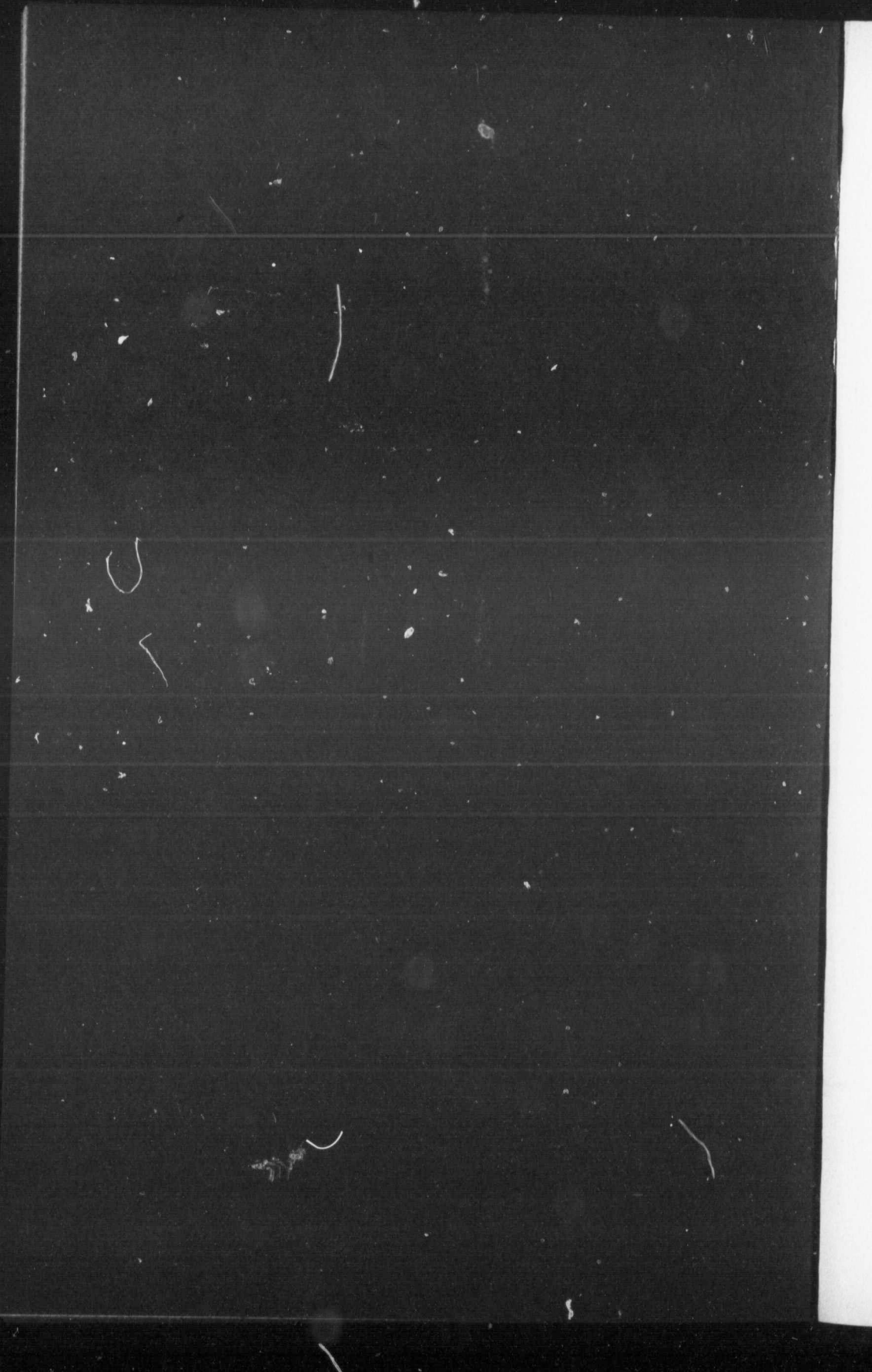

ANNUAL REPORT, 1898-'99.

In presenting the Annual Report of 1898-'99 the Council desire to call the attention of the members to the change in the date of the financial and working year which will hereafter end on the 31st of May instead of the 31st of December, and the annual meeting will be held in the month of June after the close of the year's work.

These and other desirable amendments to the By-laws will be submitted to the members for their approval at the annual meeting.

