The recent damage to several railroads, traction companies and other users of steel products by floods is expected to result in a large volume of additional orders which will be urgent and for the promptest ship-ment possible. An advance in prices for some products which will be in the great-est demand for such replacements is ex-pected to follow as far as the independ-ents are concerned, but the United States Steel Corporation does not expect to fol-low such advances if made. The corpora-tion has adhered to its policy adopted several months ago of holding quoted prices at about the present levels, eaving that prices are high enough and that fur-ther advances might injure the stability of the market.
