## NATIONAL EDUCATION PLAN OF REVOLUTIONARY NATURE ASQUITH'S COMING REFORM

Viscount Haldane, in Making  
Official Announcement,  
Brands Existing System of  
Education as Chaotic—  
Education Expenses, Which  
Will Be Heavy, Will Be  
Borne by State.

LONDON, Jan. 10.—(Can. Press.)—The government has decided that the next great work in its program of social reform, to be undertaken as soon as the home rule, the Welsh disestablishment and the franchise reform bills are disposed of, will be a colossal scheme for improvement in elementary, secondary and higher education. This important announcement was made tonight on the authority of Premier Asquith and Chancellor of the Exchequer David Lloyd George, by Viscount Haldane, the lord high chancellor, at a political meeting in Manchester. Viscount Haldane said the existing system of education was chaotic and must be altered. It would be an expensive problem to handle and the expense must not be borne by the taxpayers. It would be absolutely necessary, "if our productive power is to be maintained in comparison with that of our rivals," he added.

Rebuke to Lloyd George.  
The announcement which apparently points to a scheme for national education at the expense of the state, particularly as a defeat of the Lloyd George section of the cabinet, which has been endeavoring to make the land question the government's next task. The explanation given by the ministerialists is that the land question cannot be dealt with until the land valuation scheme undertaken in David Lloyd George's famous budget is completed and that this will require at least another couple of years.

## KEEP THE BOYS ON THE FARM

Scarboro Farmers Discuss the  
Problem—Hydro Power to  
Be Explained on Monday.

At the last meeting of the Scarboro Farmers' Club the question of keeping the boys on the farm was under discussion. A good deal of interest was shown, and the attendance showed that this is an important problem with the Scarboro farmers. A number of ideas were offered pro and con and everyone went away feeling considerably enlightened.

## TOO MANY BABIES MURDERED IN TORONTO

Coroner Young Says Practice  
Is Too Prevalent and if It Is  
To Be Stopped the Culprits  
Must Be Discovered and  
Punished—Third Case in  
Ten Weeks.

"That the deceased came to his death on or about Dec. 11, 1912. The evidence goes to show that the child was born alive, and came to his death, not as a result of natural causes, but was deliberately and unlawfully murdered, by some person or persons unknown."

The above was the verdict delivered last night by Coroner Young's jury, empanelled to enquire into the circumstances surrounding the death of the two children found dead in one of the confessional boxes in St. Patrick's Church, McCaul street, on Wednesday, Dec. 11, 1912.

The only witness called last night was Catherine Maroney, 45 Anderson street, whose duty it has been for the past three months, to sweep the church. On Monday, Dec. 9, the witness swept and otherwise cleaned the confessional box, in which the children were found, and they were not there at that time. She could throw no light on the crime.

A Deplorable Act.  
Dr. Young, in his address to the jury, called attention to the fact that this is the third case of this kind that has happened in Toronto within the past ten weeks, a most deplorable fact, one that casts a most unpleasant reflection on Toronto. Referring to the evidence of the priest of St. Patrick's Church, who found the children, and who were heard at the last sitting, Dr. Young said that it was a delicate matter to question a priest of the Catholic Church, owing to the vows, by which they are bound with regard to the secrecy of the confessional, but that they had given their evidence in a straightforward manner, and that it should be taken as the truth. He then explained to the jury that one of the children had never lived, but that the other one had, and that the postmortem examination had proved that the child had not died from natural causes, but as a result of foul means. It might have been killed in one of two ways, he explained; either at the time of birth or after birth, by suffocation.

## Grain-Growers Oppose Naval Policy

BRANDON, Man., Jan. 10.—(Can. Press.)—With but five votes cast against it, the convention of the Manitoba Grain Growers' Association today adopted a resolution opposing the expenditure of thirty-five million dollars or any other sum on naval armaments, suggesting instead that Canada should give the lead to the nations of the world for disarmament and universal arbitration of international difficulties, and declaring that before the parliament of Canada vote any money for expenditure such expenditure should be referred to the people of Canada by referendum.

