It is thought that the majority of the board will support Mr. Levee, and that they will be elected again next January for the new Board of Education.

London, Nov. 4.—Home statistics just published show that under the Canadian preference, British exports of leather and leather goods have risen from 7 to 14 per cent. The total import of leather has risen from 20 to 25 per cent, being increased slightly, but the fact is that the British goods have increased while the Americans do not.
