Mr. Lewis said that he had received information, which he deemed trustworthy, to the effect that the Canadian Commissioner of Customs, in connection with the proposed duties on Alaska goods, had issued a special order fixing an exorbitant rate of duty on goods of every description brought by miners entering the Klondike country by way of Alaska. According to Mr. Lewis' information, this duty was fifteen cents a pound on all goods, and was to be levied on the goods at the point of entry.