## SCORES PREMIER FOR CHANGE OF PLAN

Hon. Mackenzie King Gave a  
Vigorous Speech in Favor  
of Canada Fleet Units and  
Attacked Rt. Hon. R. L.  
Borden For "Invention of  
Emergency."

"If the Borden government wishes to change a policy which was unanimously favored in the house in 1909, it should show conclusively the reason for the change. In the face of the unanimous vote of both parties in parliament four years ago for the establishment of Canadian fleet units, and the change of the attitude of the Conservatives in favor of a contribution, the question should be submitted to the people."

Such was the statement of Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, ex-minister of labor and president of the Ontario Reform Association, to an overflow audience in Association Hall last night, in a vigorous address on the naval question. The speaker's chief worry was why the emergency which was the basis of the Borden government's policy had not really existed. Mr. King was well armed with blue books, from which he quoted lengthy passages showing the attitude of the British admiralty, the former and present attitude of Right Hon. R. L. Borden and the attitude of the Liberal party. He said that the explanation for the premier's present stand was to be found in "the unfortunate and unparliamentary alliance which Mr. Borden made with the Nationalists of Quebec." Whereupon the Liberal audience liberally applauded.

No Danger of War.  
Mr. King first of all tackled the question of "emergency." He endeavored to convince the audience that there was no danger of war, the German invasion scare having died years ago. He succeeded in convincing a large number of people in the centre of the hall, who, by their applause, backed up the view that there was every necessity of an immediate contribution to the British navy of the three super-dreadnoughts. The speaker went on.

## SOUTH POLE HERO AT WASHINGTON

Capt. Amundsen's Narration  
of Exploit Is Received  
With Much Enthusiasm.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—(Can. Press.)—In a quiet, unostentatious manner Captain Roald Amundsen, Norwegian discoverer of the South Pole, told of his remarkable feat here tonight in a lecture before the National Geographic Society, which at its annual banquet tomorrow night will present the intrepid explorer with a special medal in appreciation of his achievement. Captain Amundsen arrived in the U.S. at noon today, and hurried from New York to Washington to tell an American audience for the first time of his antarctic trip.

"I was walking ahead of the little caravan," said Captain Amundsen, in telling of the final reaching of the South Pole. "All of a sudden I heard all the sledge drivers cry out in unison. I knew what it meant. It meant that the last problem in polar discovery had been solved."

## Telegraph Rates Next to Be Probed

OTTAWA, Jan. 10.—(Special.)—Second only in interest to the probe which is being held into freight rates discrimination against the west is the telegraph rates case which, it is announced, will be resumed before the railway commission on Feb. 10.

## SERIOUS FIRE ON BIG LINER

Carthaginian Reaches St.  
John's in Safety After Experi-  
ence Which Tried Nerves  
of All Those on Board.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Jan. 10.—(Can. Press.)—A narrow escape from destruction from fire and severe experiences by passengers and crew were reported by the Allan line steamer Carthaginian, which arrived here tonight from Liverpool. The steamer left Liverpool Dec. 28 for St. John's, Halifax, N.S., and Philadelphia. Capt. McKillop said that when she was three days out her cargo caught fire in some unexplained manner.

## MONEY KINGS NEED CURB BIG FINANCIER ADMITS IT

Centralization of Money and  
Credit Has Gone Far Enough,  
Says Morgan Associate.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—(C. Press.)—That the present concentration of money and credit, "has gone far enough," that "in bad hands, it would have a bad effect on the nation; that the safety of the situation lies in the personnel of the men in control; and that present conditions are "not entirely comfortable for the country," were a few of the statements today by Geo. F. Baker, master financier, as the climax of two days' examination before the house money trust committee. But Mr. Baker declared that "bad hands" could not retain the control.

## SENDING AID TO POLE EXPLORERS

Norwegian Government Authorizes Expedition For  
Success of German Party in  
Antarctic Regions.

