Rotterdam, Aug. 8—(Mail and Empire cable)—The Gerlin correspondent of the Colnesche Volks-Zeitung writes as follows:—
"It cannot be denied that England by setting aside the rights of neutrals, is drawing closer the cord around the Central Powers. It will become a doubtful case for us, if we are not able to confirm and extend our victory by military

ENGLAND WORRIES THEM.

Rotterdam, Aug. 8—(Mail and Empire cable)—Major Mohat writes as follows in the Berliner Volks Zeitung:—

"The life of France depends upon England taking a further part in the war, and whether it is still prepared to shed more blood.

For us, this is a reminder that we must as far as possible, break this undisturbed communication between England and France. "The declaration that this war was inevitable, and that Germany was forced into it unprepared, and against her will, cannot be supported except by the most extreme partisans. Undoubtedly the confilter could have been avoided, had the government desired to avoir it, and doubtless it would have been, had the Reichstag been taken into the confidence of our rulers, instead of merely being presented with a recital of actions taken independently of parliaments.

"The proposal for a conference, put forward by Sir Edward Grey, was rejected before the members of the Reichstag had an opportunity of hearing them, and the Imperial chancellor's statement with regard to the 'regrettable necessity' of violating the neutrality of Belgium, was also made after the event."

DOES GUNFIRE BRING RAIN?

Sir John Knox Laughton, formerly professor at the Naval College, Greenwich, wrote some time ago: "Theoretically, we can admit that a violent shock may throw large masses of the lower air to a considerable height so as to cause condensation of its vapor."

Dr. H. R. Mill, a rainfall expert, opposes the gunfire theory. "I do not deny," he says, "that the concussion caused by the detonation of high explosives may conceivably determine the precipitation of super-saturated vapor as rain. But it seems to me that such precipitation can only amount at most to a local shower, unless air currents bring in fresh supplies of vapor from a distance."





A SACRED LAKE

A SACRED LAKE

In the course of a lecture which he delivered before the Royal Geographical Society, London, on the Gold Coast, A. E. Kitson, who is the Director of the Geographical Gurvey of that. part of West Africa, point the Fellows of a very curious natural feature in Central Ashanti. This is the sacred lake, Bosumity, which lies about eighteen miles soft which is the sacred lake, Bosumity, which lies about eighteen miles soft which is the same and is the only real lake in the country. It is roughly cricular in shape, with a diameter of four miles and lies in a deep depression with sides rising to 600 and 700 feet above its surface. It has never yet been fathomed. An attempt was made to sound it by A. J. Philbrick, acting chief commissioner of Ashanti, but the line broke after 500 feet had been lowered. The Ashantis regard the lake as a great feliah, believing that it is the abode of a powerful and energetic splrit which manifests itself, among other ways, by flashing lights on the surface and making noises like the discharge of artillery. There are numerous villages round the lake, but no cances, paddles, fish-hooks or brass pans are allowed on or near to it. The natives do, however, permit themselves to catch the fish which abound in the lake, and they resort to an ingenious method of overcoming the control of the marker.

TRYING TO SAVE THE TREES More Attention Being Paid to Their

Protection by Railways and Others. That the shade tree increases the value of property, and adds much to the beauty of surroundings is being more and more appreciated. Municipal corporations are encouraging the planting of trees in greater numbers, as well as protecting those they already have. Many estimates have been made as to the actual cash value of a growing shade tree, but all concede that its aesthetic greatly exceeds its monetary value. In the transfer of real estate, a favorably situated shade tree will enhance the value of the property out of all proportion to intrinsic value of the tree. From a financial standpoint, therefore, the shade trees should be protected.

Several railways are giving careful attention to the trees. Not only are they protecting, by special patrols and otherwise, the forests along their lines, but at no inconsiderable expense, they are protecting them on their rights-of-way. One railway line was diverted from its originally planned route to save we handsome maple trees. Considerable attention and much favorable commen has been bestowed upon this consideratication of the railway corporation.
