



Hints for the Cook

Chocolate Sauce

Two squares chocolate, $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup milk, butter size of a walnut, boil about five minutes, stirring often. Add $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoonful vanilla.

One can of the best grated pineapple, 2 eggs, 2 cups sugar, 1 tablespoon heaping full of flour in ½ cup water, a little salt. Heat the pineapple, add eggs, flour, water; let cook in double boiler a few minutes, add small piece of butter. Bake with two crusts.

Fruit Ice Cream

One pint milk, two cups sugar, one tablespoonful cornstarch, two eggs, two tablespoonfuls gelatine soaked in a little cold water, one quart cream, four bananas, half a pound candied cherries and any other fruit desired. Let milk come to a boil, beat cornstarch, sugar and eggs together and stir in boiling milk. Cook 20 minutes, then add gelatine. When cold add cream. Put in freezer, freeze 10 minutes, add fruit and finish freezing.