This report therefore comprises the work and proceedings of the Association for eighteen months. In future the annual report will comprehend the active months of the year, beginning in the Autumn and closing in the Spring.

The financial statements of the Association set forth on pages 11 to 15 will be found to be very satisfactory.

The rapidly increasing love and knowledge of art in our city has been the cause of so great an influx of members to the Association that the galleries have on occasions been inconveniently overcrowded and the Council have been, very reluctantly, compelled to limit the number of members to 800 for the present. The wall space, seating capacity at lectures, and the class rooms have all been taxed to their full extent during the past year and a half and larger accommodation is needed to enable our Art School to develop its powers for instruction not only to the pupils but to the public who are also students.

Two Annual Spring Exhibitions have been held since the publication of the last report, namely in 1898 and 1899,

the latter being of especial interest owing to its being the year for the Royal Canadian Academy to hold its exhibition in Montreal.

This report does not deal critically with pictures and other objects of art shown at the exhibitions of the Association, but the progress in the quality of the new work has been most satisfactory, while the loan exhibitions have been extraordinarily rich in masterpieces.

Love of art is therefore shown to be growing alike in the student, the public and the collector, and in this the Association has the satisfaction of knowing that it has helped to some extent.

SPRING EXHIBITION.

The 18th Annual Spring Exhibition was held from the 4th to 23rd of April, 1898, opening with a private view for members and exhibitors. 118 Oils, 94 Water Colours and Pastels were accepted, also some Architectural Drawings and Sculpture, and a small exhibit of decorated China. The sales were less than usual. The attendance was, of members 3115, non-members 626, total 3741.

LOAN EXHIBITIONS.

The Loan Exhibitions which took place in the Winters of 1898 and 1899 were extremely interesting to all who were fortunate enough to see them. The remarkable number and quality of works exhibited including many examples of the Great Masters shown in public for the first time in Montreal, is proof of the growth of the city as an art centre.

The members of the Art Association and the public generally are greatly indebted to those who so generously lend their valuable pictures for these exhibitions.

By the kindness of the President afternoon tea was provided for the visitors, and the Ladies Morning Musical most kindly supplied interesting programmes of excellent

music which was gratefully appreciated by the Council and members.

The exhibition of 1898 opened on January 25th with a private view for members and closed on February 8th. Seventy-nine Oil paintings and a few Pewters and Bronzes were exhibited, sixty-two Artists being represented. The attendance was, of members 4804, non-members 3056, total 7861.

In 1899 the exhibition opened with an evening reception which was very largely attended on February 20th, and continued for three weeks, closing Saturday, March 11th. Fifty-four Paintings were exhibited representing thirty Artists. Attendance of members 4386, non-members 2006, total 6392.

Royal Canadian Academy.

20TH ANNUAL EXHIBITION.

The Royal Canadian Academy, under the usual triennial arrangement with the Art Association held its exhibition this year in the Galleries, opening on the 7th of April and closing on the 29th, the last occasion being in 1896.

The exhibition was generally admitted to have attained the highest average of any ordinary exhibition yet held by the Academy, careless and amateurish work was certainly much less in evidence than formerly.

His Excellency the Governor General and Lady Minto evinced their interest in the Academy by coming from Ottawa especially to be present at the Private View. After some opening remarks by the President of the Academy, Mr. Robert Harris, His Excellency delivered a short address and formally opened the exhibition.

The opening was largely attended by members of the Academy and of the Association. The attendance of visitors

was at first good but fell off very much during the last week, confirming the experience of former years which clearly shows that public interest cannot be relied upon so late in the season, it is therefore strongly recommended that future exhibitions be held in March.

The number of works exhibited was :—Oils 144, Water Colours and Pastels 86, with some Miniatures and Architectural and other drawings, a number of sales were made. The attendance including the private view was 3,200 members and 840 non-members.

XMAS EXHIBITION.

A small exhibition of pictures by Canadian Artists was arranged in December, which met with so much encouragement as to justify its becoming an annual event. A number of sales were made.

ART CLASSES.

Director, WILLIAM BRYMNER, R.C.A.

(Fees for the session \$40, term \$25, month \$10.)

The seventeenth session (1897-98) of the advanced Art Classes opened on October 15th, 1897, and closed May 13th, 1898. 42 pupils attended the classes.

In the competition for the Association scholarships, 26 took part. The successful ones were :

In the Life Class, Mary S. Norris.

