TAFT ASKS FIELDING To Meet at Albany, With Earl Grey, TO A TARIFF CONFAB

President Making an Unusual Effort to Avert a Trade War—Is Conference To-day or Sunday.

SIR WILFRID INVITED BUT COULDN'T GO

FIELDING ACCEPTS.

OTTAWA, March 18.—(Special.)—Altho earlier in the evening Mr. Fielding declined to say whether he had accepted President Taft's invitation to go to Albany, it was announced late to-night that the finance minister would leave to-morrow morning.

ALBANY, N.Y., March 18.—History both state and international may be made here to-morrow and Sunday, when Albany entertains the governor-general of Canada and the president of the United States. The president comes on the invitation of personal friends and originally, it is believed, his visit was intended to be purely social. Since he accepted the invitation several weeks ago, however, the Canadian tariff situation has become acute.

It was learned to-night that Earl Grey, the Canadian governor-general, accepted the request for the Albany University Club, that dinner here to-morrow night only after he was informed that the president desired to meet him here. An announcement from Rochester that President Taft has invited W. S. Fielding, the Canadian minister of finance, to discuss the tariff dispute with him during his stay indicates the chief reason for the governor-general's wish to be present at the same time.

President Taft first invited Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the Canadian premier, to a conference, but the latter was unable to come. Henry M. Hoyt, counselor of the state department, and Charles M. Pepper, tariff expert of the department of commerce and labor, will come from Washington, to be present at the conference.

Settlement With France.
President Taft announced to-night that a complete agreement had been reached with France on all tariff differences and that at Albany to-morrow he would sign a proclamation reducing rates provided for in the Payne-Aldrich tariff law.

The president will arrive on his arrival at 2:30 by Gov. Hughes and Mayor McEwan and representatives of the University Club, and go with them in a motor to the executive mansion. Earl Grey is not due here until the hours later, and since Gov. Hughes will be with the president at that time, the governor-general will be welcomed on behalf of the state by Adjutant-General Henry, the governor's chief of staff, and a committee from the University Club, which will include Speaker Wadsworth of the assembly, Louis military companies will escort Earl Grey to the Hotel Ten Eyck.

Sunday morning the president will attend church with Gov. Hughes, and in the afternoon the governor will give an informal luncheon at the executive mansion. Among the guests will be the president and Earl Grey, Mr. Fielding, President Nichols of Dartmouth College, Bishop Doane and Bishop Hayes, respectively of Albany, and former Gov. David R. Francis of Missouri.

EXORBITANT ESTIMATES FOR THAT ALBERTA RY.

And Also Fancy Salaries—Legislature is Adjourned Until May 26 When Commission Reports.

EDMONTON, Alta., March 18.—(Special.)—The government to-day made a final and complete surrender by announcing the insurmountable what were preparing to demand—the adjournment of the house until the royal commission have completed their enquiry into the Great Waterways Railway deal.

When the legislature adjourned, it stood adjourned until Thursday, May 26, when it will again be called upon to hear the report of the commission. Premier Rutherford made the statement that no money would be paid to the railway company on their guarantee until the investigation was over. It was also promised by the premier that no portion of the route, to a further extent than Edmonton, would be approved by the government until the investigation was finished.

Smith, Camrose demanded that something be done in order that the government might have a check on all expenditures on the road. He made charges that exorbitant salaries were being paid to officials of the company. He understood Consulting Engineer Dr. Waddell was paid \$25,000, while the chief engineer of the Grand Trunk Pacific only got \$10,000. Also, the general manager was getting \$50,000 a year.

Holding in his hand Waddell's estimate of the cost of the road, he quoted estimates of \$12 an acre for right-of-way. This was exorbitant, for the country thru which the road was passing, at most of the land was Dominion Government land, and therefore would cost nothing. He quoted \$1 a yard for loose rock and \$2.40 for solid rock.

RUSSIAN PEPLAR KILLED
John Draugenas Struck Down by a Train at Port Credit.

Stepping from one track to another in order to avoid an approaching G. T. R. train, John Draugenas of 51 Nelson-street, Toronto, was struck by a C.P.R. train, a mile and a half west of Port Credit last night. He was severely injured that he died an hour later.

The train, a C.P.R. special, carrying the University Glee Club to Hamilton, was stopped and the injured man placed on a horse and taken back to Port Credit, where an examination showed that he had sustained fatal injuries, nearly every bone in his body being broken. He was then conveyed to Hamilton, where he died.

The deceased was a Russian by birth, and a tailor by trade. He leaves a wife and three children, the oldest being only 8 years of age.

Draugenas was in the habit of making periodical journeys to points along the line for the purpose of peddling goods. A letter addressed to himself furnished the clue to his identity.

READY TO BUILD THE ROSEDALE EXTENSION

Works Committee Asks Board of Control to Take Advantage of Whitney Act—Mile of Track to Cost \$75,000.

"That the Board of Control be requested to consult with the city engineer with the object of building the Rosedale extension by day labor under the act passed by the legislature, as soon as possible."

The foregoing resolution was unanimously passed by the civic works committee yesterday, on motion of Ald. Maguire with Ald. McBride as second. The car line in question is the one which the street railway offered to build externally, for the purpose of accommodating the public at the Q.O.R. celebration next June. The city's representatives see in the move, however, the possibility that the railway's real object is to facilitate an entrance of the Metropolitan Radial Railway by way of Moore Park.

The building of the line by the city, if decided upon, will be the first fruits of the Whitney legislation, which empowers the city to construct extensions in the districts annexed since the agreement of 1891. It will be important, moreover, as marking the initial stage in the municipalization of the street railway, which cannot be delayed longer than eleven years. As the city will own the extension in entirety, sub-structure and rails, it can absolutely checkmate any designs of the radicals to enter thru North Rosedale. Of course, if the street railway declines to agree, the whole undertaking will be rendered futile, since the extension must necessarily be joined with the Church-street line on the south of Glen-road bridge to be effective.

