MOURNS SISTER; FINDS HER ALIVE

Had Identified Girl Victim Of Empress Disaster as Her

GRIEF TURNED TO JOY

An incident in Empress of Ireland Death Shed in Quebec—Another Search For Sweetheart, However, Has Not Happy Ending

Quebec, June 3.—A small group stood around a coffin in the morgue where the victims from the Empress of Ireland have lain since Sunday morning; a photograph was being passed from hand to hand and each who received it glanced at the face of the figure that rested in the coffin. "Yes, I am sure it is she," said the owner of the portrait, as it was returned to him and he gave the name to the clerk who had charge of the section in which the body was.

"Hilma Kallio, of Saint St. Marie, Mich," said he. Then he gave his own name, Vincent Kallio of Kinross, Mich., and said that he was her brother. He had rushed to Quebec as soon as he had been able to get away, to try to locate the body of the sister who had come to America with him from their little home in a village on a Norwegian fjord and now he was sure he had found her.

They took him to the office of the coroner at the morgue, where he might examine the articles found on the body and confirm the identification; there he gave the name. "Hilma Kallio," said the official in a puzzled voice, "why she's not missing. Hastily they examined the list and then they found the name, among the saved. It had been provided to send the girl back to her home in Michigan.

The little man with the fair moustache and the pitiful expression showing in his eyes, broke into tears afresh, but this time they were tears of joy, and soon he was smiling and thanked the officials who had helped him; then, accompanied by his friends, he left the morgue.

Search in Vain for Sweetheart

It was one of the few gleams of joy that broke through the pall of grief that again hung over Shed 27 all day. There was no such joyful climax to the search of Jacob Peterson, from Winnipeg, who had seen Annie Jensen, his sweetheart, on the train just a week ago. She was going back home for a visit and the great news that she was going to carry was that on her return she was to be married to Jacob, who came from the same village and who had done so well away out in the new land. All day long he searched the facts of the dead, but did not find the one whom he sought. Red-eyed and weary, he left the morgue.

Fis Fund in England

London, June 3.—The King and Queen of Norway have sent \$225 to the Mansion House for the Empress of Ireland relief fund. It now amounts to more than \$40,000. The Liverpool fund has reached \$17,500.

Montreal, June 3.—The S. S. Granigan brought in a lifeboat from the Empress of Ireland. It was picked up near Atlantic, somewhat damaged. It is thought to have been set adrift by the wash when the Empress sank. Previous to finding it, the passengers knew nothing of the accident to the Empress, although the Cape Race signal station had informed the ship when she was on the Atlantic and headed for Montreal.

Defends St. Lawrence

London, June 3.—The Times in an editorial this morning protests against the disaster to the Empress of Ireland being employed as evidence of the dangerous character of the St. Lawrence route. The Times contends that the St. Lawrence is less dangerous than the river Thames.

More Bodies to Toronto

Toronto, June 3.—Ten bodies of victims of the Empress of Ireland disaster reached the city yesterday, bringing the total number so far received in Toronto up to twenty-five. Of this number, seven bodies were destined for outside points in Ontario.

More Messages of Sympathy

Ottawa, June 3.—Further telegrams of condolence to the people of Canada in connection with the Empress of Ireland disaster were received by the government yesterday. They included messages of sympathy from E. S. Mulca, minister of Chile to the United States, speaking on behalf of the Chilean government and from the Canadian Club of Cleveland.

A Nova Scotia Victim

Halifax, N. S., June 3.—Mrs. H. P. Dunlevy, of Denver, formerly Miss Grace Fiske of Lockport, N. S., was one of the victims of the Empress of Ireland tragedy. She had relatives here. Mrs. Dunlevy will be better remembered in her native town and province as Grace Fiske. Her personal beauty, her charm of manner and her unselfishness had won her a host of friends. Mrs. Dunlevy was a grand-daughter of the late Hon. Samuel Locke, and grand-niece of the late Senator Locke of Lockport. Two sisters are living in the province, one Mrs. Jackson, of Oxford, the other Mrs. McLean, of Sydney.

