**Pitched Battles in Ruhr District; The Spartacans Strong**

**Crack Regiments Forced to Fall Back on Wesel Fortress**

**Red Army Reported Well Supplied With Artillery—Treaty Directly Violated—Revolt Estimated to Have Caused Death of 8,000.**

Berlin, March 22.—The ministry of defence informed the correspondent this morning that the condition in the Ruhr district was becoming worse. The towns of Odde, Alhen and Drensteinfurt, in Westphalia, southeast of Muenster, had been taken by the communists, it was said, and the movement was spreading north and east. Pitched battles have been fought, the ministry's information showed, and two crack regiments of government troops have been forced to fall back on the fortress of Wesel, on the right bank of the Rhine, twenty-two miles northwest of Essen, after heavy losses had been sustained on both sides. Ten officers in one of the regiments were well armed with artillery. The government forces are well organized, being composed of old soldiers and regular troops. They are equipped with machine guns, tanks, and having batteries of 77 centimetre field guns with plenty of ammunition. Major Beersfeld, a relative of Max Harden, is commander of these troops. He is also known as the man who published Prince Lichnowsky's report, blaming the German government for starting the world war, and was also prominent in the Spartacist troubles at the time of the German revolution in January, 1919. Spartacist government authorities are concentrating troops and planning to surround the Ruhr Valley and force the Spartacists to capitulate. These men, however, are younger and less trained than the Reds.

**OTTAWA TALK ON WIPING OUT NAVAL SERVICE**

Ottawa, March 22.—While government members express some surprise at the announcement that the Canadian naval service is practically to be wiped out of existence, other parliamentarians are not worrying at all. "It is only what we might have expected because, if Canada is to be a member of the League of Nations and the League of Nations is to prevent future wars when could there be a better time to begin disarmament than right now?" said one of the newly formed agrarian party today. "So far as the people of the west are concerned they will welcome any reduction in the cost of armament, especially in view of the present financial conditions, adding, however, that the move will meet with general support after the estimates have been brought down this afternoon."

**SIX INCHES OF SNOW**

During the snow storm Saturday afternoon and night six inches of snow fell. The wind reached a maximum velocity of thirty-eight miles an hour, and the storm developed into a regular mid-winter blizzard. At Point Lepreau the wind reached a velocity of fifty miles an hour. The storm did not interfere to any great extent with railway traffic as the snow was light and kept shifting with the wind. A patch adds that a mob of workmen on Saturday night attacked an isolated post of government troops in the industrial district and killed officers and men with the greatest cruelty. Reinforcements were sent and killed twenty-five workmen and captured twenty-five others, who were immediately stood up against a wall and shot.

**WILD MORNING IN WALL STREET**

General Motors Climbs to 409 and Then Slumps to 363, Losing Its Gain and 17 Points More.

New York, March 22.—Sensational trading in speculative shares, particularly motors and their subsidiaries, was witnessed at the active opening of today's stock market. The initial transactions in General Motors comprised one lot of 1,500 shares at 395 to 400, an extreme gain of twenty points over the week-end. This was soon extended to a new high record of 409, while Stutz Motor rose eight points to a new maximum of 228. Crucible Steel made an early gain of two and a half points, and other stocks, also equipment, coppers, oils, shipping and rails, were one to three points higher. Sharp reactions in the motor group occurred within the first half hour.

**ASK FOR SALE OF WEST SIDE LAND**

Canada Nail Co. Wish to Extend Plant—Automatic Scales for Market Recommended—Early Closing—The New West End Band.

An application was made to the common council in committee this morning by a delegation from the Canada Nail and Wire Co. of West St. John for the purchase of the city land on which the plant of the company now stands near the Carleton Mill pond and for taxation on a fixed valuation for ten years, based on the valuations of last year. The delegation consisted of E. E. Marven, H. A. Marven, E. E. Elkin and William White, and W. E. Scully, city engineer, who also attended and spoke in support of the request.

**ATTEMPT ON LIFE OF PROF. STOCKLEY**

Former Member of U. N. B. Staff in Fredericton and Well-Known Here.

Ottawa, March 22.—Professor Stockley, Sinn Fein member of the House of Commons, was attempted on Thursday night, it was known in Ottawa, he having several years ago been a member of the staff of the University of Ottawa, and has many friends in this city. The attempt on the life of the professor in Ottawa was connected with the University of New Brunswick. After returning to Ireland he was appointed professor of English at Queen's College, Cork, which is now known as the University of Cork.

