VIEWS ON TARIFF PRESENTED HERE TO COMMISSION

Statements Submitted at the Morning Session.

Sir Henry Drayton and Hon. G. Robertson at Board of Trade Rooms—Harbor Trip After Luncheon.

The members of the federal tariff commission held their opening session in the city this morning in the Board of Trade room.

The object of the meetings is to obtain as much information as possible as to how the country's fiscal policy is affecting the people of Canada.

W. S. Fisher, who appeared on behalf of the manufacturers of New Brunswick, said that the growth of manufacturing industries in the province during the last fifteen years had been very marked.

L. W. Simms, representing T. S. Simms & Co., Ltd., first traced the history of the brush industry, showing its growth since its inception in 1872.

Mr. Fisher displayed a map showing the territory in Canada in which the population is more than four to the square mile.

Mr. Fisher asked how Mr. Fisher found the dumping clause failed to work. Mr. Fisher replied that there were many artifices which might be used by manufacturers in the states to mislead the customs inspectors sent to investigate.

J. R. Bristol of Halifax branch, C. M. A., said another way that goods could be brought in under this clause was by consigning them to dealers in Canada without a price being fixed at the time of shipment.

Regarding shipments to British Columbia, L. W. Simms said it was more difficult here than in most places of upper Canada to take advantage of mixed car shipments.

Mr. Simms said, regarding the dumping clause, that an appeal to this clause would usually work against their own interest.

Replying to Sir Henry Mr. Simms said the average wages paid to their men was \$4 to \$4.50 a day and to girls \$3 to \$3.5 a week.

B. L. Sheppard said that he had been making brooms for twenty-five years and was making now an average of \$28. He said protection of the industry by a high tariff was of benefit to the workmen in the broom industry.

ARMISTICE DAY IN GREAT BRITAIN

Local Advice of Ceremony of Burial of Unknown Soldier in Westminster.

A copy of the following dispatch from the Secretary of State for the Colonies to his Excellency, the Governor General of Canada, with reference to the Armistice Day celebration in the United Kingdom, was received this morning at local office.

It has been decided that on Thursday, being the second anniversary of the armistice, the ceremony in Westminster shall be unveiled by His Majesty the King and that as part of the ceremonies on that day, there shall be buried in Westminster Abbey an unknown British soldier whose body shall be taken from among those buried in France.

The dispatch also adds that there will be a complete cessation of business at 11 o'clock for two minutes.


Dublin, Nov. 9.—The railway situation is reported as serious owing to the strike of the railwaymen to transport troops and munitions.

RECOUNT CASE
IN FREDERICTON
(Special to The Times.)
Fredericton, N. B., Nov. 9.—The appeal division of the Supreme Court met this morning with Chief Justice Sir J. D. Hagen, Judge White and Judge Grimmer present.
In the matter of the St. John County account, John B. M. Baxter, K. C., vs. John McKinnon, R. B. Hanson, K. C., moved that an order of Mr. Justice Barry of October in directing a recount to proceed, be made a rule of court.
Chief Justice Hagen said he did not see the legal purport of the motion and asked counsel where there was a wrong to be remedied by the recount held as ordered, the appellant had since been shown to be elected by a larger majority than that declared by the sheriff.
The views of the chief justice were shared by the other judges on appeal.
Mr. Hanson quoted a precedent but it appeared there had been only one such motion granted since the passing of the Judicature act in 1918 and that for cause. After a decision the application was refused.

REDUCE THE HIGH COST OF AUTOMOBILING.
Royden Foley, manager of the Foley Aeroplane and Motor Works, and one of New Brunswick's pioneer automobile men, plans to reduce the cost of overhauling Ford cars by doing them in quantities and using special machinery. The plant at 237 City street, which has a floor space of 8,000 square feet, is one of the best equipped automobile machine shops in this part of the country. A most up-to-date vulcanizing and welding department is incorporated. Welding jobs of any size and metal are carried out by expert metallurgists. This plant has been running all summer on general automobile repairs, vulcanizing and welding, which will be continued. Mr. Foley has been experimenting for some time on special machinery for Ford work, and is now prepared to turn his experiments to practical use. The operations through which the car passes are essentially the same as that at the factory where the car was built, so the car is turned out in practically new condition. 





TWO NEW CLAUSES FOR HOME RULE BILL ADOPTED

London, Nov. 8.—The House of Commons today adopted two new clauses to the home rule bill proposed by the government, the first providing that both Irish parliaments shall establish second chambers for the protection of minorities; the second providing that in the event that less than half the members of either parliament are validly elected or for failure to take oath of allegiance within fourteen days, the king may dissolve the parliament and place the government in the hands of a committee appointed by the lord lieutenant.

The latter clause replaces the proposal of the government that candidates for parliament must take the oath of allegiance on nomination.