The city engineer estimates that the route as planned involves the laying of about a mile of tracks, including the small section to be double-tracked, namely, across the bridge to Pelham-place. A single track is to run along Glen-road, Edgewood, School-street, Binsworth-road and Pelham-road, forming a loop and merging with the double tracks. Mr. Rust estimates the whole cost at about \$75,000, as against about \$20,000 which the city would have to pay if it laid the substructure alone as under the usual terms.

Ald. Maguire pointed out that, as the proposed course would not involve the granting of a charter, it would not be necessary under the Street Act for vote of the people to be taken. All that would be needed would be a proclamation by the lieutenant-governor-in-council. By the use of day labor, no time would be lost in awarding contracts and the lines could be ready for the military celebration, just three months ahead of the mayor, had asserted that the railway's object was to meet Sir Henry Pellatt's wishes, any refusal on his part to agree to the arrangement would show the insincerity of his claim. The motion carried without discussion.

CANADA TO SEND TRADE AGENT TO GERMANY

Statement re U. S. Tariff Not in Public Interest Just Now, Says Mr. Fielding to Parliament.

OTTAWA, March 18.—(Special.)—The most important event in a day spent in supply was Hon. Mr. Fisher's announcement that before long the recent trade agreement with Germany will be followed up by the establishment of a trade agent in Germany, probably in Hamburg.

It was J. E. Armstrong, who elicited this statement, when the minister of agriculture was putting thru supplementary estimates, pertaining to the trade and commerce department. The Easter recess was fixed. The house adjourns on the 23rd and re-assembles on the 26th. The motion put forward by the government was that the house meet again on Easter Tuesday, but Sir Wilfrid Laurier receded to the request for one extra day, by Mr. Warburton of Prince Edward Island, and some western Conservatives whose multiplicity was George Taylor, Dr. Clarke of Red Deer protested that it meant a month longer time spent by western members, who remained in Ottawa, in absolute idleness.

W. F. Maclean asked if the government would make any pronouncement before Easter on the tariff war. Mr. Fielding replied that it would depend on the state of business at that particular time. At present it would not be in the public interest to make any statements.

A project for a new cut-off canal to connect the St. Lawrence River with New York waters was alluded to by Mr. Puzlevy. There is a vote for a survey of the route opposite Montreal to the Richelieu canal, and the minister of public works stated that it has been proposed to dig a canal from a point on the St. Lawrence opposite Montreal to the Richelieu River. This would save 100 miles and give a waterway shorter than the present rail routes.

"That would be a diversion of trade from other Canadian ports," opined E. A. Langstaff of Elzevir. It appears that Mexico has draped her subsidy of \$25,000 to the Pacific steamship service between her ports and the British Columbia seaboard, and that Canada has accordingly assumed that amount extra. The Atlantic and Pacific Mexican subsidies are now costing Canada \$25,000 a year. Report was made of a \$25,000 subsidy for a St. John to Cuba line given last November to the Wm. Thompson Co. of St. John.

It was a case of urgency, said the government, when Hon. John Haggart complained that parliament should have been consulted before entering upon the contract. Major J. A. Currie asked if the West Indian would net help with some of the subsidies, and Mr. Fielding, in reply, talked hopefully of the work of the recent royal commission on trade between the West Indies and Canada.

NEW G.T.P. ELEVATORS
Will Be Erected at Port Arthur to Hold Ten Million Bushels.

OTTAWA, March 18.—(Special.)—While he was defending a vote of \$425,000 for dredging in the current year in Thunder Bay, Hon. Mr. Puzlevy made the statement that the G. T. P. has decided to erect at Port Arthur elevators to contain ten million bushels of grain. Ultimately these elevators will have a capacity of thirty million bushels.

**DON FOUNDRY BURNS
POOR WATER SUPPLY**
One Storey Structure at Foot of Cherry Street is Completely Destroyed.

Fire was discovered in the Don Foundry, east of Cherry-street, on the afternoon of last night and an alarm run in from Front and Cherry-streets, but so firmly had the flames seized upon the single storey, iron-sheeted structure that the firemen, working with a limited water supply, were unable to do more than hold the blaze in check, while many of the valuable moulds were removed from the doomed structure.

The cause of the blaze is unknown. It is believed to have been due to either an electric wire or to a spark from the furnace. The iron sheeting proved a great hindrance to the firemen, preventing free access to the burning wood beneath.

The city hydrants do not come close to this spot and the firemen had to use the manual pumps of the British American Oil Co's plant close to the burning building. This provided only a limited number of streams. Twenty-five men were employed in the foundry, which was built a year ago.

Fire was discovered in the building owned and occupied by Wm. Coulter & Sons, cooper-makers, 15 and 17, George-street, at 8:07 last night. The blaze started in the basement from the furnace and damaged the premises and stock in the sum of \$200. The loss is fully covered by insurance. The men were confined to the first floor and the greatest loss was in the stock of patterns.

BAR OUT STRIKEBREAKERS TRADE COUNCIL'S DEMAND

Annual Banquet of C.M.A. Branch—Important Proceedings of Board of Control.

King, principal of the Institute College, India, was the speaker at the Canadian Club's luncheon at the Hotel Royal this evening. He defended the British administration of India.

Won't Join Municipal Union. The board of control have refused to join the Union of Canadian Municipalities in their effort to get the municipalities power to force railway and other companies to conform to a general plan adopted by any municipality. The city officials said that it would not pay the city to put up the annual fee of \$150 to become a member of the union. Controller Cooper, one of the members of the deputation that visited the natural gas field yesterday, reported that there was plenty of gas to be had if the city wanted to install a municipal distributing plant. A deputation was appointed to wait upon the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board Monday to ask permission to borrow \$100,000 for waterworks extension, and \$45,000 for sewers for the new annex. If the governor-general is agreeable, a civic reception will be tendered to him on April 22, when he comes here to attend the banquet of St. George's Society.