**THE PLANS FOR LIME CRUSHING AT TORRYBURN**

Federicton, March 22.—A representative of Smith & Merrithew will be here on Tuesday to conclude arrangements for the installation of a new lime crushing plant which will be supplying the mill with lime for agricultural soil in various parts of the province. After the signing of the contract by the company the machinery will be purchased in Boston and will be installed as soon as possible. The capacity of the plant which is in view will be eight to ten tons an hour. Quite a number of men will be employed.

**REV. MR. BONE ACCEPTS CALL TO ST. JOHN**

The clerk of the Central Baptist church, H. A. Prebble, received a telegram this morning announcing the resignation of the pastorate by Rev. F. H. Bone of Brierley, N. S. The invitation was extended last week by a unanimous vote, and the news of his acceptance was received with much satisfaction this morning. The Central Baptist church has been without a pastor since the resignation of Rev. D. J. MacPherson, who accepted the pastorate of the church in Sussex about six months ago. Rev. Mr. Bone will occupy the pulpit in his new charge about the first Sunday in May.

**As Hiram Sees It**

"Well," said Mr. Hiram Hornbeam to the Times reporter, "I see they're going to put up a new railroad station in St. John—takin' in all that property over to Paradise Row. When I read that it set me thinkin'. **John Fitzsimmons Seriously Injured in Car Shop at Sherbrooke**

Sherbrooke, Que., March 22.—John Fitzsimmons, a returned soldier, had his left arm and right hand badly crushed and broken while at work in the Quebec Central car shops on Saturday. He was working under a car which was being raised from the ground when the heavy machinery slipped and struck him. The bones of the right hand were also broken and badly crushed. At the Sherbrooke Hospital it was found necessary to amputate the left arm this morning.

**STEAL RING FROM BABY'S FINGER**

Allentown, Pa., March 22.—A gold ring, a baptismal gift, was stolen from an infant lying in its crib here yesterday by two masked robbers who held up a card game at the home of Louis Patras, an accused \$900 in cash, watches and jewelry.

**MRS. ROONEY'S CASE**

Lawrence, Mass., March 22.—The case against Mrs. Sarah Rooney, charged with being a fugitive from justice, was dismissed in the district court here. The woman was arrested in connection with the alleged murder of Robert C. Moore at Greenville, Me. A detective came here from Maine and after several conferences with local police officials he told them the Maine officials would prefer no charges. She then fled to Ontario where justice charged had been dismissed Mrs. Rooney was arraigned on a statutory charge. She pleaded not guilty, but was found guilty and was sentenced to three months in the House of Correction. She appealed and was held in \$800 bonds.

**Hans Plan Great World Drive Against Versailles Treaty**

Paris, March 22.—Germans are preparing a formidable world propaganda in favor of revision of the Versailles treaty and the holding of a new international conference at which vanquished nations might be represented, for the object of changing or eliminating many clauses of the present treaty between the Allied nations and Germany, according to a Geneva despatch.

THE GOVERNMENT RECORD. By comparison with other governments of this province for many years past the Foster administration has made and is making an excellent record.

But if in the three departments already referred to the Foster government had merely marked time, its new department of health would merit for it the lasting gratitude of the people.

## MURDER OF CORK MAYOR DENOUNCED FROM THE PULPITS

How Brother-in-Law Escaped at Scene of Crime

Increase in Police Force — Line of Mourners Two Miles Long — Revenge for Slaying of Policemen Suggested as Motive for Assassination.

Cork, March 22.—The Catholic bishop in Cork, in the cathedral yesterday, said the country had received a terrible shock in the murder of the lord mayor, but he advised that no reprisals be made. Ireland's cause could not be advanced by outrages, he said. The only party to derive advantage from the crime was in Ireland was the party which always had refused and still was refusing freedom for Ireland. The bishop denounced the search by the military of houses after the murders of Lord Mayor MacCurtain and Constable Murtagh were passed. The resolutions expressed the hope that the government would restore order and security to life.

James Walsh, a brother-in-law of Lord Mayor MacCurtain, was sleeping in MacCurtain's home on the night of the murder. Several shots were fired at him. He says he escaped by putting out a lighted candle and lying on the floor. Walsh also declares that there were some men in the street near the lord mayor's house while the murders were inside. These men, he said, were armed and disguised, and they held up several persons and threatened them with death if they moved within half an hour.

