said Dr. Devlin, "and the company is open to receive propositions to buy or lease." The same terms for a loan which the New York Life made before the sale will now be offered to private buyers. Interest in the sale was increased by the fact that several sporting interests had been endeavoring to obtain a lease of the property for holding boxing matches. This could not be arranged until the ownership was established. The sale, which was conducted by Bryan L. Kennelly, resulted from the default of interest on the mortgages by the F. & D. Company, which bought the property in June, 1911, from the Madison Square Garden Company for \$8,375,000. The New York Life Assurance Company sued to forcelose its mortgage, and last June Edward E. McCall was appointed receiver and John L. O'Brien was made referee to com-pute the amount due on a mortgage of \$2,300,000. As a result the property, which the city assesses for taxation purposes at \$2,850,000, of which \$2,-700,000 represents land value, was of-fered to recover a total of \$2,476,178. As \$2,000,000 was all that the property brought at today's sale, the former owners have a deficiency 'judgmath' against them amounting to about \$475,-000, in addition to the difference be-tween that figure and the price they paid for the property.