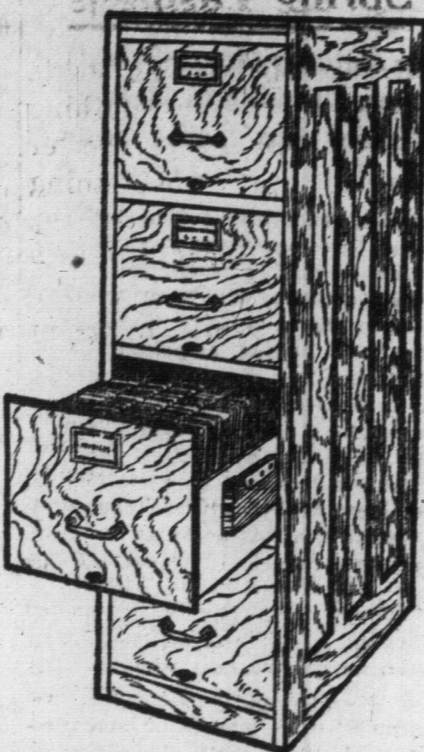

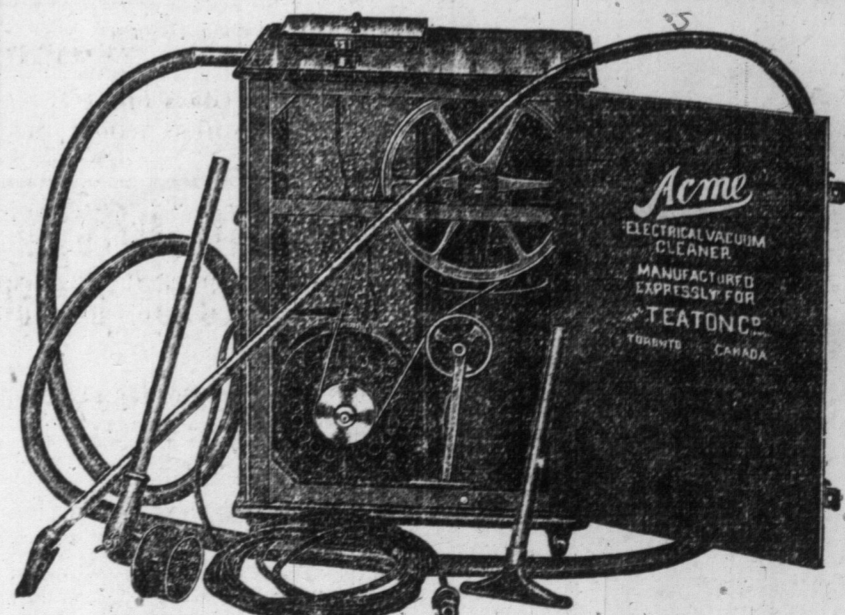

PROBLEM AND REMEDY

William Mackenzie and his company own the town. Even if the citizens were prepared to buy it back, the legislature has refused them the authority to do so. The private council, beyond which there can be no appeal, has declared that the Street Railway Co. can construct lines all over the place if it wants to and the people must submit. Fortunately the company will not want to lay lines everywhere. Wellington, Adelaide, Bay and University-streets, however, are the spoil of the company. Only the streets that may contribute to an economical and profitable service, it may be assumed, will be occupied by the company. Manager Fleming has frequently declared that if he had a free hand he would give the citizens a perfect and faultless service. The naturally incredulous citizens did not accept this assurance with the faith Mr. Fleming expected, but he will no doubt now show that he is nothing if not reliable.

They are putting a brave face on it at the city hall, and professing that but for the last act passed by the legislature placing the company under the control of the Ontario Railway Board, the city would be in a dreadful state. The railway board has no objection to the street railway company going on the streets mentioned. The only argument that the city could approach the board with would be the declaration that the city wanted to build on those streets itself. But this is a plea directly provided against in the new act, for the company is specially protected against competition within its franchise. It is only where the company refuses to build that the city may build. As the railway board has already placed itself on record sympathetically to the company's wishes, there is nothing now to prevent the company building the lines it wants, unless it be any enlarged view of its powers under the new act which the board may take.

The instant lesson of the situation is the necessity to proceed with the construction of the tube system without a moment's delay. There is no other way to checkmate the advances of the railway company towards the acquisition of a renewed franchise, which is the goal of every effort and stratagem in the company's campaign. The mayor and council should not lose a day in getting the tube proposals into working shape.

At the same time an educational movement looking towards the expropriation of the railway system should be inaugurated. It must be clear to everyone that to delay the reacquisition of the franchise for eleven years would be to give the railway company opportunities of entrenching itself in Toronto, which the simple citizen would never be able to counteract.

The tubes immediately. Expropriation as soon as possible. It is up to the mayor and aldermen.

CONCEALMENT DOES NOT PAY. A great deal has been made of the purchase of a motor-car by the hydro-electric power commission, and columns have appeared in The Globe and other opposition papers dealing with

the question. We have not observed anywhere anything tending to establish the fact whether or not the car was worth what was paid for it. That, of course, is the main point. The government papers refrain from any mention of the matter, thru fear, perhaps, that something may have been wrong. Just why the public accounts committee did not get all the facts at once is one unacquainted with the devious methods of politics can say, but where there was nothing to be ashamed of there was no need for concealment. No one has been able to do more than suggest that something was wrong. When the whole facts were finally brought out there was nothing that need not have been published in the papers from the first. A government does itself no good by such methods. The things that are really wrong, and will come into light some day, are those which will cause real trouble to Sir James Whitney and in his camp. Every secret thing shall be revealed, and every hidden thing brought to light. Politicians who think differently do not know enough to pound sand. There is only one way to get ahead of the game, and that is, do nothing that there is need to be ashamed of. It is a pity that Sir James Whitney does not know all that is going on in Toronto. We venture to preserve this faith in him that he would put the grand kibosh on it quick.