COURT HOLDS BABY MAY WAIL AND STAY IN BUFFALO HOUSE

Buffalo, N. Y., Nov. 9.—Baby's wailing is no good and sufficient reason, Chief Justice Wolts of the city court has decided, why a landlord, or in the case in point, a landlady, should oust tenants.

FEARING A DELUGE OF GERMAN GOODS

British People Buying Them Cheaply and The Habit May Spread.

Ottawa, Nov. 9.—According to advices in the Trade and Commerce Department the British people are taking advantage of the exchange situation to lay in considerable stocks of German and Belgian goods at comparatively low prices. These goods are offered by the Belgian and German manufacturers at prices in francs or marks above the pre-war figures, but the franc and mark are at such a discount as compared with the pound

that the price in Great Britain for many imported articles is lower than before the war.

This is disturbing the minds of some Canadian manufacturers, who realize that the Canadian dollar is worth so much in German and Belgian money that a similar influx of goods into Canada may be expected. Under the new regulations the customs duties will not be so large as to prevent such an incursion.

Sentiment may operate largely against the purchase of German goods, but this would not be the case with Belgian manufacturers. Belgian factories are now up to within 90 per cent of their pre-war production.

AMERICAN WOMAN IN A NEW FIELD

California Girl Goes Into U. S. Foreign Trade Service.

Washington, Nov. 9.—The first woman, as far as known here, to be appointed to a position in the foreign trade service of the United States has left for San Francisco, whence she will sail Nov. 18 for Peking, China. She is Miss A. Viola Smith, who has been named Secretary to Julian Arnold, American Commercial Attaché in Peking. Miss Smith, who is a native of Los Angeles, Cal., has received her degree of LL.B. from the Washington College of Law, and her ambition it to become a foreign trade adviser and specialize in foreign trade law.

NAVAL PRIZE MONEY BEING DISTRIBUTED

Checks Issued to Those Who Served in Canadian and British Navies.

Ottawa, Nov. 9.—The Department of the Naval Service is now distributing cheques for naval prize money to men having served with the R. C. N. and R. N. C. V. R. A large number of claims have been paid out, but a great many cheques are still held as the addresses of the recipients are not known, and the department would be glad to advise as to the address of any man entitled to prize money who has not been paid.

The claims of members of the R. N. C. V. R. (overseas division) cannot be during the remainder of the year and beginning of 1921, should fall short in number, while, on the other hand, in point of quality the offering will far exceed those of former years, for the same reason, namely, the unprecedented quality of the trotters and pacers that furnished past seasons' racing sport.

Between 500 and 600 Trotters to Be Offered.

New York, Nov. 5.—Consignments so far received and others expected, indicate that between 500 and 600 trotters will be offered to buyers at the forthcoming Old Glory sale to be held at Madison Square Garden during Thanksgiving week starting on Monday, November 22. Although far below the showing of former years in number, yet more than could be expected when the total is compared with the number of actual starters during the past racing season, hence being a double indicator for the existing scarcity of standard-bred horses.

DAYLIGHT HOLDUP AROUSES NEW YORK

Barber Supply Shop Raided by Bandit Trio and Owner Dangerously Wounded.

The east side of New York was aroused on Friday following a bold daylight holdup in which three armed men entered Eugene Cattariana's barber shop at 278 Avenue A, shot the proprietor, robbed three customers of \$200, and then escaped. More than 8,000 people gathered in the street near the shop and possees were formed to search for the bandits. Cattariana was taken to Bellevue Hospital, where it was said his condition was critical.

Cattariana, who lives at 409 East Tenth street, with his partner, Vincent Pittoli, was sitting in the shop talking to three friends when the three bandits entered. They asked Cattariana for an article which was kept in the rear of the store and when he turned to wait on them they drew their revolvers.

The preliminary conversation had been in Italian, for Cattariana does not understand English. One of the thieves called out in English— "stick up your mitts or I'll scatter your brains out."

Cattariana did not understand this request, nor did the sight of a revolver frighten him. One of the bandits speaking in Italian told him to put up his hands. Cattariana replied that he would do nothing of the kind, and tackled the nearest holdup man.

The shopkeeper appeared to be in a fair way of wrestling the revolver from the robber, the fight being at such close quarters that the other bandits did not dare to shoot for fear of hitting their crumpled and did not dare join in the fight, as the other three men had to be watched. The struggling robber managed to free himself, stepped back and fired a bullet into his victim's stomach.

The trio then robbed the cash register and went through the pockets of the men. From Pittoli they took about \$100 and about the same amount from the other three men, whose names were withheld by the police. As Pittoli ran out of the store after the holdup men he met a cousin of the wounded man. They placed Cattariana in an automobile and rushed him to Bellevue Hospital. The large crowd which collected immediately after the shooting demanded that every house in the neighborhood be searched. The crowd became so excited that extra police had to be summoned to disperse them.


