ESCAPED "LEPER" AT FASHIONABLE WASHINGTON HOTEL

Washington, June 2.—John R. Early, who for the last five years has made many enforced journeys about the country in box cars, and been under quarantine in many cities, while medical experts have disagreed on whether he is a leper, turned up in Washington again today, and before his identity was discovered took quarters at a fashionable uptown hotel, the home of Vice President Marshall and others prominent in capital life.

SEEN BY TELEPHONE Suggestion Made at Institute of Automobile Engineers

London, June 2.—"Seen by wire" was the startling suggestion conveyed in a lecture given before the Institute of Automobile Engineers by Dr. A. M. Low, a well known scientific investigator. Doctor Low gave a demonstration, for the first time in public, of a new invention, whereby he says it is possible for persons using a telephone to see each other at the same time. In an interview, Doctor Low said: "It may be remarkable, but in reality it is quite simple, and I am sure that some day, perhaps not in our time, but some day, people on a liner at sea will be able to witness a spectacle taking place on shore, transmitted to the ship by wireless in the that news is now sent."

Doctor Low explained that he had been experimenting with the reproducing of pictures at a distance electrically for five years. He has been successful already over a distance of four or five miles using ordinary telephone and telegraphic apparatus. Another prediction Doctor Low ventured was that one of his machines could be used for the study of military operations taking place at a distance. This he said, he was introducing a new complication into warfare, and realising with a vengeance Napoleon's idea of strategy "see what the enemy is doing at the other side of a mountain."

The apparatus which Doctor Low, who is 85 years of age, has invented, is extremely difficult to describe except in technical language. It is a screen consisting of a large number of cells, of selenium over which a ruler is rapidly moved by a small motor worked with a current of high frequency, and about 5,000 volts of high pressure. It fits into a box at the side of a telephone. The receiver at the other end is made up of a series of telephone slabs of steel, through which the light passes. Doctor Low admitted that the experiment was expensive, and that at present the invention was perhaps not commercially possible.

SCOTLAND YARD NOT IN FAVOR OF IT

London, June 2.—A bill to enable the police authorities to enroll women constables is to be introduced in the House of Commons by Lord Henry Cavendish Bentinck, Unionist member for South Nottinghamshire.

The officials of Scotland Yard have declared themselves as opposed to the measure. A spokesman said bluntly "We are against the suggestion. We employ special women for special purposes, such as vigilance work, and in all cases intimately connected with women or young girls, to a far greater extent than the public realizes. Moreover, in all our police stations women are employed to look after female prisoners and whenever there is a female prisoner a woman is constantly on the premises. Then again, we work in close touch and sympathy with the many excellent societies that employ women detectives and watchers, and we step in with our constables on a hint from them. So that on the whole, women constables are not only unnecessary, but objectionable, because they would inevitably lead to what one may call special enlistment."

THE KING'S BIRTHDAY.

Nothing that has transpired since King George ascended the throne has lessened popular regard for him, or weakened popular confidence in him as a constitutional monarch.

"He desired something far beyond a more equal distribution of wealth, and he would not have been at all content with a world in which men lived and worked as they do now, but without extreme poverty or riches."

The advocates of tax reform in Ontario will take a hand in the coming provincial elections.

CONCERNING MR. HAZEN.

The Standard expresses the view that the resolution adopted by the board of trade on motion of Mr. W. Frank Hatheway and seconded by Mr. R. B. Emerson, both strong Conservatives, and which was quoted in the Times yesterday, "was practically no more necessary" than the letter of Mr. R. E. Armstrong, secretary of the board of trade, urging the citizens to write to Mr. Hazen pressing for fair play to St. John in the matter of the mail contracts.

The Standard truthfully observes that it was not necessary to address communications of protest to Dr. Pugsley when he represented St. John in the government, nor was it necessary to hold public meetings or send delegations after delegation to Ottawa.

Ottawa, June 3.—After the C. N. R. aid bill had been passed in the House of Commons last night, the balance of the sitting was taken up with a debate on the second reading of the bill of the finance minister to vote \$1,200,000 to reimburse the depositors of the defunct Farmers Bank.

After Hon. W. T. White had spoken in considerable length in justification of the proposal, and had been followed by Hon. A. A. MacLean in opposition, the debate was adjourned to be concluded today.

Charles T. Hillson is very seriously ill in London. His daughter Mrs. B. M. Goodwin of Amherst received a cablegram from Miss Hillson saying: "Your father very ill. Operated on yesterday. Hope for best."

Mrs. Goodwin said that her father has not been in the best of health, since arriving in Europe. He was ill for some days in Naples, and also in Rome. In Venice he wrote that he was somewhat improved but was very anxious to get back to London.

APPOINT THE COMMISSION.