In the Antique Class, Candide Bienvenu and Greta Murray, equal. The Scholarship was divided, giving one year to each.

1898-99.

The eighteenth session opened on October 14th, 1898, and closed May 12th, 1899. 51 pupils attended the classes. There were 27 competitors for the scholarships, which were awarded as follows :

In the Life Class, Eveline Clay and F. W. Hutchison, equal, scholarship for one year each. Honorable mention to Ada Kelly and Mabel Sclater.

In the Antique Class, Gustave Monet first, honorable mention to Edward Boyd.

MR. BRYMNER'S REPORT.

The number of pupils attending the classes during the session of 1898-1899 has been greater than in former years. The exhibition of drawings done during the year, held in May, showed a good average of work fully equal to that of any previous exhibition.

Formerly there was a living model in the life class on three days of the week only, this was changed to six days, and the new arrangement was found to be much to the advantage of the pupils. The Antique Class would be greatly benefited by the addition of some important casts.

The Anatomy Lectures by Dr. Tait-MacKenzie are a new feature and it is to be hoped a permanent one.

ANATOMY CLASS.

Lecturer, DR. R. TAIT MCKENZIE.

(Fees \$5.00 for course of lectures ; students attending regular classes, \$3.00.)

A course of ten lectures was given on Monday afternoons at 4.30 o'clock, commencing November 14th, 1898, and finishing February 6th, 1899. 28 pupils attended.

WATER COLOUR CLASS.

Sketching Classes were held from September 5th to October 11th, 1898, the work being chiefly out of doors.

15 pupils attended.

The series of lectures given during the winter months proved to be very interesting and attractive and were attended by so large a number of members that much difficulty was experienced in giving seats to the audiences. A larger lecture room is therefore much needed.

Prof. F. P. Walton, Dean of the Faculty of Law, McGill University, March 6th, 1899. "Oxford," with illustrations.

ART ASSOCIATION OF MONTREAL.

Proceedings of Annual Meeting.

The Annual General Meeting of the Members of the Association, duly summoned, was held at the Gallery, on Thursday, June 22nd, at 5 P.M.

Present:—Mr. E. S. Clouston, Councillor, in the chair; Dr. W. Gardner, Messrs. C. J. Fleet, W. J. Learmont, D. Morrice, A. T. Taylor, Councillors; Messrs. R. Harris, P.R.C.A., J. H. Joseph, Life Members; Hon. Judge Würtele, Lt-Col. T. P. Butler, Dr. J. G. Adami, Prof. J. Cox, Messrs. R. A. Becket, A. Browning, G. F. Burnett, T. H. Carter, W. T. Castle, J. Try-Davies, G. Hadrill, T. Hiam, E. Judge, A. Mitchell, R. W. Oliver, C. S. J. Phillips, D. Robertson, C. P. Sclater, J. Tasker, W. F. Torrance, and others.

It was agreed that the Minutes of the Annual General Meeting, held on Friday, March 4th, 1898, be taken as read, and confirmed.

Copies of the Report for the years 1898-99 being in the hands of the members present, it was taken as read, and on motion of the Chairman it was adopted.

The Secretary reported that it had been found necessary to amend the by-laws, and he read the alterations recommended by the Council. One of the proposed changes increased the annual fee for members holding family tickets, from \$7.50 to \$10.00.

A discussion of the amendments as proposed then took place, and explanations as to the changes were given by the Chairman and Secretary.

Mr. G. F. Burnett moved in amendment, seconded by Mr. J. H. Joseph: "That the subscription for old members remain the same, and new members be increased to \$10.00." Not carried.

Mr. E. Judge moved in amendment, seconded by Mr. J. H. Joseph: "That the subscription remain unchanged." Not carried.

On the question presented to the meeting: "If the changes be voted on singly or as a whole;" the meeting unanimously signified its desire, that the amendments be voted on as a whole.

It was then moved by Mr. E. S. Clouston, seconded by Mr. C. J. Fleet, and resolved, that on the recommendation of the Council and with the approval of the Court of Governors the By-Laws be amended as follows:—

BY-LAW NO. 1—Be amended, by adding after the word "Association"—The Council shall from time to time, by resolution, have power to limit the number of Annual Members. The By-Law will then read:—

The Association shall consist of Patrons, Benefactors, Governors, Fellows, and other Members (who may be either Life, Annual or Associate). All members shall, when required by the Council, sign the Constitution and By-Laws of the Association. The Council shall from time to time, by resolution, have power to limit the number of Annual Members.

