DON FOUNDRY BURNS POOR WATER SUPPLY

One Storey Structure at Foot of Cherry Street is Completely Destroyed.

Fire was discovered in the Don Foundry, dast of Cherry-street, on the bay front, at 7.50 last night and an alarm run in from Front and Cherry-streets. but so firmly had the flames seized upon the single storey, iron-sheeted structure that the firemen, working with a limited water supply, were unable to do more than hold the blaze in check, while many of the valuable moulds were removed from the doomed struc-

The cause of the blaze is unknown. It is believed to have been live to either electric wire or to a spark from the furnace. The iron sheeting proved a venting free access to the burning wood





NEW YORK, March 18 .- A St. Petersburg cable says: Something like an epidemic of sui-