W. Leonard Palmer

Halifax Chronicle: W. Leonard Palmer of the London Financial News, who, with his young wife, perished in the Empress of Ireland disaster, had many friends throughout the maritime provinces. Mr. Palmer was a brilliant young newspaper man, and was keenly interested in the development of this portion of the British manufacturers' party which toured Canada, starting at Nova Scotia, a few years ago, and he had in view the organization of a similar tour for next year. Only a few weeks ago, in conversation with the writer in Halifax, he spoke enthusiastically of plans for advertising Nova Scotia in the old country. The sympathy of many in Nova Scotia, who had the privilege of knowing Mr. Palmer, will go to his bereaved relatives and friends across the ocean.

Funeral of Crew Victims Thursday

Montreal, June 3.—The C. P. R. Company states that the funeral of the members of the crew of the Empress of Ireland who lost their lives in the St. Lawrence disaster, and whose bodies have not been claimed by relatives or friends, will take place on Thursday morning at 10 o'clock in Quebec. The C. P. R., will bear the expense.

JOHN A. SNELL DEAD

Lived Here For 20 Years—Mrs. B. C. Tapley is Daughter

John A. Snell for the last eight years a resident of Hampden, Me., died in the Eastern Maine General Hospital in Bangor on Sunday, after a prolonged illness from throat trouble. Mr. Snell was born in Palermo. In early life, he married Mrs. Eliza Dodge Libby, of Pittsfield, and later moved to Milford where he resided for a long time. For twenty years he lived in St. John, where he was mill foreman for Stetson, Cutler & Co., and other well known lumber manufacturers of Indian town.

He leaves to mourn the passing of one of the kindest of parents, four children, Mrs. B. C. Tapley of St. John, and Mrs. A. H. Brown of Old Town; Dr. A. B. Libby of Snyrna Mills and E. M. Libby of Milford. He is also survived by an adopted sister, Mrs. Frank Worthington of Masson in Hampden. The funeral was held from the home of Mr. and Mrs. Mary Hunter of Pittsfield, and three brothers, Wallace and Jesse Black of Deham and Henry N. Black of Bangor.

Mr. Snell was a man of sterling character, honorable and upright in all his dealings and one whom his children all prize up and call blessed. He was a member of the Baptist church of St. John, and belonged to the Royal Arch Chapter of Masons in Hampden. The funeral was held from the home of Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Brown on Tuesday.

WILSON SEEMS SURE OF COUNTRY'S PROSPERITY

Washington, June 3.—President Wilson has again expressed his conviction that any present, unsatisfactory condition in business was not general but was less felt in the United States than any other part of the world. Mr. Wilson reiterated his view at the first conference he has held with his cabinet members, since the Mexican situation became acute. Questions, however, on that subject and on the pipe organ business were given. In reply to the inquiries on the business situation the president said it was his impression that the unsatisfactory conditions centered very largely around the railroads and that was reflected in the steel and other industries closely allied with and dependent on railroad development for prosperity. The president referred to a statement by Chairman Gary of the U. S. Steel corporation that the general outlook in the steel business was good. He does not believe the tariff will come. He is not sure that the Secretary Redfield's statistics of exports were cited by the president.

THIS DUEL SERIOUS ONE

Madrid, June 3.—Antonio Maura, son of a former premier and leader of the Rodriguez Soriano, fought a duel with Sabres. It was exceedingly violent, but lasted only seventeen seconds. It ended with the wounding of both men. Maura's forehead was laid open, while Soriano received a severe laceration of the ear to the mouth. The combatants were not reconciled.

SLOWING DOWN AT THE SYDNEY STEEL PLANT

Sydney, June 3.—Things are slowing down at the steel plant here. The mill fell close to normal about two weeks ago, throwing more than 100 men out of employment. The rod and bar mill lasted down on Saturday night and will probably remain shut for some time. Twenty men are out of work as a result. It is announced that the wire mill, employing some fifty odd men, will be down in about two weeks and will remain so for more than a month. The reason given officially by the company is that they are overstocked, and that the central warehouse cannot handle any more stock. It is understood that the mill will be given an overhauling.

PROBABLY INCORRECT

The Montreal Herald-Tribune publishes a rumor that Sir Thomas Shaughnessy is soon to retire as C. P. R. president, but thinks there is nothing to it. G. M. Bosworth was named as probable successor.