CHRISTIANIA, Jan. 10.—(Can. Press.)—The Norwegian Government has guaranteed the expenses of a relief expedition to Spitzbergen for the German explorers under Lieut. Schröder Stranz, who started out last year in the steamer Herzog Ernest, and are reported to be in dire straits. Manager Mansfield of an American coal company at Green Harbor, tried to organize a relief party, but found the conditions rendered sending succor to the explorers from his station impossible.

The last advice from the expedition came recently from Cape Ritchel, who reached Advent Bay in a deplorable condition, and seeking aid. He said the condition of the expedition was most serious. Lieut. Schröder Stranz and two companions had not been heard of since August 15, when they left the remainder of the party for a sledge journey.

## A CALL TO FIGHT IMPURITIES IN MILK

Better to Prevent the White  
Plague by Rigorous Inspection  
to Build Hospitals for Con-  
sumptives, Says Dr. Tor-  
rance.

KINGSTON, Jan. 10.—(Special.)—"We keep on giving out money for tuberculosis hospitals, and put forth every effort possible to cure patients, and on the other hand, allow the sale of milk which is carrying disease. It is high time we tried to prevent the disease," stated Dr. T. Torrance, veterinary director general of live stock, Ottawa, in closing an address to the Eastern Ontario Dairymen's Association, in which he made startling statements regarding the spreading of tuberculosis among cattle, particularly among dairy cattle, which were more exposed to infection on account of having to be more closely housed, if not because hogs were fed on by-products of milk.

Slaughter house statistics showed a high percentage of tuberculosis. Some counties went as high as 20 per cent. Frontenac County was one of the lowest, with a percentage of 5.19. Pasteurization of skim milk would prevent infection of hogs from disease.

The time had arrived when no person should be allowed to sell milk until cattle had been examined to see if they were infected with the dread disease.

## FOREMAN ACCIDENTALLY SHOT

John Brooks Killed at Lindsay While  
Examining Gas.

LINDSAY, Jan. 10.—(Special.)—John Brooks, government works foreman, residing on Regent st., in this town, fatally shot himself with a muzzle-loading gun this afternoon. Mr. Brooks was alone in his home and when found he lay in one hand and the other in the other. It is believed the charge was purely an accident. He was 48 years of age and highly respected. A grown-up family of five survive him.

## In Second Report Presented to Mayor Hocken, Commis- sioner Harris Says First Figures of Leakage Should Be Doubled—More Con- sternation and Special Meet- ing Called For Today.

The filtration plant leakage is double that which was reported by R. C. Harris, commissioner of works, on Thursday. Mr. Harris submitted another report to the mayor yesterday afternoon which was even of a more startling nature than his previous one, in which he stated that the leakage amounted to 1,487,880 gallons per twenty-four hours. Owing to a mistake in computation the correct figure was not given. The commissioner of works states in his latest report that the leakage is really 2,975,760 gallons per day.