A town-planning commission for St. John should be appointed without delay. All that now remains to be done to secure for this city the benefits of the town-planning act adopted more than a year ago by the legislature is the appointment of a commission. The subject is not one which calls for serious consideration beyond that of the personnel of the commission itself. It goes without saying that the ablest available commission should be appointed, and that it should be given every opportunity and every encouragement to proceed with its important work.

DR. PEDLEY AT CANADIAN CLUB

Inspiring Address on "Resources of Canada"—Says What Was Won by Heroes Should be Maintained by Patriots

Rev. Dr. Hugh Pedley, Montreal, spoke on the "Resources of Canada," before the members of the Canadian Club at luncheon at Bond's restaurant yesterday. It was a thoughtful address, based upon manifestations in the national life that do not come within the scope of everyone either to notice or to analyze for their causes.

Canada, Dr. Pedley said, with emphasis, had already been won for civilization and for the British empire. Having pictured the land as it was before the foot of a white man trod its vast extent, he spoke of the debt of gratitude, mostly of French race, who opened the country out to the necessities of civilization—Champlain, Messonier and La Salle.

"Canada," he declared, in a phrase that might well be kept as a Canadian motto, "was won by heroes and what was won by heroes ought to be maintained by patriots."

The call of Canadian heritage was not only that of its forest, field, mountain, mine and fisheries, but the heritage of what our ancestors have done. "There is a nobleness of obligation for Canada, and to the patriot Canadian," he said, "Take this gift won by such sacrifice and put it to the highest and noblest uses."

The problems of the Canadian people brought their own challenge. There was the problem of national unity. The vastness of the territory made it a difficult problem no less than the diversity of the elements that went to make the national life.

FOREST FIRES ARE STILL SPREADING

Valuable timberland is being ruined by an extensive forest fire in the district near Kelcey and dense volumes of smoke darkened the countryside yesterday for miles beyond the fire zone, while water barrels and buckets have been driven at the rate of a mile per hour, swept through birch and spruce woods in the most disastrous and spectacular blaze that has followed from the holiday fires.

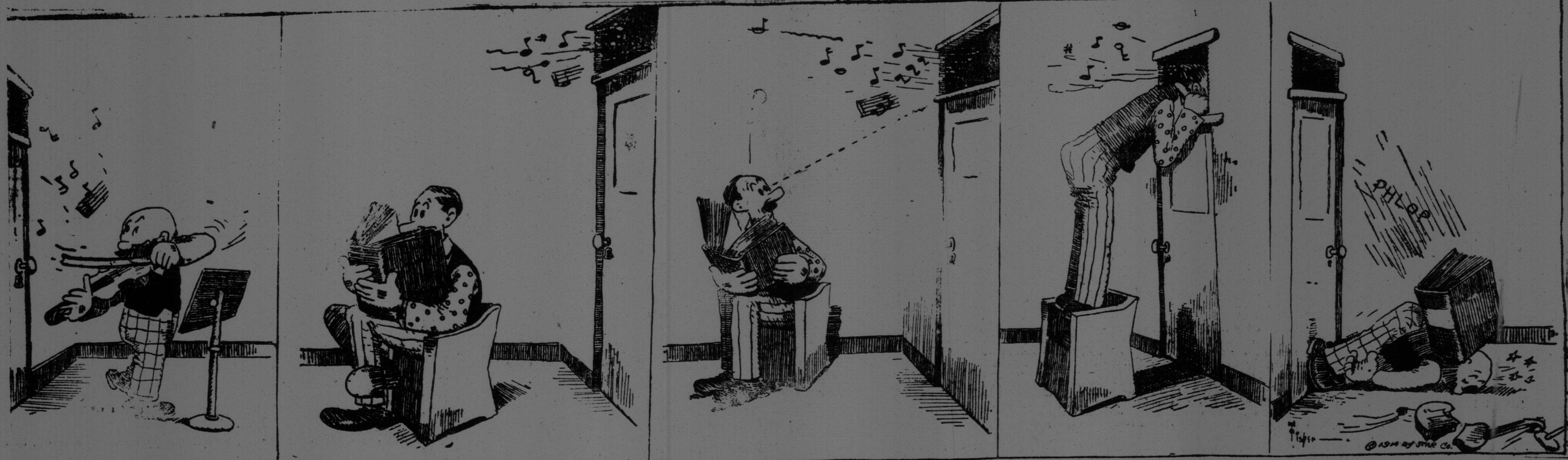

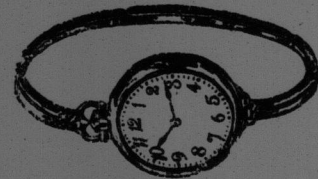



The largest payments by cities were, New York, \$82,000,000; Chicago, \$11,882,700; Philadelphia, \$11,800,250; Boston, \$8,003,000.
