



prison farm at Guelph, Ontario. The story is worth reading. It proves that a practice or city can do better with drunkards or persons convicted of minor offences than send them to a common jail or put them in a chain gang. The Ontario prison farm is not a prison, but a place where a man may get back self-control and self-respect, and at the same time perform use fall work.

The city of Detroit has a House of Correction that appears to be a model. It provides prisoners with work that teaches them how to use their hands for self-support, and they are also well-housed, well-fed and well-clothed; and if ill they are nursed back to health. This Detroit institution is not only self-centaining, but turns into the city treasury from \$25,000 to \$40,000 per year. The superintendent now proposes that part of this surplus as used to provide for the families of prisoners, who may be suffering because of the detention of their bread-winner.