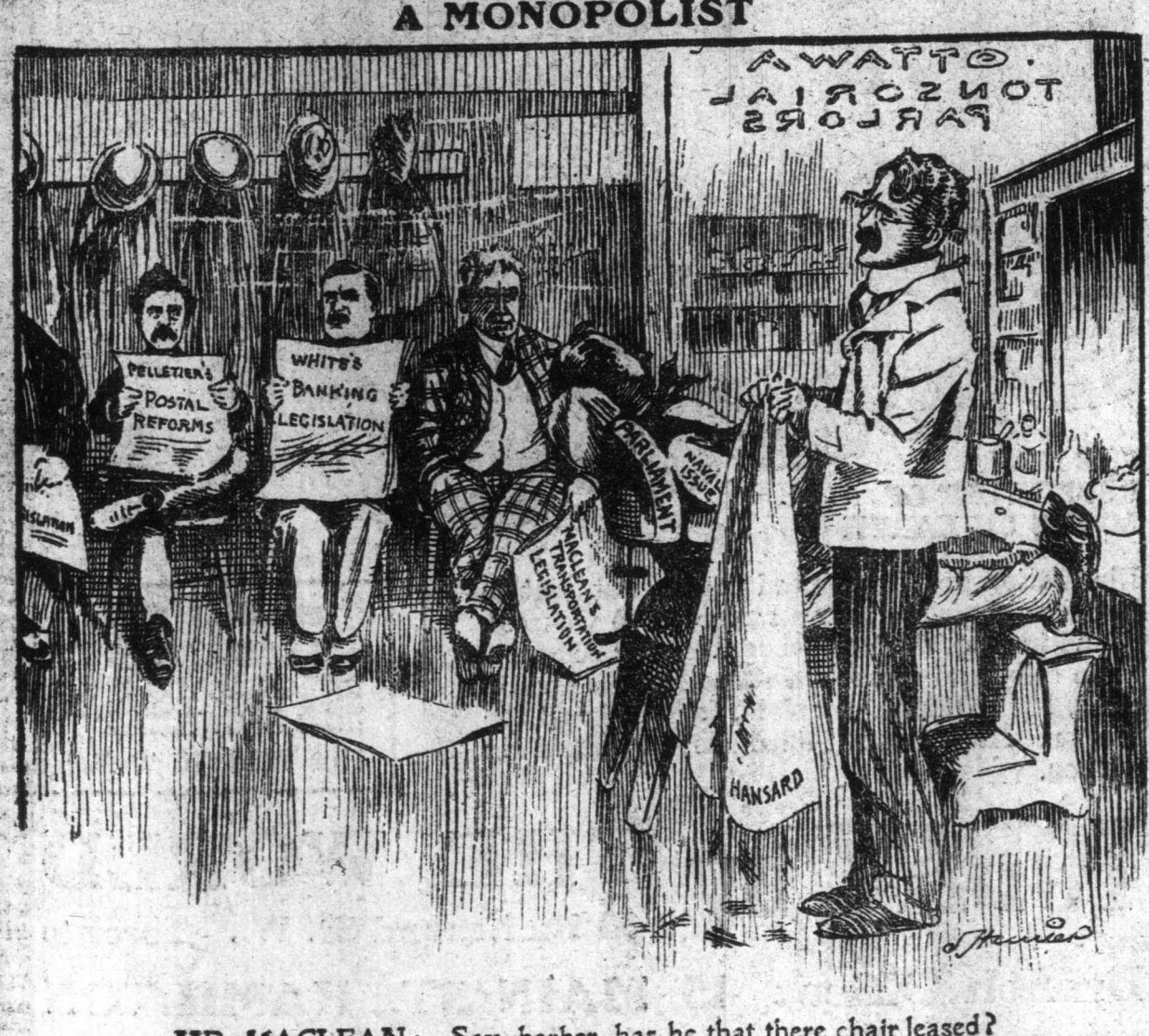
Late yesterday afternoon he submitted the following report to Mayor Hocken, which has given rise to additional hysterical in civic circles: H. C. Hocken, Esq. (Mayor), chairman, and members of the board of control:

Gentlemen: Adverting to my report of Jan. 8 inst., herein, I beg to advise that owing to the superintendent of plant, who took the readings, omitting to specify that the test on the clear water reservoir was for 1-1/2 hours only, viz: from 12.30 to 2 p.m., as against three hours on the filter beds, the rate of apparent leakage inwards to the clear water reservoir per 24 hours is doubled, our former computation having been made upon a three-hour basis. The figures, therefore, relative to the clear water reservoir test should read as follows:

Lake level—81.4 feet.  
Height of water in reservoir at commencement of test—87.1 feet.  
Height of water in reservoir at end of test—87.4 feet.  
Duration of test: 12.30 p.m. to 2 p.m.—1-1/2 hours.  
Average gain per hour—2 feet or 24 inches.  
Rate of gain per 24 hours—48 feet or 576 inches.  
Area of reservoir—4.3 acres.  
Calculation: 4.3 acres x 2.3 x 48,560 x 4.8 feet x 6.25 = 2,975,760 imperial gallons per 24 hours.