SIGNED BY A MILLION MEN

Washington, June 3.—A delegation of labor representatives, headed by Representatives Gorman and Sabath of Illinois, has presented to President Wilson a petition signed by 1,000,000 laboring men asking executive clemency for Thomas Ryan, former president of the Structural Iron Workers and twenty-nine others convicted in the dynamite conspiracy.

E. N. Zollie of Chicago, attorney for Ford, the convicted man, presented the case to the president, who listened carefully but did not indicate whether or not he would interfere.

HEADLESS BODY OF HINDU FOUND IN NOVA SCOTIA—IT IS MURDER

New Glasgow, N. S., June 3.—A steam shovel, working on the banks of the East River, near Trenton, yesterday unearthed the headless body of a man, that of a Hindu, who disappeared from New Glasgow about five months ago. The body was naked except for a piece of bagging wrapped about it, and a rope tied around the legs. It was fearfully mutilated. An inquest is being held.

BANDIT FOUND IN CALGARY CELLAR

Streams From Fire Department Drive Him Out For Arrest in Murder Case

Calgary, Alb., June 3.—Atanacy Sokoloff, aged twenty-seven, a Russian, third murder suspect in the Esshaw hold-up and killing on May 22, in which Paymaster Jack Wilson, of the Canada Cement Works, lost his life, was arrested last night in the cellar of a house.

He was flooded out with two streams of water from the fire department hose before surrendering. He had been in hiding since Sunday, and friends supplied him with food. He admits that he took part in the hold-up, but denies firing the fatal shot. Manick and Joe Smith, two other bandits held by the mounted police, say that Sokoloff was the ringleader and did the shooting. He carried a heavy revolver.

PROBABLY YOUNGEST BANK MANAGER IN THE DOMINION

He will be greatly missed in social circles as well as in business. The bank here as he has made a host of friends by his cheerful and obliging manner. While still a student at the University of Toronto, he was a young ladies, deeply regret his departure, all wish him a pleasant journey and successful success in his new field.

Mr. Forest is a brother of Miss Della Forest of the local bank.

HOW LOWWAY TAIL MAN ATTACKED

Suffragettes Again Use Horsepower on Doctor Forward, Medical Officer

London, June 3.—Militant suffragettes today again wreaked vengeance on Dr. Francis Edward Forward, deputy governor and medical officer of Holloway Jail. Two women armed with stout horsewhips sprang on to the doctor as he left the prison this morning and were thrashing him severely when a policeman came to his rescue and arrested his assailants.

The women declared their action was a protest against the "repulsive feeding for which this beast is responsible." Doctor Forward refused to charge the women with assault but the police detained them on the charge of disorderly conduct. Once before on October 11, 1913, Doctor Forward was attacked in a similar manner at Earlfield, the southwest of London.

An "arson squad" of suffragettes last night set fire to and destroyed a large crane on the roof of the prison, the southwest of London. A despatch from Belfast says an attempt was made near there early this morning by suffragettes to destroy a residence but it failed.

GETS THREE FOR CAPE BRETON

A. T. Finmore, a former Fredericton ball player, who has been managing the Glouce Bay team in the Cape Breton league for the last few seasons, has been ordered to return to Cape Breton in his new team. He has been successful in picking some good ones and will leave tonight to return to Glouce Bay with a string of three. His acquisitions include Copeland, who played shortstop last year, Lawlor, who has been pitching for Eastport, and "Bucky" Lynch, former first baseman with the Cape Breton league last year.

THE HOLIDAY

The prospects for an out-of-doors holiday today were somewhat darkened by the threatening appearance of the weather this morning but on the whole the elements did not treat the holiday seekers too unkindly and there is every evidence that the day is being fully enjoyed.

Around the city the appearance of the streets almost suggested a quiet Sunday. All the places of business were closed and the king's birthday was fully observed in this way at least. Taking advantage of the opportunity many people left for the country and there is every evidence that the value of many dollars and river boats leaving this morning were crowded, while the incoming trains brought very few passengers.

The attractions of the summer homes, the suburban resorts and the trout streams are being enjoyed by many people of the city that the amusements provided for those who stay at home are not as numerous as they were years ago before the suburban habit developed to such an extent. There are many left in the city however who are seeking amusement and for them the chief attractions are the ball games, the Welsh singers at the Opera House, the special programmes at the moving picture theatres and the Rockwood and Seaside parks, and being provided at the latter for the afternoon and evening.