The police force of Cork will be increased today by large drafts of men from various districts.

A procession of mourners two miles long followed the hearse when the body of the lord mayor was carried from his residence to the town hall. Bishop Colahan walked in front of the first body of the Corkian band of mourners, which acted as a bodyguard and which furnished the guard of honor in the town hall during the night.

A proclamation, printed in English and Gaelic, and signed by the lord mayor, chairman of the Republican Guard, was posted about the city. It said: "With griefed heart, I announce to you the death of our lord mayor, Thomas MacCurtain, commander of the Cork first battalion of the army of the republic. The public will observe Monday as a civic holiday to afford the citizens an opportunity of putting out their respect to our chief citizen and their horror at the brutal and cowardly manner in which he was done to death. Let no provocation move our citizens to retaliation or to any unseemly act."

The only reason suggested for the assassination of the lord mayor is revenge for the shooting of the constables. Some persons today expressed the belief that it meant the beginning of a campaign of retaliation for the killing of numerous members of the royal constabulary and soldiers, for which acts no one has been punished.

The inquest into the death of the lord mayor was begun, but adjourned after brief formalities. The solicitor for Lord Mayor MacCurtain's family requested that no former policeman should serve on the coroner's jury.

Alderman MacCabe, M. P. for South Cligo, who had been released from prison after having served a sentence imposed last year on a charge of inciting to disorder and unlawful assemblies, has been re-arrested and sentenced to three months' imprisonment for inviting citizens to subscribe to the Sinn Fein loan. MacCabe has spent almost five years in jail for political offences.

Sinn Fein flags are flying over the evacuated constabulary barracks at Shercock, County Cavan. Sinn Fein policemen are in charge there.

Effect in Various Places.  
London, March 22.—Despatches from Ireland during the week-end show the murder of the lord mayor of Cork to have produced an intense, if subdued, sensation throughout Ireland. This tragedy, says the London Times correspondent in Dublin, closed one of the blackest weeks since the rebellion of 1916. It gives a long list of outrages in various parts of the island, including five murders of policemen and others, and an attempt to kill Professor Stockley of Cork.

In Dublin the citizens are looking to the future with anxiety and alarm. The motive of the Cork murder continues as mysterious as ever. No arrests have been reported. Among the theories advanced is one that the lord mayor was murdered as a warning to others because he recently had the courage publicly to denounce an attempt to murder a policeman in Cork.

London has been deeply stirred, and newspapers, which, while unreservedly condemning the crime, maintain it does not differ from those which have long terrorized Ireland. It is declared that Ireland, for the moment, is largely under the domination of secret murder societies, the members of which are sworn to kill those whom they believe to stand in their way, but who the conspirators are puzzles the police as much as the public. It is remarked as a phenomenon that where murder is letted exist, members after a while begin to be suspected of murdering each other.

### RECENT DEATHS

The death of Mrs. Joshua D. Colwell took place at her residence in Jemseg, Queens county, on March 10, after short illness. Besides her husband she leaves three sons and five daughters.

James L. Douglas, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Downing, of Jemseg, died in Woodstock after a brief illness.

John Joseph, eight months' old child of Mr. and Mrs. John E. Campbell, died March 20 in Little River.

### NO HAIL FOR 16 YEARS.

Havana, March 22.—The first hail storm of sixteen years here, according to the weather bureau, swept over this city yesterday. Street traffic was tied up and some small craft in the harbor were lost.

Now Definitely Known It Is to Come

Thos. Cozzolino Project Well Under Way But Gives Place to Plan of Montreal Interests - Steel People In It.

(Canadian Press.)