The rate of leakage, therefore, is 2.6 million gallons inwards per 24 hours.

It may be argued that this was not a test under ordinary working conditions, and that the reservoir level is low. For the greater part of the day the reservoir level is lower than the lake level, consequently while the total leakage in 24 hours may not reach 2.6 million gallons, yet it cannot be denied that at times during the day the rate of leakage inwards must equal that amount.

### GIVES HISTORY OF YORK RANGES

Much Valuable Information Contained in Book Just Published by Capt. Hunter.

The "12th Regiment York Rangers," a book of interest to all residents of York County, and particularly to those of a military turn of mind, has just been published by Captain A. T. Hunter, G. Co., 12th Regiment, York Rangers. In addition to an exhaustive description of the regiment's activities, the book throws some interesting light upon the social and political conditions in Canada prior to and during the war of 1812, and the few civil uprisings.

It follows the regiment from the time of its birth about 1812, and tells of its activities during the times of turmoil and its struggles for existence during the times of peace when it was supported by an adequate governmental militia organization, was governmental in action. 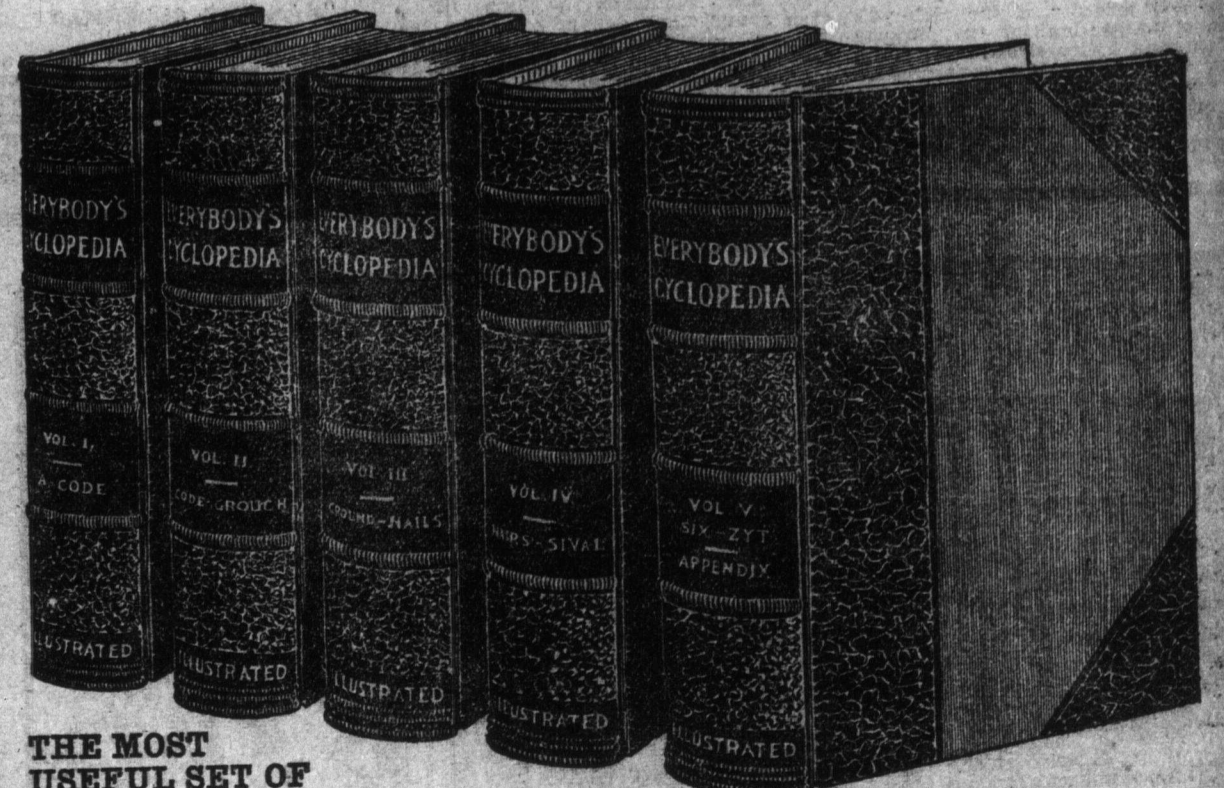

**WE WITNESSED THE PAGE**

Takes Two Heats of Unfinished Free-For-All and Beats Out Richard S.