No. 6—By substituting "\$200" for "\$100."—The By-Law will then read as follows:—

A donation of \$200 in money, or of property to the value (in the opinion of the Council) of \$400, shall be a qualification for nomination to the office of Life-Member.

No. 7—Be amended to read as follows:—

The yearly subscription for a Family Membership, entitling the holder, ladies of the family, and all sons under twenty living at home, to the privileges of the Association, shall be \$10. Supplementary tickets for sons from twenty to twenty-five years of age may be issued in connection with a family ticket at \$2.00 each.

The subscription for individual members shall be \$5.00.

The dues and privileges of Associate Members shall be fixed from time to time by resolution of the Council.

No. 14 -By substituting the word "June" for "December," and "immediately upon election" in place of "on the first day of January following." The By-Law will then read:—

The Association shall hold an Annual Meeting on the third Thursday in June (or in case of failure to meet on that day, then on such subsequent day, and at such hour and place, as may be ordered by the Council) to hear an address from the President, and to receive the Annual Reports. The Annual Election of Officers, and of six Councillors to replace those then

servicing whose term expires, shall then take place. There shall be a separate ballot for each Officer and one ballot for six Councillors, all of whom shall enter upon their offices immediately upon election, and shall continue to hold office until their terms expire, and thereafter until their successors shall have been duly elected.

No. 16—By substituting the word “two” for “three”; and after the word “held”—“at such time and place as may be mentioned in the Circular” instead of “in the Association’s Building, at Eight o’clock in the Evening, unless a different hour or place shall be designated by the President or Council.” The By-Law will then read:—

All Meetings shall be convoked by circulars addressed to each Member, and mailed not less than two days in advance of such Meeting, and shall be held at such time and place as may be mentioned in the Circular.

No. 17—By substituting the word “majority” for “quorum” and eliminating the words “but not otherwise,” and the words “through the public press” for “as herein provided.” The By-Law will then read:—

All Business Meetings of the Association and of the Council may be adjourned by a vote of a majority present; and if such adjournment be for more than a term of three days, notice thereof shall be given through the public press.

No. 18—By substituting the word “members” for “persons” and eliminating the word “lawful.” The By-Law will then read:—

At all Meetings of the Association, fifteen Members duly qualified to vote, shall form a quorum for the transaction of business.

No. 19—By substituting the word “may” for “shall.” The By-Law will then read:—

The Council may meet for regular business on the first Wednesday in every month. Special Meetings may be convened by order of the Council, or of the President, or of any five Councillors. Two or more days’ notice by Circular shall be given to each Member of every Meeting of Council, regular or special.

No. 20—By substituting the words “such time and place as may be” for “half past nine o’clock A.M., in the Association’s Building unless otherwise.” The By-Law will then read:—

Five Members of Council shall form a quorum. All Meetings of Council shall be held at such time and place as may be ordered by the President or Council, and may be adjourned when necessary.

No. 23—By substituting the word “may” for “shall”; the word “thirty-first” for “thirtieth,” and “May” for “November,” and “financial” for “Treasurer.” The By-Law will then read:—

The Treasurer shall have charge of the funds of the Association, and shall keep a regular account thereof, and may make a report on the condition of the Treasury at each Meeting of the Council and of the Association. The financial year shall end on the thirty-first day of May, up to which date all accounts, duly audited, shall be presented by him to the Annual Meeting.

No. 26—By adding, after the word “Vice-President”—“or such other Member of the Council as the Council may authorize.” The By-Law will then read :—

All Acts and Deeds of the Association shall be signed by the President or Vice-President or such other Member of the Council as the Council may authorize, and by the Secretary, and may or may not be sealed with the Corporate Seal of the Association. The seal may be such as the Council shall from time to time ordain, and shall be in the official charge of the President.

No. 27—By eliminating the words “and also all property entrusted to it”; and eliminating the words “and in a report, submitted at every Annual Meeting of the Association, to state in detail all doings whatsoever in respect of such insurance.” The By-Law will then read :—

It shall be the duty of the Council to keep all Buildings, Works of Art, Books and other property belonging to the Association at all times fully insured against loss by fire.

