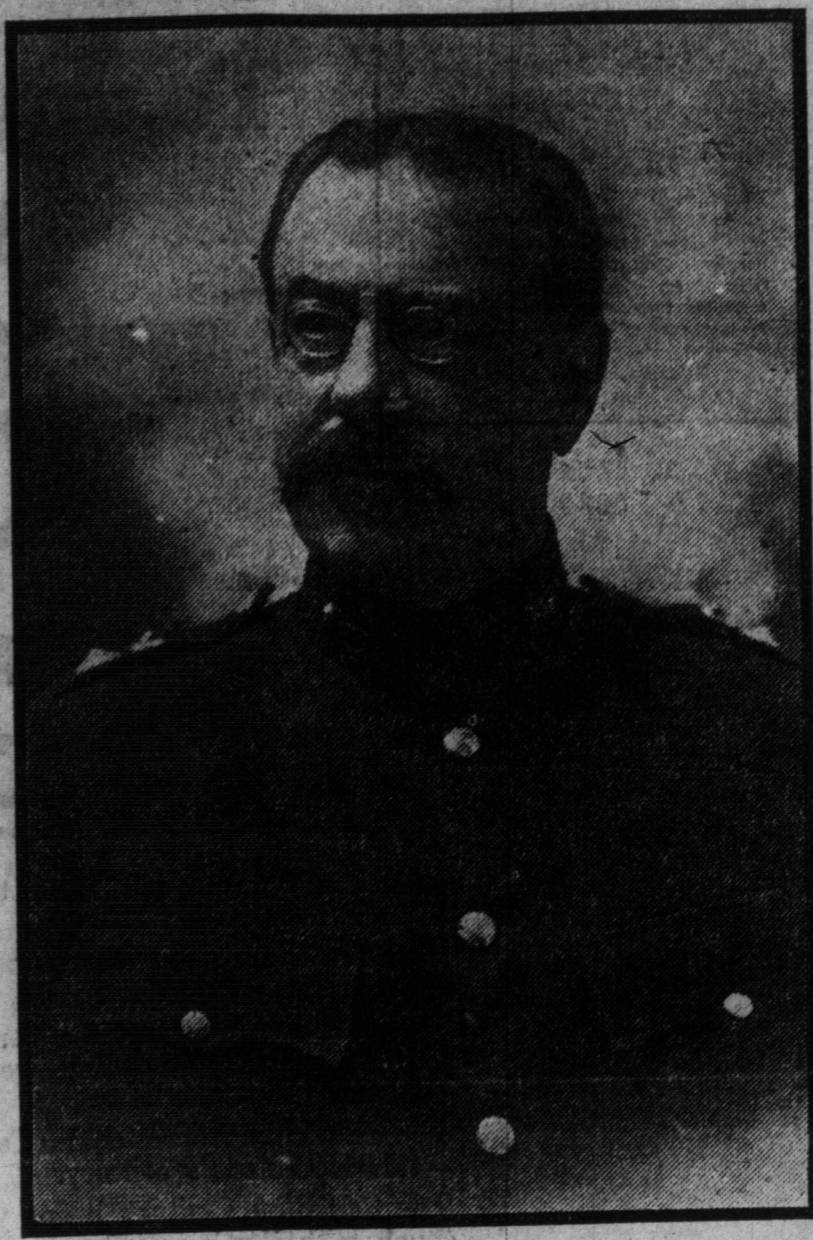

Slump in Wheat Quotations Continued at Chicago Market

Liverpool Sends Lower Prices and American Markets Follow—Coarse Grains Are Firmer. World Office. Monday Evening, Oct. 31. Liverpool wheat futures closed today 1 1/4 to 1 1/2 lower than Saturday, and corn futures 1/4 to 1/2 lower.