Sydney, N. S., March 22—It is definitely known that Sydney is to have a first class modern hotel. Eleven months ago the Sydney Hotel was reduced to ashes. Early last year plans were submitted for a moderately equipped house, to cost in the vicinity of a half million dollars. Later these plans were modified, but due to the steadily upward cost of labor and materials it was again found necessary to revise the scheme and then it was that the estimated cost advanced to more than three-quarters of a million. Next, Thomas Cozzolino, contractor, undertook to organize an entirely new proposition. The first scheme quickly became revived. The Sydney Board of Trade was called into requisition, and a week ago the board had concrete proposals from Mr. Cozzolino and decided upon immediate action. These plans involve an outlay of something more than a half million. A committee started a canvass among the city's business men and in ten hours had secured subscriptions of more than \$100,000 to a bond issue. At this juncture H. J. McCann, assistant to the president of the Dominion Steel Corporation, returned from Montreal, and announced that he had succeeded in interceding his principals in the city and now all other proposals have been abandoned. Mr. McCann secured the co-operation of F. I. Wanklyn, a director of "Dominion," whose sympathy with the intensive development of this district is well known, and carried his entire scheme to a successful issue in Montreal. The steel people are interested in the scheme to the tune of \$800,000.

Wallace, dean of the faculty of theology in Victoria University, after having been on the university staff for thirty-five years, and in the Methodist ministry nearly half a century, has resigned. His resignation is not to take effect until August.

The officers saw a woman hastily take a doll from her trunk and attempt to carry it away. They also noticed that two other women on the pier were clutching dolls in their arms. Upon investigation they found a gallon jug of brandy beneath the dress of the first doll and a quart bottle in the clothing of each of the others.

A search of the vessel brought to light quantities of liquor stowed up in ventilators and lockers behind piles of life preservers. More than it was found in the crew's quarters. No arrests were made.

GETS \$7,000 FOR PICTURE SHE HAD OFFERED FOR \$10

Widow of Hamilton, Ont. Mayor Owned "Old Master" Painting and Did Not Know It.

Hamilton, Ont., March 22—The widow of a former mayor of this city, being in poor circumstances, offered to sell a picture to a local dealer a few months ago for \$10. The dealer, J. Snor, thought the picture was worth more than this. He sent it to Amsterdam, Holland, with a view to getting a better price for it. Last week a letter was received from the Dutch capital with an enclosed check for \$7,000 for the picture which had proved to be an old masterpiece. The check was turned over to the widow, who paid the dealer a liberal commission.

CANADA IN IT. Project for Imperial Bureau of Statistics in London.

Ottawa, March 22—(By Canadian Press)—An imperial bureau of statistics in which Canada will be represented, it is understood, in process of formation. The headquarters will probably be in London. Its aim will be to act as a centre where statistics from every part of the empire will be available more rapidly than is now possible.

OPERATION FOR APPENDICITIS SAVES LIFE AS SHIP HALTS.

The Stockholm of the Swedish-American line arrived in New York this week bringing 625 passengers. Gunnar Anderson, a pantryman, was stricken critically ill with appendicitis, and the surgeon, Nils Stenstrom, decided that an operation was necessary to save his life. At a noon last Monday Captain A. E. Hakansson stopped the ship and with the assistance of a stewardess and the hospital steward and purser, I. England, the operation was performed. The man is out of danger.

PRENTICE BOYS' FAIR.

The F. A. P. B. fair which is being successfully conducted in their hall in Guilford street, West End, was again patronized on Saturday evening by large numbers. The following are the prize winners: Bean board, thermos bottle, A. Campbell; ladies' bean board, electric toaster, J. Fairweather; blood gates, carving set, H. Pitt; pins, silver plated dish, F. McVicar; excelsior, half dozen silver spoons, A. McFarlane; bagatelle, silver plate, M. Thompson; and ring toss, a clock won by W. Gray.

Strike at Hamilton. Hamilton, Ont., March 22—More than 100 employees of the Hamilton Bridge Works Company went on strike on Saturday because the company refused wage increases demanded.

FRENCH HAVE NEW LONG RANGE GUN

Paris, March 22—The French government has just bought the invention rights in a gun, which it is claimed, will shoot three times as far as "Big Bertha" which the Germans used to bombard Paris. As the Bertha shells were thrown over sixty miles, this means that the new gun will have a range of one hundred and eighty miles.

The gun and shell are the invention of a French mining engineer, Delamarre Mase, who served as a lieutenant in the French army. After he had satisfied himself as to the worth of the invention, he laid his plans for the French War Ministry towards the end of last year. The French government had a trial battery constructed and carried out tests which have proved so satisfactory that they immediately bought the patent. It is said that existing guns can be adapted to the new invention at a small cost and even that rifles and machine-guns may be fitted in such a way as to double or treble the length of the flight of the bullet. The speed of the projectile is increased fifty per cent, and the shells which in ordinary guns, have a speed of 800 metres per second, have with the new invention a speed of 1,300 metres. The inventor has been given liberty to sell his patent to Belgium and England, and it is said that experiments are being made in these countries.

