**COYOTE JUMPED** A HIGH FENCE

Animal Was Frightened by a Bull Dog and Escaped

From Owner's Yard.

A full grown coyote, the size of a collie dog, escaped from the premises of John Gilchrist, 455 Palmerston avenue, Tuesday night, and the owner has heard no trace of it since. It is quite slimly built and possesses a coat