The ice meeting just finished by the Dufferin Driving Club wound up, so to speak, in a blaze of glory. Thursday there were three races carried and it was expected that the management would be able to get them finished. There was a number of delays, caused by pulling shoes and other minor causes, which made it necessary for the free-for-all to be carried over till yesterday. There was considerable comment by dissenting parties as to what could or could not be done. However, the judges decided that rather than take a chance of anything happening to mar the splendid results of this meeting they would postpone instead of having a heat after dark.

The Dufferin Driving Club have given the public good clean honest racing. Their meeting was a splendid success from a racing standpoint and they now have the credit at Dufferin track of holding a real world's record over the course, made by J. E. Gray's Grattan Royal, driven by Neil Ray, who is quartered at this track, 2:12 1/4 over the ice, and that may stand longer than the record made by Dorris B in 1908.

Promptly at 2 o'clock yesterday Starter Noble called his heat for the finish of the free-for-all. At the end of the race Thursday night Richard S., owned by O. E. Sheppard, and driven by Arthur Bedford, had two heats and Nettie Ethon, owned by R. J. McBride, and driven by Wm. Hudson of Montreal, had one.

There was some little delay in starting, but Starter Noble was particularly anxious that every horse should get a fair start. When he gave the word they were all on their stride, with Nettie Ethon on the pole. As the gates swung ahead of Richard S. to the first turn, where the latter pulled out and led him into submission and went in behind Nettie Ethon at the half. They raced this way till about three-quarters, when Bedford went after Nettie Ethon and it looked as if one time as if he had her collared. It was a great drive the stretch. Nettie finished first and Richard S. second. Time of mile 2:16 1/2. Very fast over ice for the fourth heat.

The fifth and final heat was also won by Nettie Ethon, but Richard S. gave her a battle all the way. Most of the horses will ship from here to Montreal, where the Montreal Driving Club will start a six-days' meeting commencing on the 16th inst. The summary:

to show the need of a Canadian naval service to protect the Atlantic and Pacific seaboard. He explained that this was essential because of the withdrawal by Great Britain of many of the outlying squadrons for the purpose of centralizing the navy power around the British Isles.

Take it Out of Politics. "Let us try to deal with this question in a non-partisan way," said Mr. King. "It is the greatest issue with which Canada will have to deal for many years to come."

Where Was Emergency? In granting money for naval protection one line of action necessary was that of meeting an emergency and another line was that of laying down a permanent policy.

Should Grow Indignant. Here Mr. King read quotations from speeches by Hon. Winston Churchill, Premier Asquith and Lord Crewe and resolutions passed by the British admiralty.

Mr. King asked if England would be paying off her national debt at the rate of \$300,000,000 in seven years, would there be any danger of war and a resultant need of more ships.

He could not imagine a self-respecting country not looking after the protection of its own shores, Canada was under an obligation to the old country by helping to maintain the supremacy of the seas by protecting the Atlantic and Pacific seaboard.

Before concluding, Mr. King touched upon the "unholy alliance" of Conservatives and Nationalists. He said that Mr. Borden had been elected because of the Nationalists in his cabinet.