JOE HURLEY SHOT IN CHICAGO "BAD LANDS"

Chicago, March 22—Chicago's labor war, dormant since the murder of Maurice "Boss" McGonigle, on Feb. 3, broke out again last week with the finding of the body of Joe Hurley, labor leader and E. Wright's lieutenant, lying in a street on the South Side "Bad Lands." He had been shot in the back, dying instantly. A trail of blood led from the body to a nearby saloon, noted as a gathering place for labor leaders. Hurley was a pal of "Sonny" Dunn, brother-in-law of Wright, who recently forfeited his bonds in a grand larceny case and disappeared.

REMOVES APPENDIX ON STORM-TOSSED SHIP

Stockholm's Surgeon Performs Difficult Operation on Vessel's Cook.

New York, March 22—After a rough voyage of nineteen days, so rough that the ship had to be brought up into the wind in order that an operation on a cook could be performed, the steamship Stockholm, of the Swedish-American Line Steamship Co., arrived here from Gothenburg, Sweden, with forty-one first-class and 167 second-class passengers on board. While the Stockholm was plunging through high seas, Gunnar Anderson, the ship's cook, was stricken with acute appendicitis. The ship was rolling from side to side, she dipped sharply and lurched quickly. Under those conditions an operation was dangerous. But Dr. Stenstrom, the ship's surgeon, was equal to the occasion. Everybody loves a good cook, and Captain Andrew Koleson had the steamship brought up into the wind in order that the operation could be performed with less danger. Dr. Stenstrom rolled the operating table and quickly and deftly went to work. And the good cook, when seen in this port, was on the road to recovery.

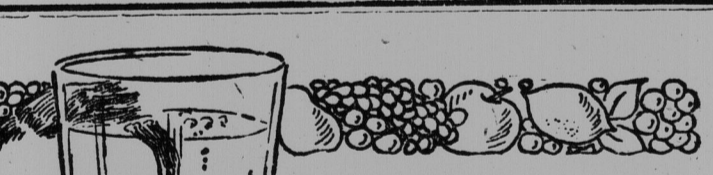

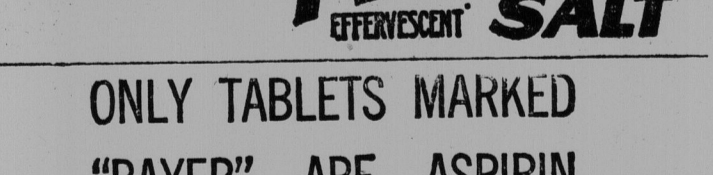

**PROBE CASE OF WOMAN'S DEATH IN SANITORIUM**

Scalded in Bath in Institution in Wellesley, Mass.

Young Physician a Witness at Hearing of Manslaughter Charges Against Nurse—How Baths Were Given—Case of Interest.

A despatch a few days ago referred to a case in the Wiswall Sanitarium in Wellesley, Mass.—the death of Mrs. Mary C. Lots of Malden, by scalding, while she was a patient in the sanitarium and was being bathed. Miss Margaret Evelyn Coumans, young and pretty nurse of the sanitarium, was charged with manslaughter and pleaded not guilty before Judge James A. Halloran in the Dedham District Court. The hearing was to determine probable cause. It was alleged that unlawful negligence by her resulted in death of Mrs. Lots. The latter was twenty-six years old.

Mrs. Lots was a patient at the Wiswall Sanitarium and on the night of Nov. 10 was given a bath by Miss Coumans. It is alleged that the nurse failed completely to shut off the hot water valve and that the water entered the tub, resulting in multiple scalds, causing the death of the patient the next morning. Asst. Dist. Atty Harold Williams appeared for the government and Frank G. Squires, assistant clerk of court, was counsel for the defendant.

The report of Dr. Andrew H. Hodgden, medical examiner, as reported in the Boston Globe, was to the effect that Mrs. Lots met her death from multiple scalds, and that excepting for her face and part of the chest, she was scalded from head to foot, her back and shoulders being almost burned.

Dr. Wiswall Testifies.