By cancelling By-Laws 29, 30, 31, 32 and substituting instead :—

The Council shall have the power to appoint such Standing Committees from the Members as shall be found necessary. Such Committees to be appointed as soon as possible after the Annual Meeting and hold office until the next Annual Meeting, and to determine the duties to be assigned to the respective committees.

The Council shall also have power to appoint Special Committees from the Members as may be found necessary from time to time, and to determine the duties to be assigned to such Committees.

No. 34—By cancelling the first sentence, and in the second sentence substituting the words “date of joining and thereafter on the same date in each succeeding year” for “beginning of the financial year.” The By-Law will then read :—

The Annual Fees of Members shall be due at the date of joining and thereafter on the same date in each succeeding year, and shall be payable in advance.

No. 35—By eliminating the words “no expenditure shall be sanctioned by the Council until the same shall have been referred to and reported on by the Finance Committee.” The By-Law will then read :—

The Treasurer shall, at an early Meeting of the Council after the Annual Meeting, submit a statement of Ways and Means for the current year, and it shall be the duty of the Council to revise the same, making reasonably sure that the Year's expenditure shall not be in excess of its income. No money or property received by the Association by gift or bequest, whether as contemplated by Clauses 3 to 6 or otherwise, shall be used for current expenditure, but the interest of such money, and the income of such property, may be so used.

No. 37—By eliminating the words “and all works so accepted shall be kept in permanence.” The By-Law will then read :—

No Work of Art shall be accepted by the Association unless the same shall be, in the opinion of the Council, of undoubted value and of high order of merit. But the Association may acquire any works having an

historical or educational value, and may sell, lend or exchange the same, or any other works of Art, which may have been purchased by the Association, as the Council may from time to time determine in that behalf.

Moved by Mr. A. T. Taylor, seconded by Mr. C. S. J. Phillips, and carried unanimously :

That Lt.-Col. J. H. Burland being duly qualified and having been recommended by the Council, be and is hereby elected a Life Member of the Association under by-law 6.

Mr. J. Try-Davies and Mr. W. F. Torrance having been appointed Scrutineers, the following gentlemen were declared duly elected to the positions named :

President—Mr. James Ross.

Vice-President—Hon. G. A. Drummond.

Treasurer—Mr. C. J. Fleet.

Councillors for two years—Mr. R. B. Angus, Mr. E. S. Clouston, Dr. Wm. Gardner, Dr. F. J. Shepherd, Mr. A. T. Taylor and Mr. D. A. Watt.

The meeting was then adjourned.

EXTRACTS FROM THE BY-LAWS.

BENEFACTORS.

3. Donors of money or property to the value of \$5,000 and upwards, shall be enrolled as Benefactors and shall have their names inscribed on the walls of the Art Gallery and printed in every annual report.

GOVERNORS.

4. A donation of \$500 in money, or of property to the value (in the opinion of the Council) of \$1000, shall be a qualification for nomination to the office of Governor.

LIFE MEMBERS.

6. A donation of \$200 in money, or of property to the value (in the opinion of the Council) of \$400, shall be a qualification for nomination to the office of Life-member.

ANNUAL MEMBERS.

The yearly subscription for a family membership, entitling the holder, the ladies of the family, and all sons under twenty, living at home, to the privileges of the Association, shall be \$10. Supplementary tickets for sons from twenty to twenty-five years of age may be issued in connection with a family ticket at \$2 each.

The subscription for individual members shall be \$5.

The Annual Fees of Members shall be due at the date of joining and thereafter on the same date in each succeeding year, and shall be payable in advance.

NINETEENTH YEAR OF THE ADVANCED ART CLASSES.

The Session for 1899-1900 will commence on Friday, October 13th, and will close on Friday, May 11th, under the direction of MR. WM. BRYMNER, R.C.A. The Studios are open for work every week-day, and the regular instruction is given from 9.30 to 12.30 on the mornings of Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

The Course is, as far as possible, that adopted in the French Studios, which assumes the fact until one step is well taken it is useless to proceed to the next. A thorough study of form being of first importance, the student will draw from the cast in light and shade, proceeding from simple objects, parts of the figure, etc, to the entire figure from the antique.

Such Students as, in the opinion of MR. BRYMNER, may benefit thereby, will paint from the cast or still-life, and if sufficiently advanced will work from the living model.

