



## Presbyterian Meeting at Cobourg

NEWCASTLE DISTRICT.

Persuant to a requisition numerously signed, notice of which was published in the Cobourg Star and Port Hope Gazette, a masting of Presbyterians in this District was beld at the North American Hotel. Cobourg, on Tuesday last the 28th Feb'v. for the purpose of taking into considera tion the late proceedings in the House of Assembly regarding the endowment of Records in this Province, together with the mawarrantable aspersions made on the Sectish Clergy and people on that occasion, of about 300 persons, principally from the Townships of Hamilton and Haldimand, together with deputations from Otonabee, Peterboro', Monaghan, and Cavan, but in censequence of want of room the mining was adjourned to the Common School House, when John Steele; Esq. o! Colborne, having been called to the Chair & Donald McDonald, Esq. of Cobourg, appolited Secretary, the following sixteen Resolutions were unanimously adopted.