The first witness was Dr. Edward Holmes Wiswall, a young physician, who graduated in 1918, and afterwards served six months in the army. His connection

with the hospital was that of assistant physician. He testified that it was formerly conducted by his father and it was for the care of nonmental and insane cases.

Dr. Wiswall could not remember the date of Mrs. Lots' death, but he said that she died in the "tub room," which is also known as the "hydro room."

This room, he asserted, is located in a building occupied, at the time of her death, by excited cases, and there were nine such cases there.

During days five and six nurses were in attendance, but at night there were three, one on the third floor, one on the second floor and one in the hydro room. Miss Coumans, he said, was in charge of and on for several years. She had been employed at the hospital for a considerable time. He did not know her previous experience, as she was employed by his father or Dr. Patch and was there when he came, a year ago last January.

Asked what her duties were, he said, at the time she was head nurse day-times. She looked after the hydro room at night, where it was customary to bathe the excited cases. She was supposed to remain there.

How Baths Were Given.

Describing the room, the witness said it is 22x23 feet, and is in the rear of the building. It contains two large tubs without fixtures, all fixtures being on the wall, out of reach of the patients. The inflow and outflow of water was controlled from these fixtures. The tubs had the usual outflow and overflow, but there was no chain or faucet. The intake was located half-way up the slope at the head of the tub. The water temperature, he declared, was controlled by a mixing chamber operated by a valve.

A valve, and the key by means of which it is operated, were introduced, Dr. Wiswall said, that the fixtures were about eight years old, but whether they were or were not of a standard type in use in psychopathic hospitals, he could not say.

A prolonged bath of the type given Mrs. Lots was then described by the witness. He said that the patient was slung in a canvas hammock made of strips, and was then lowered, the strips so arranged that the patient's head could not go under water. Canvas sheeting was placed about especially excited cases, to keep them in the tub.

Mrs. Lots, he said, was sheathed in canvas. He said that sometimes a patient remained in the tub almost twenty-four hours, the temperature of the water being between ninety-four and ninety-six degrees. He explained that the water was let into the tub when the patient had been suspended. Then when the tub was filled, the nurse closed the valve, and put a thermometer into the tub.

District Attorney Williams asked why this was done, if the water was regulated

in a mixing chamber, and the witness replied it was the custom of the hospital.

Dr. Wiswall said there was a thermometer on the mixing chamber, where the hot and cold water mixed before it passed into the tub. On several occasions, he testified, he had seen Miss Coumans stand beside the tub and test the water.

Death of Mrs. Lots.

It was four o'clock in the morning when he first heard of the death of Mrs. Lots.

Dr. Spaulding, the superintendent, came to his room in the main building and told him about it. Dr. Wiswall said he dressed hastily, went to the psychopathic building and in the "hydro room" saw the body of Mrs. Lots on the floor, covered with a sheet.

The tub was empty, he said, and the canvas hammock and wrappings had been removed. Dr. Wiswall described the temperature of the room as "normal." He said he examined the bathtub valves and found them working properly. No water was flowing into the tub at this time.

Witness thought Miss Coumans went on duty that evening at either seven or nine o'clock, and that she had three patients under her care. Mrs. Lots and Miss Reardon were "hydro patients" and a Miss Ryan was a "dry restraint patient."

He testified that Miss Ryan was not violent, but that it was necessary for her nurse to step in and see her about once an hour. For the patients in the tub he said it was necessary to change the water every thirty or thirty-five minutes.

Under cross-examination by Attorney Squires, Dr. Wiswall testified that he is twenty-three years old, was born in Boston, and has lived most of his life in Wellesley. He received his medical degree from Boston University. The sanitarium property at Wellesley, he said, had been in the possession of his family fourteen or sixteen years.

From the time his father died, on Oct. 7, 1918, until recently, the superintendent, Dr. Wiswall said, had been Dr. Frank W. Patch, now of Framingham. The witness testified that he was paid a salary by the institution.

Patients in Psychopathic Ward.

He was asked about the boiler supplying the hot water and replied that it has a capacity of 600 gallons. He said that since the apparatus in the "hydro room" was installed, there had been no changes or repairs to his knowledge.

On direct examination the witness had testified that he believed there were eight patients in the psychopathic ward at the time of Mrs. Lots' death, and under questioning by Mr. Squires, who read the names of the women, Dr. Wiswall said he did not believe they were all there at this time.