BLAME JUSTLY.

A great deal is said in criticism of the city officials, but, to do them justice, the temper of the elective administrators should be taken into consideration. Dr. Sheard has recommended that the intake pipe should be extended 1500 feet. Do the mayor and controllers accept this presumably expert advice? By no means. They cut it down by one-third.

The citizens should be thankful for small mercies. The water will be better at 1000 feet further out than at the point where it is now. After another typhoid epidemic the extra 500 feet may be added.

Our dainty little municipal mouths must take two bites at a cherry.

THE PRIVY COUNCIL'S LATEST.

Toronto has again failed to satisfy the judicial committee of the privy council that the special provisions of its agreement with the Street Railway Company, placing control of extensions in the hands of the city engineer, subject to the council's approval, were intended seriously and formed part of the considerations which led to the grant of the franchise. The judgment was not unexpected and the appeal was really a foregone hope. Courts of final appeal are never prone to admit, even by implication, that their decisions are open to challenge, or that their faculty of interpretation may have been misapplied. On the occasion of the judicial committee's previous judgment The World expressed the view that it amounted to an inversion of the agreement—indeed invented a new agreement far remote from the intention of the parties and even from the understanding of the railway company during the preliminary stages of the controversy. This is undoubted, but, nevertheless, the construction placed upon its terms by the court had to be accepted. It held then that the city had no right to specify the streets on which new lines should be laid—it has now decided that the city has no right under the agreement to interfere with the choice of the company. In plain English, it hands over the city streets to the uncontrolled will of the Street Railway Company.

Uncontrolled, that is, had the recent acts of the provincial legislature not

been passed, precisely in anticipation of this latest eventuality. Without the remedies now open to the city it would have been absolutely helpless either to secure or to provide reasonable transportation facilities for and within the districts now unserved, or only partially served. This remedial legislation was a measure of precaution taken by the government and the legislature in advance of the probable emergence of a situation which would have deprived many thousands of citizens of traction facilities to which they are urgently entitled. Nor can its fairness be questioned, since it is entirely in line with the public service commission policy already carried into effect both in Ontario and the Dominion. It does not alter or vary the agreement, but it secures the use made by the railway company of the powers it has been held to possess under independent control and compels recognition of the fact that the public who granted the franchise have rights and interests in the extent and character of the service provided by the franchise-holders. That the acts in question within the power of the provincial legislature do not seem to be open to successful challenge, but the question of jurisdiction, if the company sees fit to raise it, cannot of course be avoided. Be that as it may, the position, in so far as it is changed, has been altered for the better, and the only policy now is to take immediate and full advantage of the authority which has been received to construct subways and to provide proper traction service in districts held to be excluded from the agreement.

To the Street Railway Company the judicial committee of the privy council must appear a veritable poultice. But what has it done to deserve this blessing?

Speaker Cannon is not the great gun he used of old, and apparently will, before long, be relegated to the shelf. Too much power always breeds the autocrat, and he in turn the rebel. To the world was while freedom grows.

Knowledge arows, but wisdom lingers with President Taft and his advisers during their discussion of the tariff issue. To call off the bluff may be against the grain, but the recalling of a false move is better statesmanship than preferring its consequences.

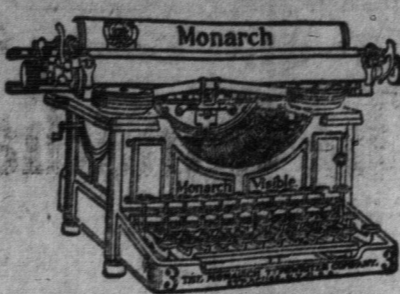
Thomas Reynolds has done nobly in his official capacity, and the reward he has received is signal. But as a private citizen Mr. Reynolds has set an example which should gain him equal honor from his fellow-countrymen. It is in the bosom of his own interesting family, however, that his chief reward is to be found.

Lord Curzon ventures the opinion that the oversea British States would rather have a second chamber of dukes than a first chamber of demagogues. He is wrong. The new British democracies know how to get rid of the demagogues, but hereditary dukes are birds of another feather that cannot be demagogized with safety. After all, demagogues is only Curzonese for democrat.

Toronto is learning by sharp experience to appreciate the wisdom displayed by the cities and countries that have preferred public ownership and operation of their service utilities. Under that advanced and enlightened policy efficient and cheap service is the first consideration and its provision is a matter of administration pure and simple. Now are public rights endangered by new legal constructions eliminating clauses intended to protect the people.

TO EXTEND INTAKE PIPE INTO 140 FEET OF WATER One Thousand Feet of Pipe Ordered at Probable Cost of \$40,000.

Believing that delays are dangerous, the board of control yesterday instructed the city engineer to advertise at once for one thousand feet of six-foot steel pipe for the extension of the intake further south into Lake Ontario. Mr. Rust states that the proposed extension will carry the mouth of the intake into 140 feet of water, or 40 feet deeper than the present location, as determined by soundings taken by Waterworks Engineer Fellows during the morning. He thinks that the extension can be completed within two weeks at a cost of \$40,000. The cost will be about \$40,000.

The Deeper the Better. Medical Health Officer Dr. Sheard reported to the mayor that, speaking generally, it is a fact that the deeper the water of Lake Ontario in this vicinity, the better is its quality. He gives warning, however, that even though the intake were extended a mile out there would be times, not the many of them, when the influence of wind and storm would produce slight sewage contamination. He believed, however, that if the pipe were extended 1500 feet or more, "the improvement in the character of the water would be very material for a considerable time. If, on the contrary, it is proposed to extend it only 200 feet, I do not think the improvement would be worth the trouble and expense."

CITY BOLD LAW-BREAKER TO SAVE \$10,000 A YEAR

Aldermen Aroused Over Use of Soft Coal at High Level Pumping Station.

