight of good tey.” In 1669, 143½ pounds and in 1678,—4,713 pounds; but this proved a glut in the market. Great Britain now imports annually about 23,000,000 pounds of tea; and the United States, from 12 to 15 million pounds.

**POWER OF STEAM.**—One pound of cotton, (says Mr. Gordon, in his lectures at the London Literary and Scientific Institution,) which formerly could only be spun into a thread of one hundred and eighty yards long, can now, by the application of steam, produce a thread of *one hundred and sixty-seven miles in length*.

**CORK.**—Corks are formed from the dead bark of the cork tree, which is taken off at certain seasons of the year, being separated without difficulty from the portions of more recent growth. The vigor of a tree is said to be improved by being barked once every eight or ten years after it is fifteen years old; some, which have been regularly submitted to this operation, living for 150 years.

**THE REVERSE OF A DRY JOKE.**—A hardy seaman who had escaped one of the recent shipwrecks on our coast, was asked by a good lady how he felt when the waves dashed over him; he replied—“Wet, madam, very wet.”

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