BURNING BRUSH; HOUSE CATCHES; IS DESTROYED

Calais, June 3.—An attempt to burn some brush in the rear of Mrs. John McPherson's home, resulted in the total destruction of the large dwelling house and threatened the destruction of a row of houses in the immediate vicinity. Fortunately the damage to property outside the McPherson premises was small, but the loss to the owner of that property was about \$1200. Milltown firemen helped to fight the fire.

Blocked I. C. R. Near Matapedia

Campbellton, N. B., June 3.—(Special)—The jumping of a freight truck at Matapedia, N. B., yesterday, blocked the I. C. R. for four hours. A wrecking train was sent from Campbellton and cleared the track for the eastbound Maritime Express, which was given the right of way after a delay of forty minutes. The local express was fully four hours late in reaching Campbellton.

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THREE MONTHS STRIKE OF BRICKMAKERS ENDS

Chicago, June 3.—A strike of brickmakers which tied up building operations here for three months ended last night. The men got one cent an hour wage increase for those receiving less than forty cents an hour. The manufacturers will have full control of hiring and discharging of workmen.

Snow Fall in Several Parts of the Province and This June 3

Fredricton, N. B., June 3.—(Special)—Heavy hail and flurries of snow were reported from various places near here early this morning. There was both hail and snow at New Maryland and heavy hail fell at Nashwaakville. In Fredricton snow fell in sufficient quantities to remain on the ground a little time. The weather remains cool but in all sections the crops are reported to be much further advanced than at this time last year. Seed germinated much more quickly this spring than for many years. A heavy flurry of snow fell early this morning at Campbellton, leaving a white mantle over the fields and hills at the rising of the sun.

MEXICAN SUGAR VESSEL GOES ASHORE AND IS CAPTURED BY THE CONSTITUTIONALISTS

On board U. S. S. California, Mazatlan, Mexico, June 2, via wireless to San Diego, Cal., June 3.—The Mexican schooner Garibaldi, carrying a cargo of sugar, went aground today on Piedras Island in Mazatlan Harbor, and was captured by Constitutionalists. The vessel is breaking up in the surf. The Federal governor of Mazatlan has granted permission to a representative of the United States government to enter the Constitutionalists' lines to try to negotiate for the return of the captured sugar.

IT DEPENDS ON CARRANZA NOW

Mexican Delegates Say He is Ready as Soon as Mexico is Politically Pacified—More Hopeful Feeling at Niagara Falls

Niagara Falls, Ont., June 3.—Attention of the mediators today was turned toward General Carranza. From him must come the next move which will determine whether or not Mexico will be pacified by diplomacy. The way has been opened by the mediators for Constitutionalists' participation in the conference if they care to come in. A note has been sent to Rafael Zubarran, minister of the Interior for Carranza's cabinet, now in Washington. It paves the way for the entry of the Constitutionalists in fact, according to those who are well informed, it is difficult to see how the Constitutionalists can refuse so ardently have the mediators placed their position before them.

The Mexican delegates have also taken a forward step in publicly announcing last night that General Huerta is preparing to withdraw from the provisional presidency and will turn over the government to an administration constituted so as to command the support of public opinion. The statement declared that Huerta would resign when Mexico was politically pacified.

The peace plan before mediators is a simple one. It reaches into internal questions only in a general way. Suggestions as to personnel will have to be agreed upon privately. The protocol, which what is signed here, will be a declaration of principles on agrarian and educational reforms, and advice to Mexico to set up a provisional government having due regard to the interests of all factions.

The Mexican delegates were decidedly hopeful today that all internal problems would be worked out promptly if the United States accorded the new government recognition. The general feeling here is one of optimism. Upon the Constitutionalists depend chiefly whether the trend of developments shall be for a peaceful solution or a continuation of the bitter civil strife.

SEEN BY TELEPHONE Suggestion Made at Institute of Automobile Engineers

London, June 2.—"Seen by wire" was the startling suggestion conveyed in a lecture given before the Institute of Automobile Engineers by Dr. A. M. Low, a well known scientific investigator. Doctor Low gave a demonstration, for the first time in public, of a new invention, whereby he says it is possible for persons using a telephone to see each other at the same time. In an interview, Doctor Low said: "It may be remarkable, but in reality it is quite simple, and I am sure that some day, perhaps not in our time, but some day, people on a liner at sea will be able to witness a spectacle taking place on shore, transmitted to the ship by wireless in the that news is now sent."