That the city, while enforcing the smoke prevention by-law so far as private business is concerned, is in the inconsistent position of violating the ordinance itself, was the situation as disclosed to the civic works committee by the Board of Control.

It appeared that the chimney of the high level pumping station on Poplar Plains-road is the offender. It has the chronic habit of belching forth smoke of the black, opaque variety, just as there were no such thing as hard coal, and smoke consumers had never been invented.

"It is not true that we are prosecuting men for what we are doing ourselves," queried Ald. Dunn pertinently. "It is not true that we have not yet invented a successful means of preventing the smoke nuisance."

The city engineer said it would cost \$10,000 a year more to use hard coal. "They are making a laughing-stock out of us," he asserted.

It looked to Ald. Hill as though the board would stop at nothing to get a seventeen mill rate, but Controller Foster's defence was that the board had erred thoughtlessly.

Mr. Rust was asked on what should be done. He is expected to recommend a consistent attitude on the by-law, even if it costs \$10,000 per annum.

No Profits From Drains. Never again will the city extract a profit from the man who sets a private drain put into his property. Last year's surplus of \$8000 on overcharges, shocked the committee, the Mr. Rust explained that he had tried to estimate the individual costs carefully. He will reduce the basis of charges.

There is a city by-law which says that no water shall be supplied people living outside the city. Nevertheless, Thos. Revely of Swanes, applied for the privilege and was granted by the city engineer.

So innocent a proposition as an invitation from the Ontario Asphalt Block Company to the committee to inspect its works, all expenses to be borne by the company, caused apprehensions in Controller Foster and Ald. McBride. The others all looked favorably upon the outing and will fix a date for it.

HAGGETT FOUND GUILTY

Conviction Against Young Man in Louisa Street Shooting Affair.

Alfred James Haggett was charged in the sessions yesterday with shooting Charles Turff with intent on March 4 last. He was found guilty, however, of a lesser offence, causing a wound. There were two other counts on which he is to be tried. L. V. McBrady, counsel for the prisoner, will apply for a stay of proceedings until after appeal to divisional court. Haggett is a young man, 23 years of age. The shooting took place on Louisa street, where Haggett and a Mullins attempted to arrest Haggett, whom he saw chasing another fellow named Wright with a gun. Turff jumped in to help the policeman, but when the revolver was fired before the two clinked or when they were falling was a matter of dispute among the witnesses. Haggett had just heard a pistol shot before Turff grabbed Haggett, while Turff believed that Haggett had had intention of shooting him and that the gun went off when he caught Haggett's arms. There were two counts against N. P. Schab, whose trial followed Haggett's. He was found guilty with intent to obtain \$10 from R. E. Richmond by giving a check to the latter. Haggett was allowed to remain in custody for a period of 10 days. Wm. A. Davidson pleaded guilty to obtaining money under false pretence from the King Edward Hotel owned by Joseph McLaughlin. The amount was \$25. The prisoner was remanded for sentence, being allowed out on bail.