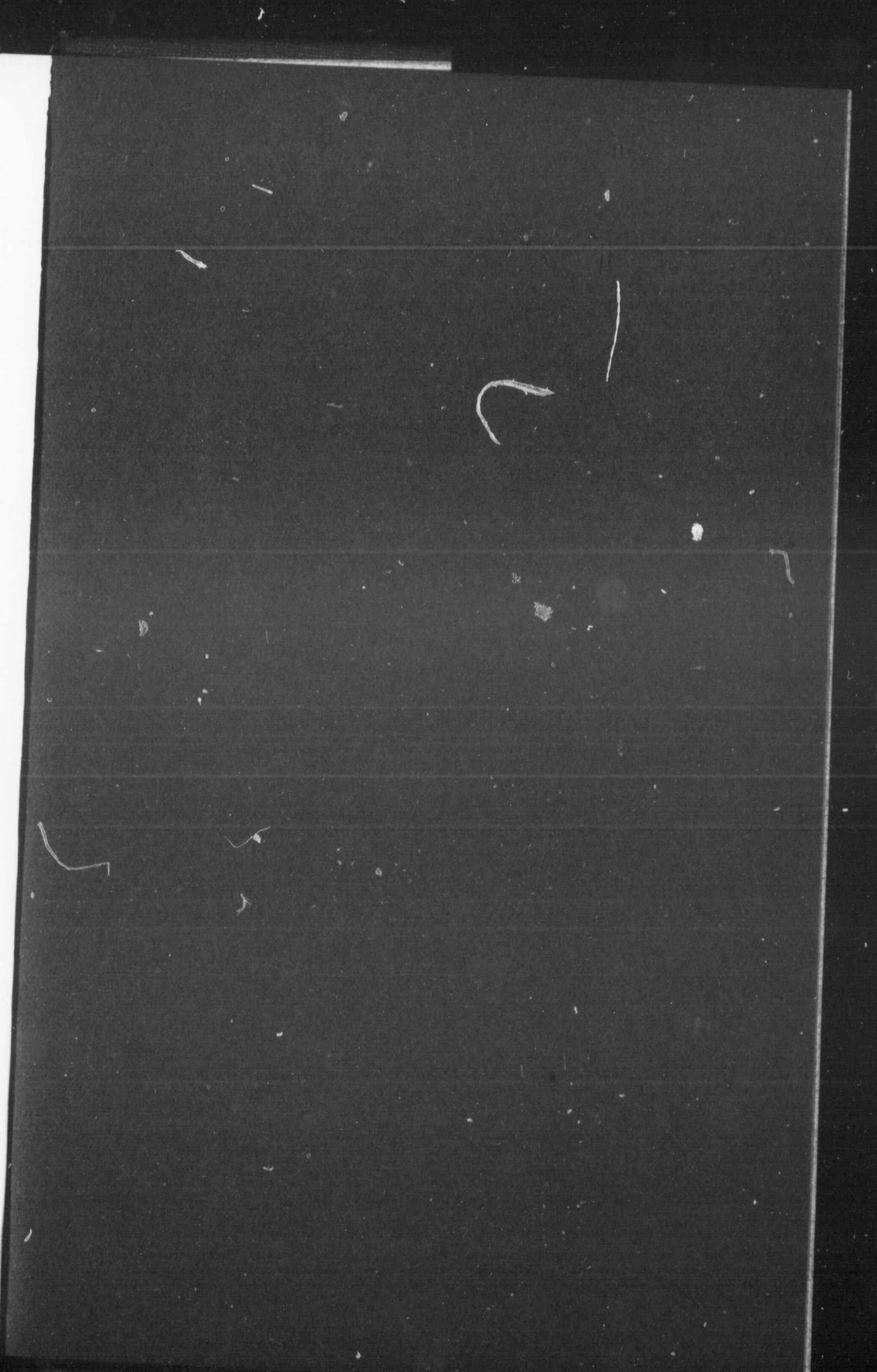
Subjects for composition will be given out occasionally during the Session.

The Session for 1899-1900 will extend over two terms, the first term being from the 13th of October to the 1st of February, and the second term from the 2nd of February to the 11th of May. It will be optional to Students to attend by the session, term or month.

Fees, in all cases payable in advance, have been fixed for the full session at \$40; for the term at \$25; and for the month at \$10.

The classes are held in the Studios of the Association, and Students are allowed the use of the Reading Room and Library, and free admission to the Galleries during the continuance of their studies.

Two Association Scholarships will be offered for competition at the end of the Session, each entitling the winner to two years free tuition.