Doctor Low explained that he had been experimenting with the reproducing of pictures at a distance electrically for five years. He has been successful already over a distance of four or five miles using ordinary telephone and telegraphic apparatus. Another prediction Doctor Low ventured was that one of his machines could be used for the study of military operations taking place at a distance. This he said, he was introducing a new complication into warfare, and realising with a vengeance Napoleon's idea of strategy "see what the enemy is doing at the other side of a mountain."

The apparatus which Doctor Low, who is 85 years of age, has invented, is extremely difficult to describe except in technical language. It is a screen consisting of a large number of cells, of selenium over which a ruler is rapidly moved by a small motor worked with a current of high frequency, and about 5,000 volts of high pressure. It fits into a box at the side of a telephone. The receiver at the other end is made up of a series of telephone slabs of steel, through which the light passes. Doctor Low admitted that the experiment was expensive, and that at present the invention was perhaps not commercially possible.

SCOTLAND YARD NOT IN FAVOR OF IT

London, June 2.—A bill to enable the police authorities to enroll women constables is to be introduced in the House of Commons by Lord Henry Cavendish Bentinck, Unionist member for South Nottinghamshire.

The officials of Scotland Yard have declared themselves as opposed to the measure. A spokesman said bluntly "We are against the suggestion. We employ special women for special purposes, such as vigilance work, and in all cases intimately connected with women or young girls, to a far greater extent than the public realizes. Moreover, in all our police stations women are employed to look after female prisoners and whenever there is a female prisoner a woman is constantly on the premises. Then again, we work in close touch and sympathy with the many excellent societies that employ women detectives and watchers, and we step in with our constables on a hint from them. So that on the whole, women constables are not only unnecessary, but objectionable, because they would inevitably lead to what one may call special enlistment."

DR. PEDLEY AT CANADIAN CLUB

Inspiring Address on "Resources of Canada"—Says What Was Won by Heroes Should be Maintained by Patriots

Rev. Dr. Hugh Pedley, Montreal, spoke on the "Resources of Canada," before the members of the Canadian Club at luncheon at Bond's restaurant yesterday.

Dr. H. S. Bridges, president of the Canadian Club, was in the chair, and there was for an afternoon gathering a large number present.

Canada, Dr. Pedley said, with emphasis, had already been won for civilization and for the British empire. Having pictured the land as it was before the foot of a white man trod its vast extent, he spoke of the debt of gratitude Canadians owed to the intrepid explorers, mostly of French race, who opened the country out to the necessities of civilization—Champlain, Messoner and La Salle.

"Canada," he declared, in a phrase that might well be kept as a Canadian motto, "was won by heroes and what was won by heroes ought to be maintained by patriots."

The call of Canadian heritage was not only that of its forest, field, mountain, mine and fisheries, but the heritage of what our ancestors have done. "There is a nobleness of obligation for Canada, and to the patriot Canadian," he said, "Take this gift won by such sacrifice and put it to the highest and noblest uses."

The problems of the Canadian people

brought their own challenge. There was the problem of national unity. The vastness of the territory made it a difficult problem no less than the diversity of the elements that went to make the national life.

"We are mingling the types in Canada, just as in England the Celt, Saxon, Dane and Norman were made the bone and sinew of the great British people.

What should be the Canadian attitude towards the men that came from every land, from Scandinavia, from Germany, from Italy and from all lands enough to add, from the Orient? That attitude should be to try to find out what we have in common. If we get in Canada this understanding of the underlying common features we shall raise a great national unity."

Then there was the problem of just and righteous government. In Canada democracy ought to have one of its greatest opportunities, for only a small proportion of the people were illiterate.

"What would Canada be if we could only put absolute trust in our public men? We are between the old Manchester conception of government and the new Socialistic government, and between the two the way seems open to almost any kind of corruption. It would be a great element in the safety and hope of the people if a class would grow up to put part of their best years in the service of their country."



They show St. John in sixth place in Canada in payments made to beneficiaries. The sum paid in the city was \$206,000. The largest payments by cities were, New York, \$82,000,000; Chicago, \$11,882,700; Philadelphia, \$11,800,250; Boston, \$8,003,000.