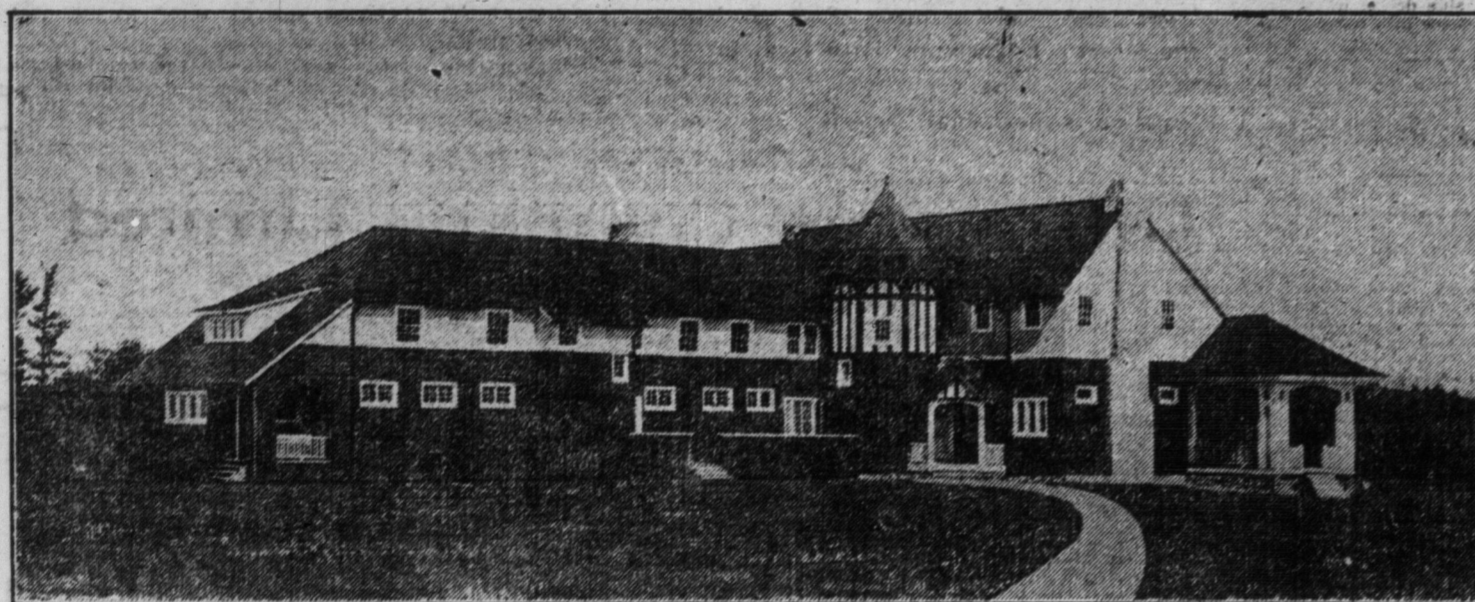

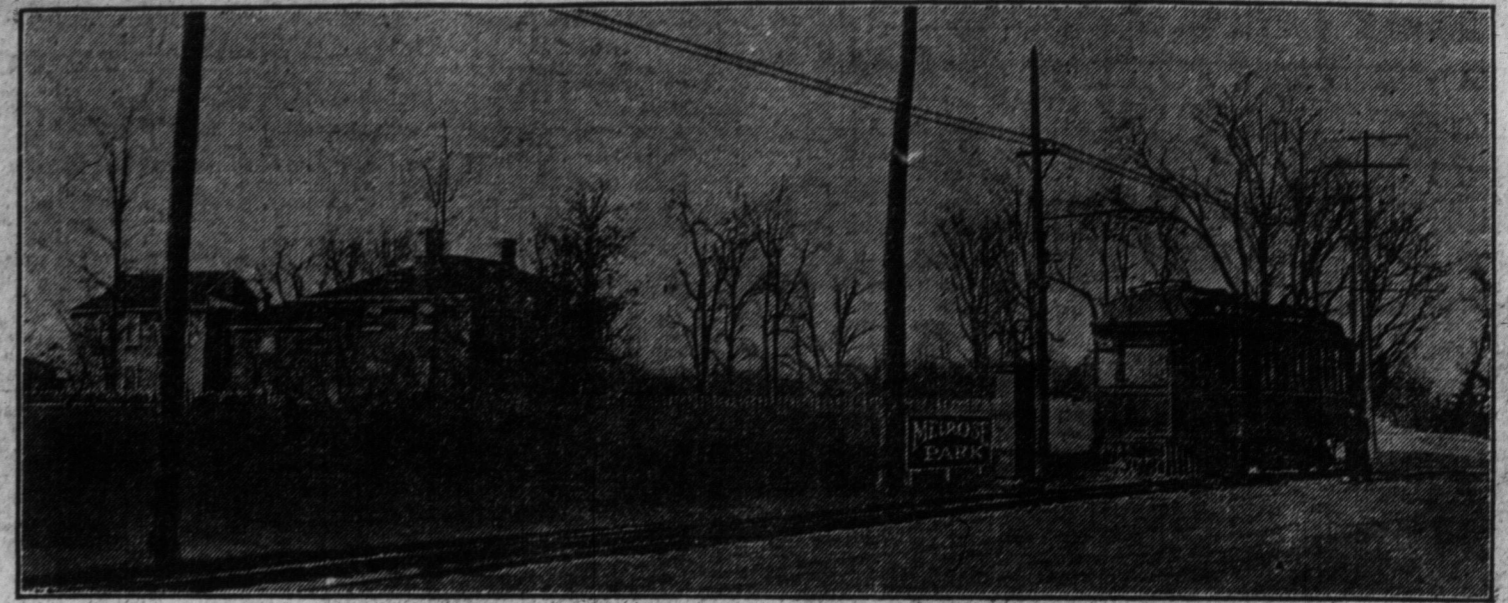

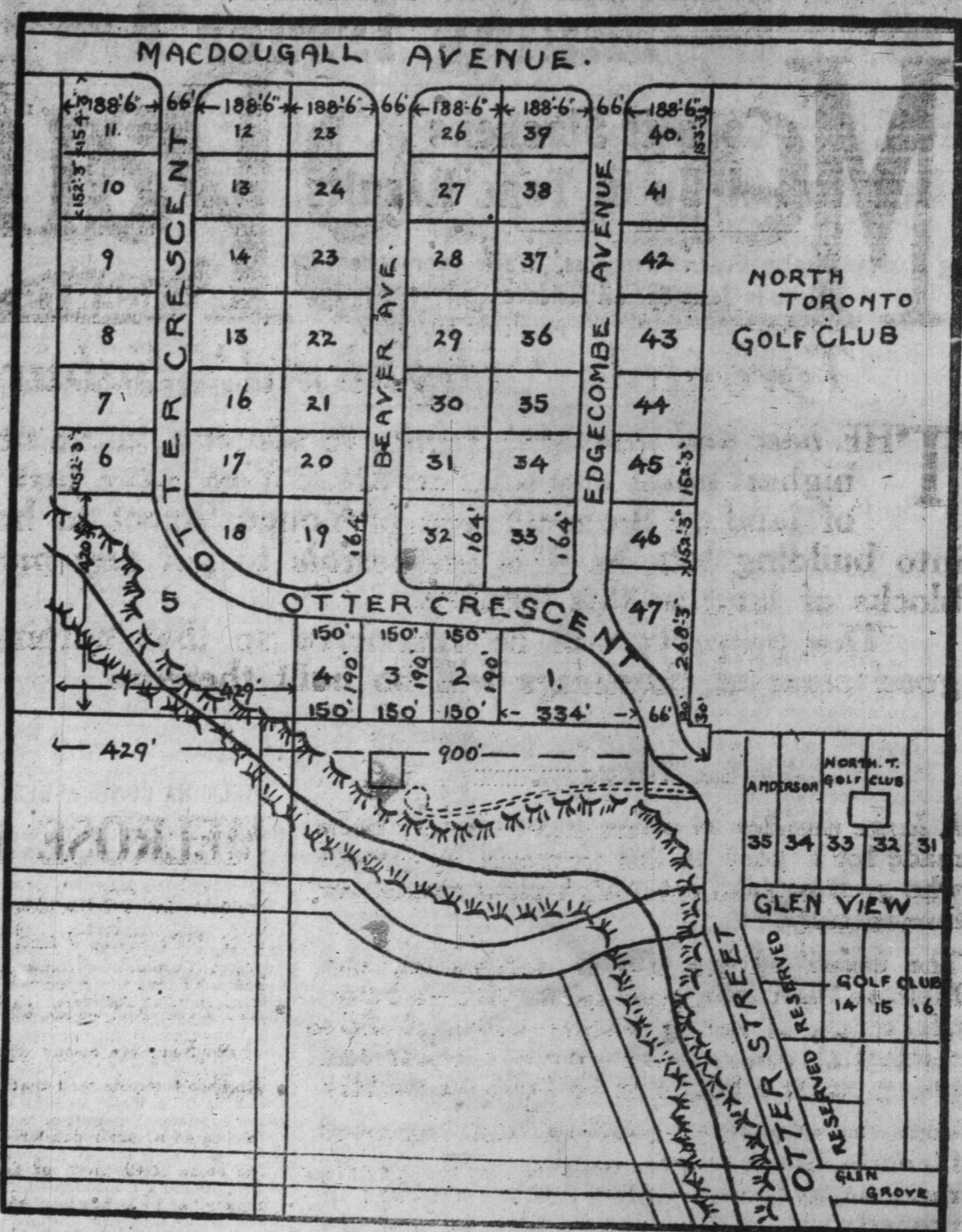

COBALT---Mining Issues Are Little Changed in Most Instances---COBALT

Trading in Cobalts Slackens But No Let-Up in Tone Results

Mining Markets Display General Firmness, While Improvement is Made in Some Special Instances.

World Office, Friday Evening, March 18.

While the volume of trading in Cobalts was to a certain extent lessened to-day, there was no let-up in the general firmness of the market. Stocks were in fairly good demand, and while price changes were in the majority of instances confined to small fractions, transactions were construed as favorable to holders and the market closed with a good feeling generally apparent.

In the lower priced stocks a good demand was noted for several of the issues which have been more or less prominent of late. Gifford was made an advance of over a point on reports of a strike on the property; City of Cobalt was also firmer under an improved call for the shares.

Cobalt Lake was under some pressure, but maintained fairly steady in the face of liquidation from holders. Timiskaming was slightly easier around 64; Little Nipissing was the only weak spot, these shares losing over a point and closing around the bottom.

The higher-priced section of the list was somewhat firmer. Nipissing touched \$10.21, a gain of some nine points from yesterday. Kerr Lake was stronger, the shares selling up to \$7.70, on renewed reports that the next dividend disbursement would show an increase from the previous one. La Rose was quiet and generally firm.

At the close trading sentiment was in the main favorable to the market, and should active dealing continue, it was felt that further improvement would likely be witnessed.

Larger Public Interest is Looked for, Heron & Co.'s market letter says:

Throughout the Cobalt camp a better feeling prevails than has been the case for a year past. The long protracted electrical energy is gradually being introduced and with the disappearance of the snow surface work on a large scale will begin. Much more news of a bullish character in the way of new discoveries, etc., may consequently be expected from now on.

In the meantime the process of discounting the improving conditions is going on in the market, where, however, the operations of professionals again accounted for the greater part of the activity. Prices during the week held fairly steady, and a larger public interest in the trading is looked for soon.

Transactions for the week ending today on the Standard Stock and Mining Exchange amounted to 293,423 shares, and on the Toronto curb 281,932, in all 1,261,374 shares, having a value of \$432,499.20.

Sacking Ore on Ophir.

INSPECTING PORCUPINE

Government Mining Experts Pay Visit to New Gold Field.

COBALT, March 18.—Mr. A. A. Cole, mining engineer for the T. and N. O. Railway, Prof. W. G. Miller, head of the Geological Survey of Ontario, and Mr. E. T. Corkill, inspector of mines for the province, went into the Porcupine district recently.

They intend visiting just the principal properties and about two days in the camp and two days on the road. As it was Mr. Cole's favorable report on the district that led to a very large extent to his interest in making investigation of the field, his impression of the progress that has been made since will be of great interest. It is Professor Miller's first visit into the new fields. He, as far as the outside and scientific work was concerned, first discovered the Cobalt. Mr. E. T. Corkill, inspector of mines for the province, also followed the lead of Whitney and Shaw for the first time.

DIFFICULTY SETTLED

And Chambers-Ferland Will Rush Active Development Work.