When asked if no arrangements were made for extra nurses to care for patients, many of whom were violent and several of whom had "suicidal inclinations," the witness replied that there had been no change in the usual routine.

He was asked about his knowledge of the "suicidal inclinations" of a Miss Taft, a Miss Garney and a Mrs. Meek. He said the first two were not suicidal patients and described Mrs. Meek as "more or less agitated." He admitted that all required special care.

He also admitted that in an emergency the night nurse in the psychopathic department could at any time demand the presence in the room of all nurses who were in the building.

Dr. Wiswall said repeatedly that the nurse on the floor above the "hydro room" at the time of the accident was a Miss Lawrence, while Attorney Squires insisted it was Mrs. Norton. Dr. Spaulding, the present superintendent, who was also called as a witness, said the nurse on the floor above was Mrs. Norton.

Case of Miss Segal.

Regarding the testing of water in the tubs, Dr. Wiswall testified that the nurse was required frequently to do so by hand and not to rely entirely on the thermometers.

He denied that the nurse received particular orders in regard to regulation of the valve on the tub which Mrs. Lots watched and see that the water did not become hot after the valve was shut off.

Dr. Wiswall's attention was called to an alleged accident sustained by a Miss Segal last June. He said this accident occurred in the other tub in the "hydro room."

"The water got too hot, didn't it?" he was asked.

"No, not so far as we could make out," replied witness.

"The patient collapsed, didn't she, and had burns and scalds on her back?"

"No, sir—on the back were abrasions. We blamed it to the patient's objection to restraint in the canvas covering."

"What treatment was prescribed?"

"We applied a healing salve."

"What kind?"

"I think it was resinol."

"As a matter of fact, wasn't it the so-called scarlet salve?"

"Some."

"That was particularly applicable to burns, wasn't it?"

"Yes, it's boric acid."

He did not recall whether boric acid was not also applied.

Dr. Wiswall said that the only statement Miss Coumans had made about Mrs. Lots in conversation with him was that she (Miss Coumans) could not explain the accident, as she had closed off the valve.

He said that, so far as he knew, Miss Coumans was a capable nurse in fact, so capable that she was entrusted with charge of the psychopathic department at night.





## POLICE COURT

The week-end arrests were not unusually large this week, but there were several preliminary examinations to be disposed of in the police court this morning, owing to the approach of the circuit court date. A case against the three leads charged with stealing cloth from Hoffman, Bay Main street, was resumed and the magistrate said he found the evidence sufficient to send the leads up for trial.  
A case against George Axtell and William J. Mulcahy, on suspicion of breaking and entering the barn of Alexander Clarke, Murray street, and stealing harness, was resumed. Sarah Lenine of 18 Chapel street, gave evidence of seeing a man run into a shed on the day in question and leave a bag there. The accused were asked if they had anything to say, while Axtell said he would not say anything now but would leave it until later. They were sent up for trial.  
A case against William Berry, charged with misappropriating money from T. Rankine & Sons, Ltd., also from C. H. Peters & Sons, Ltd., and also stealing a dress, the property of the Dufferin sample room, was resumed. Allan Rankine was recalled to clear up some points in his evidence.  
The accused was sent up for trial on the Rankine and Peters charges, while the dress charge is still pending.  
Joseph Hartley and John Keith were charged with drinking lemon extract in the Union station wash room. C. N. R. Policeman Ross said these men were in the lavatory drinking and he told of finding several lemon extract bottles around there on several occasions; drinking lemon was getting to be very common. He said Keith was the habit of loafing around the station. The accused were told by the magistrate that they were liable to \$200 or six months in jail. They were remanded.  
Arthur Kennedy was charged with having liquor in his possession other than his private dwelling and also with being drunk. Policeman Hogg said he saw the man pulling a cork out of a bottle of gin. Kennedy pleaded guilty to being drunk, but not guilty to having liquor in his possession. He was remanded.  
One giving the name of Mary Carey, who was reported to have been arrested last night on a warrant charged with a statutory offence, did not appear before the court this morning.  
Four men, charged with drunkenness, pleaded guilty and were remanded to jail.

## MAYOR REFUSES TO SIGN DOCUMENT

Made in Opposition to Abutters' Tax Scheme

Never Had Such an Insult, the Mayor Says—Mr. Fisher Recommends Contracts But No Decision Reached Today—Some of the Commissioners Sign.

