Canada is Too Prosperous To Have Tariff Revision

Duty to Be Raised on Steel —Rails But Nothing More This Year.

Ottawa, April 8.—(World Staff Correspondent)—With the budget speech due next Thursday, it is taken for granted that Hon. W. S. Fielding, after consultation with his colleagues, has the whole matter cut and dried. From the well-informed circles it is learned that the duty on steel rails will be adjusted so that the government is assured that the duty on proper quality can be made in Canada. Tests up to the present time have not been satisfactory to the government, but the prospects are bright. As for everything else, it is practically settled and there will be no revision of the tariff this session.

Country Too Prosperous.

The arguments used by Liberal politicians to re-enforce this position are numerous. They declare the country is prosperous, that it will be time enough to relieve financial conditions when the times come and to call the tariff into requisition when prosperity is waning to leave the government without a political expediency in the wayward of the government.

He announced that it was the intention of the government to proceed with this suggestion at the Easter recess. Mr. Borden's silence gave assent to the proposal.

THE NATURE OF OUR GOVERNMENT. Editor World: The we have made great material progress, the science of government has received little attention. Conditions in Canada are very different from those in Britain, and are now also different from those prevailing when our system was evolved.

AN UNKIND PRESS. The British press must be on a wild hunt for arguments to check immigration to Canada when it makes such a fuss about the trials of the immigrants who reached Winnipeg the other day. Better provision should have been made for the accommodation of the immigrants, and the department deserves censure for failing to anticipate the rush.

The second case is McDonnell v. Best, an appeal from the Master of the High Court. The peremptory list for the Divisional Court to-day is Henry v. Ward (to be concluded), Holmes v. Russell, Folger v. A. L. 252, Gillett v. Lumsden.

Divisional Court. Henry C. Ward of Pontiac, Mich., appeared from a judgment of Falconer, J., in the case of McDonnell v. Best, \$31,282, for commission earned by the defendant in the sale of lead in Essex County to grow tobacco, and in purchasing the crop from them. Mr. Ward was awarded at the instance of the plaintiff on the ground that he was about to leave the country, and his creditors came down on and practically ruined him.

On appeal Ward alleges that the plaintiffs paid no attention to the growing of the tobacco, and the quality was therefore very poor. The case was not finished.

The case of the late Senator Clemon recently obtained from the Master at Ottawa an order for summary judgment against Andrew Onderdonk, the well-known contractor of New York for \$5000, balance of money advanced by Senator Clemon. W. M. Douglas, K. C., said that the return of money was conditional on the receipt of a bill of extras from the government for work done on the Canal. The court decided that if Onderdonk pays Mrs. Clemon \$2500 he might have a trial of the action.

Suits Against Husbands. The case of A. J. Small against the London Union and the American Federation of Labor, which was before the Divisional Court yesterday on an appeal from an order of Meredith, C.J., refusing an application to set aside service on the union, on certain individual defendants on behalf of other members of the union. The appeal was dismissed on this point, but the service on D. A. Carey on behalf of the American Federation was set aside, following the decision in Metallic Roofing Co. v. Metal Workers' Union No. 30. J. G. O'Donoghue appeared for the union, and C. A. Moss for Mr. Small. Each party must pay their own costs.

Single Court. The Knickerbocker Trust Co. purchased the property of Westport and Sault Ste. Marie Railroad, and asked Mr. Justice Street for an order to pay the purchase money direct, but it was ordered that the amount be paid into court.

In Chambers. Rev. Thomas Geoghegan, rector of St. Peter's Church, Hamilton, asked for an order compelling Miss Annie Hare, who is suing him for \$10,000 for breach of promise of marriage, to furnish security for costs. The clergyman claims that Miss Hare is a resident of Buffalo, but she showed that she was only there temporarily, and her home was in Toronto. The application was dismissed with costs.

Judgment for One Dollar. Mr. Justice Street handed down his decision yesterday in Travis v. Hales, a Non-Jury case tried in Linden in March last. The defendants were husband and wife, and the suit was for \$1 and costs and for the same amount as the husband, if he should be found liable. The court found that the common law husband was liable for the acts of the wife, as a matter of principle, and gave judgment for the plaintiff with costs on the High Court scale.

Judgments. Mr. Justice Britton entered judgment yesterday for \$1000 and costs against Mrs. Miles, the owner of the factory on Dundas-street, who James Alexander had murdered, and for which his widow sought damages.

Judge Britton gave judgment in Stone v. Brooks, finding \$1712.94 due plaintiff, and \$145 due defendant on his counter claim, leaving a balance of \$1567.94 with costs to be set off.