COBALT, March 18.—It is understood that some technical difficulties in connection with the reduction of the royalty have now been settled with the government by the Chambers-Ferland Company, and that development will be pushed from this time forth with considerable vigor. 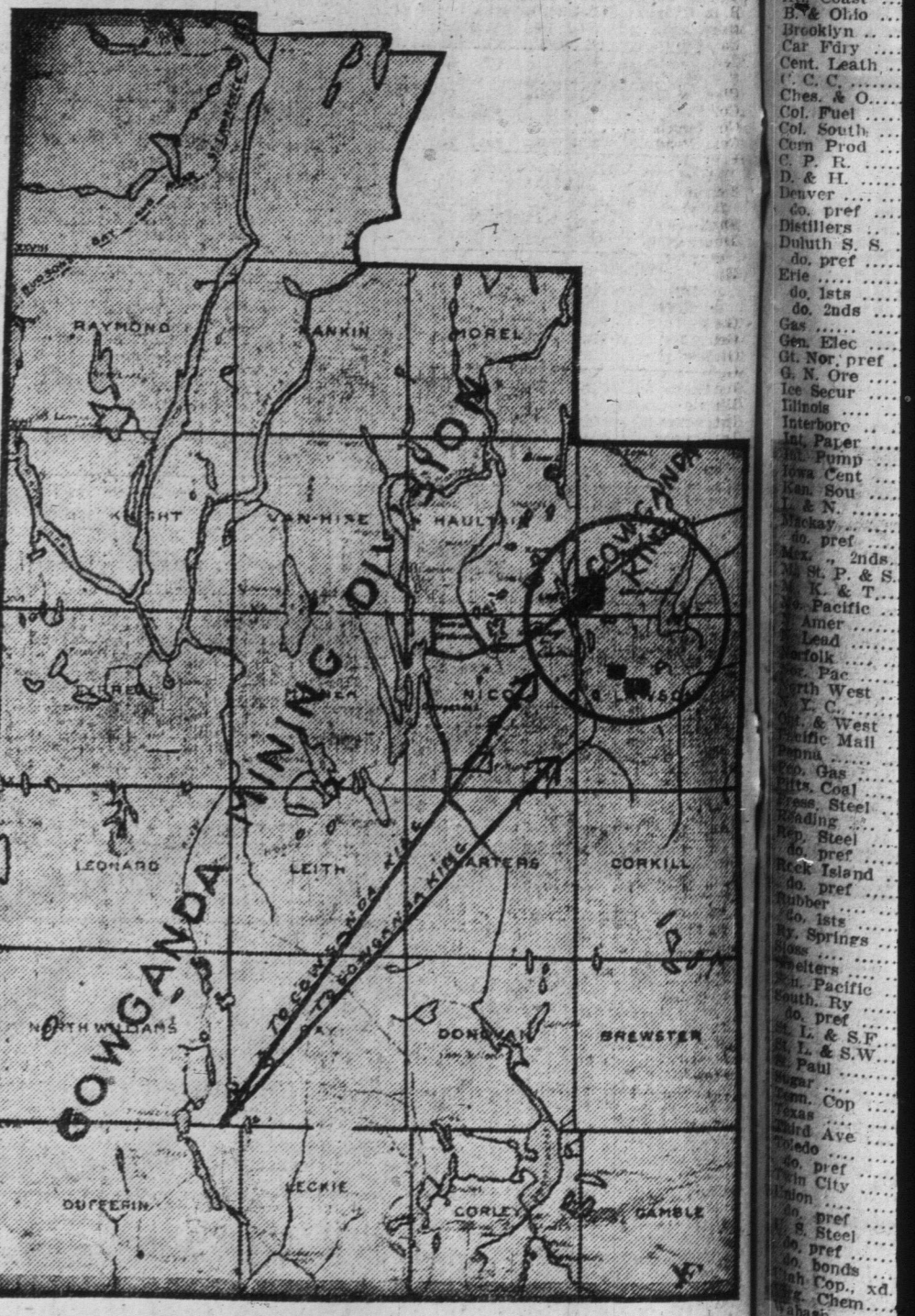

Further Advances Forced in New York Securities

Wall Street Operations Are Continued on Bullish Tactics—Local Market Active, But Advances Are Small.

World Office, Friday Evening, March 18.
Greater activity occurred at the Toronto Stock Exchange to-day, the reason for which was not altogether understood by traders in this market. The only explanation for the new buying was on account of an upward movement in the New York Market, but despite the increased volume of business, prices responded very feebly.

At Dominion Steel and Duluth Superior were the speculative features of to-day's operations. Rio advanced about a point above yesterday's low prices, Dominion Steel held between yesterday's high and low figures, while Duluth Superior gained the dividend which was taken off the stock in to-day's prices.

There was nothing in the market to incite immediate buying, and speculation existed throughout the day as to the reason for the exceptional demand for some of the local securities.

The pool in Dominion Steel operated from Montreal made active dealings in the issue to-day, and a notice to Dominion Coal shares this stock was also marked up.

The day's transactions were presumably built on nothing less than the fact that new speculative buying could be brought into the market by advancing prices, but the advances were too narrow to allow even floor trading profitable operations.

The announcement during the session that the Toronto Railway had won its case before the privy council incited no buying of this stock, and not even one share was dealt in during the whole day.

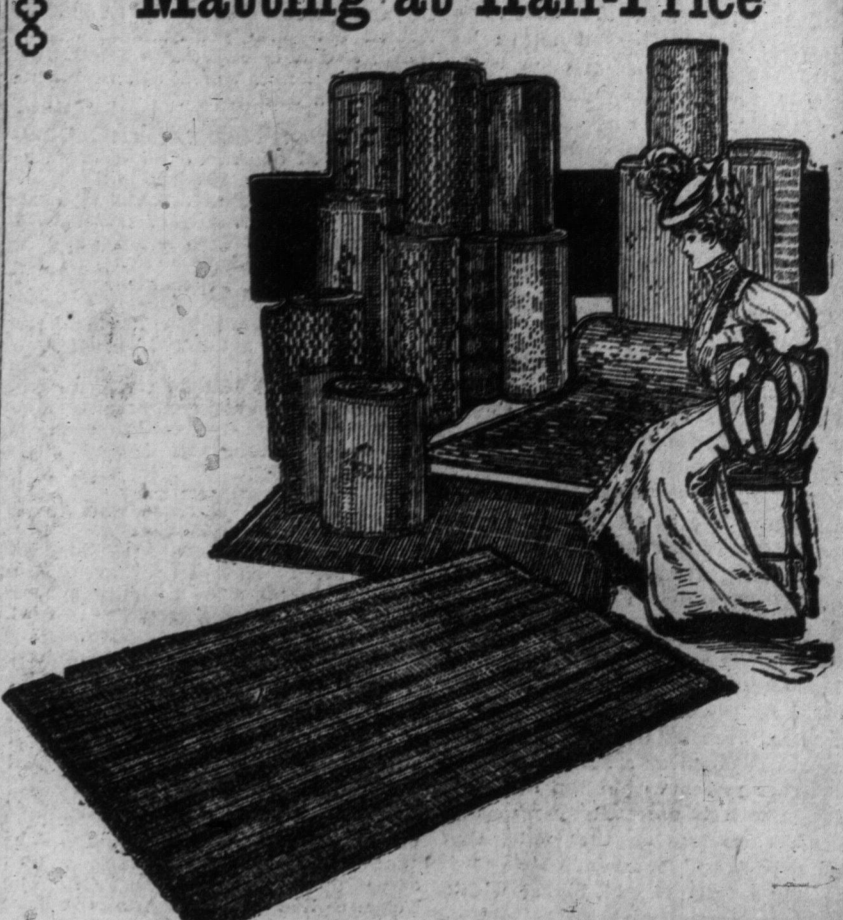