"I have been in this council for seven years, the mayor said this morning when the paving question was being discussed in committee, 'but I was never so insulted as I was last week when I was asked to sign a document pledging myself to oppose any legislation regarding the taxing of abutting property owners.' The document referred to, it was said, was presented to the mayor and each of the commissioners, three of them signed but the mayor and Commissioner Bullock refused to put their names to it. The mayor spoke feelingly in the matter, saying that it was an insult to ask him to make a declaration of the course he would pursue before all the facts of the case were before him. The remarks were made during discussion of a report by Commissioner Fisher on the tenders for street paving which were referred to him on Friday for his opinion. He reported as follows:  
1. Marsh Road Paving—Received only one tender (\$84700) complying with the specifications and this was much too high for acceptance. Other irregular tenders were also received but did not meet with approval.  
2. City Road Paving—Lowest tender was from the Stephen Construction Company, \$124,070 for all granite blocks of \$87,160 for granite in track section and asphalt on sides, all on cement foundation. The lowest tender was \$29,125 higher.  
3. Douglas Avenue Paving—Only two complete tenders were received, Stephen Construction Company \$129,644 for asphalt with cement concrete base and \$110,235 for asphalt on macadam base; Norman P. MacLeod \$139,040 for asphalt with cement concrete base. No cement in track section.  
4. Prince William Street Paving—Not including asphalt to be laid by public works department. Six tenders were received. The lowest was from the Stephen Construction Company, \$34,297, the next was from James E. Kane \$36,985, and others were: H. O. Clark, \$40,382, and B. Mooney & Sons, \$41,823.  
5. That the Stephen Construction Company be awarded the contract for the City Road paving, granite blocks in track section and asphalt on sides, estimated cost, including curbing, sidewalks, engineering and incidentals, \$87,160.  
6. That Norman P. MacLeod be awarded the contract for the Douglas Avenue paving, asphalt on cement concrete base on sides of street and asphalt on broken stone base in track section, estimated cost, including curbing, sidewalks, engineering and incidentals, \$87,160.  
7. That James E. Kane be awarded the contract for paving Prince William street, the public works department laying the asphalt surface on the sides of the roadway, estimated total cost \$47,000.

The Discussion.  
Before the report was presented the mayor said that if the recommendations of the commissioner were not in accordance with the conditions under which the tenders were opened he would not vote on the matter. These conditions called for a plebiscite on the question of direct taxation of abutting property owners and delay of the work until the result of the plebiscite was determined. The report was approved, however, and Commissioner Fisher moved that it be accepted and recommendations carried out. Mr. Thomson, in order to bring the matter to the council seconded the motion.  
Mr. Jones said he didn't see how the council could act on the recommendation of the commissioner on account of the conditions under which the tenders were opened.  
Mr. Bullock thought the report was not complete. He said if the commissioner would take the council into his confidence and make his recommendation complete, he was anxious to see the work gone ahead with.  
The mayor said that until the council agreed upon the character of plebiscite he did not think that the contracts should be granted. He expected to have a copy of the proposed paving bill from the "Seventeen Citizens" tomorrow.  
Commissioner Bullock therefore moved an amendment that the matter be left over until tomorrow, the amendment was carried.  
The report will be brought up at a special committee meeting tomorrow morning.

## NEW YORK ARCHITECT WEDS FORMER ST. JOHN GIRL

A wedding of much local interest took place in New York on Saturday afternoon at four o'clock, when Miss Jean Cowan became the bride of Norman Herbert Behrens. After the ceremony Mr. and Mrs. Behrens left on a three months' honeymoon trip to Los Angeles, Cal. Upon their return they will reside in New York.  
Mr. Behrens is a talented young architect, a graduate of Columbia University and also of American Beaux Arts. Miss Cowan has been secretary to the president of the Harshaw, Fuller & Goodwin Co., New York, for the last five years. She is a sister of Mrs. Rex R. Cormier of this city. A host of friends here will wish Mr. and Mrs. Behrens long life and much happiness.

## BROSSEAU AGAINST LEFT-HANDER TONIGHT.

Montreal, March 22—Eugene Brosseau will have a new experience tonight when he will meet Al McCoy of Brooklyn, former champion middleweight of the world. Brosseau is for the first time in his career tackling a "southpaw" fighter, one who boxes with right hand and foot extruded. Brosseau has never seen a left-hander in action.