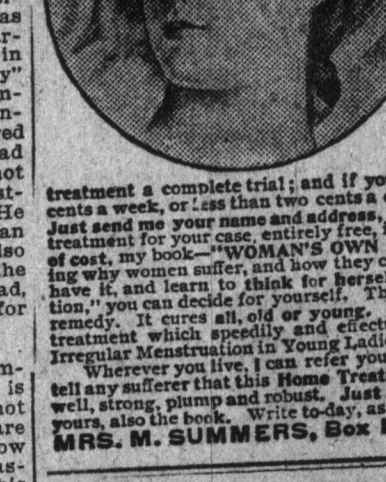

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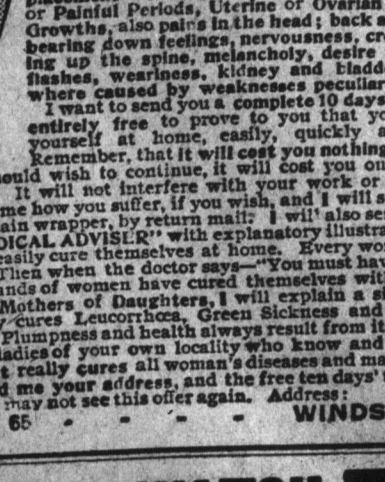

## TORONTO FAMILY IN DESTITUTION

City Mission Seeks Out Poor Family and Furnishes Aid—Mission Board Holds Meeting.

On invitation of Missionary Rev. Robert Hall the Toronto City Mission Board held its monthly meeting yesterday afternoon at his home and office, 87 Howard street, in order that the members might have a better conception of the extent and importance of the work under their care. Rev. Dr. Neil, president of the Mission, presided and an inspection of the premises, including the dorms and store rooms, was made. The members were surprised and delighted to see the ample provisions for supplying needy ones approved by the missionaries in providing either food, fuel or clothing. They were also pleased with the thorough system adopted by the superintendent carried out so carefully and efficiently. The treasurer's report was the most satisfactory report submitted for some time. Mr. Hall read the missionaries' reports for December, which showed very definite work being done in the worst districts of the city. Several striking incidents were given of which the following is a sample: "A few days ago a family was reported by a friend as in sore need, the home is in the centre of a respectable district. No one answered the repeated knocks of the missionary; he opened the door and shouted, but there was no answer; hearing the faint voices of children, he searched from floor to attic, but could find no one; at last a mother and three little ones were found who had shut themselves in a back room to keep themselves warm, for there was neither fire nor bread in the house. The husband had started work but will receive no pay for a week or more. An older girl had found work but had not got her first pay. Food and firing were at once supplied and mother and children were made happy." Nearly 1200 persons were provided with material for a substantial Christmas dinner, and many citizens, churches, Sunday schools and other societies sent in most liberal gifts in money and in kind, so that the mission is well equipped for its winter's work. The mission employs at present three missionaries, but a fourth male missionary is expected to be added in a few weeks. The members of the board were greatly pleased with the progress of the work, and confidently appeal to Christians of all denominations for their hearty support.

## VIADUCT APPEAL HEARD ON MONDAY

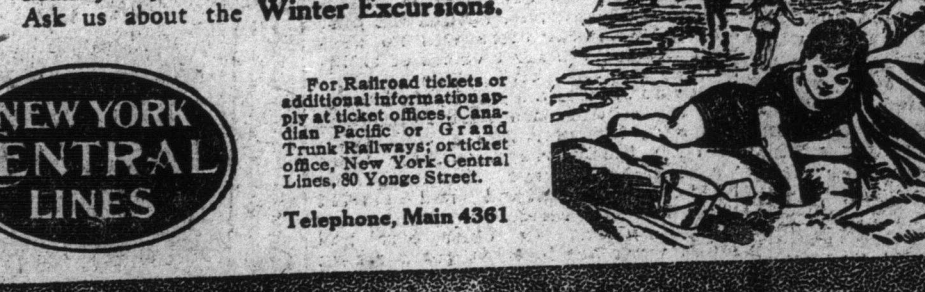

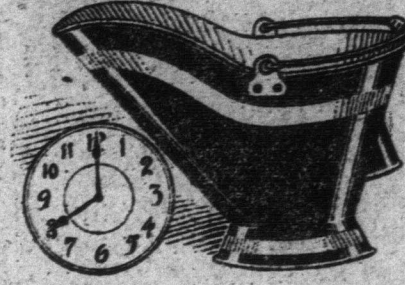
