

GIANT SNOW SLIDES CUT OFF HOMES

Alps Are The Scene of Avalanches of Extraordinary Extent

LANDSLIDES FATAL

Many People Killed in Zone of Recent Earthquake—Steamer Ashore With 150 Aboard—Blizzard Sweeps Over Michigan

Turin, Italy, Jan. 9.—Avalanches of extraordinary extent are reported in the Alps particularly in their province of Guncy.

In Yene Valley the only things appearing above the snow are chimney tops and the upper ends of telegraph poles.

Lobau, Russia, Jan. 9.—The steamer Russia from New York for this port piled up on a submerged reef four miles out from here yesterday.

Throughout the night a cruiser, six tugs and an ice breaker made futile efforts to float the liner.

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ONTARIO SILVER OUTPUT 27,000,000 OUNCES

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FINANCIAL HORIZON IS MUCH CLEARER

New York, Jan. 9.—The financial horizon was decidedly clearer today as a result of conferences held during the night to provide against any unsettling of the stability of financial organizations allied with the Carnegie Trust Company.

Early in the day no word of serious disturbance or a threatening condition at any point came and there prevailed in financial quarters a feeling that normal conditions were to be expected.

One thing appeared to be plain, namely, that the troubles of the Carnegie Trust Company and its allies were purely an isolated condition, and not indicative of any widespread or general condition in the financial or banking world.

The December report shows that the Dominion of Canada has a record revenue this year and that the financial position of the country is very strong.

One objection to the commission plan of government has been offered. It is that here are things more important than governing a city on business principles.

We are informed that a new ferry boat can be landed here from New York for \$45,000 and that the craft is suited to the requirements in this harbor.

It is quite improbable that the city council today will be able to overtake all the business that is up for consideration.

It is suggested that St. John might rather follow the example of English cities than of cities in the United States.

The unfortunate accident by which Councilor Price of Havelock was shot and dangerously wounded while cruising in the woods on Saturday is most deplorable.

The question of taxation of unimproved property is at present exciting a great deal of discussion.

There is great disappointment in Quebec and Levis over the apparent failure of the effort to secure the construction at Levis of a large dry dock.

A CHANGE IN TAXATION SYSTEM HERE

Ald. Potts Has Important Resolution to go Before the Common Council Today

At the monthly meeting of the common council this afternoon Ald. Potts will move the adoption of the following resolution: Resolved, that the bills and by-laws committee be requested to prepare and submit a bill for the next session of the legislature to provide for civic taxation based on the principle of raising taxes upon land and business licenses with a poll tax.

In the course of an interview on the matter, Ald. Potts said: "The greatest drawback to progress at present in the building of a city council property whose owners refuse to improve it or to sell, and still have all the protection of the owners of improved property. It is almost impossible for a clerk or mechanic or a business man to buy a piece of land to erect a home, and this is to be greatly regretted."

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRE

The New York Tribune announces that President Taft and Secretary Knox propose to inaugurate a convention for the purpose of establishing a general arbitration treaty with Great Britain, which will cover all points at issue. It is further said that the return of British Ambassador James Bryce has been followed by the beginning of negotiations. The serious obstacle will be, it is thought, the passage of such a measure through the senate.

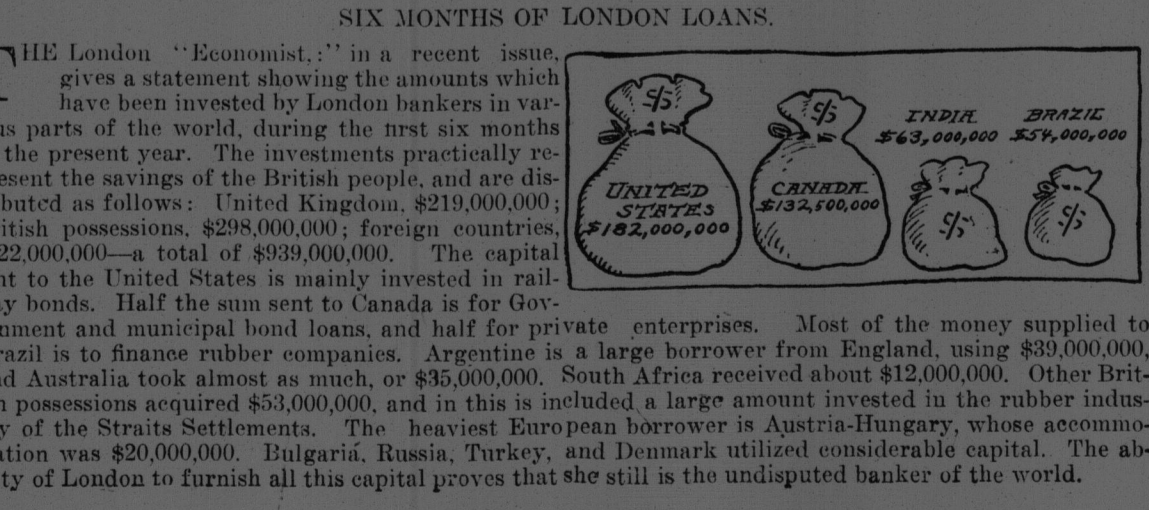

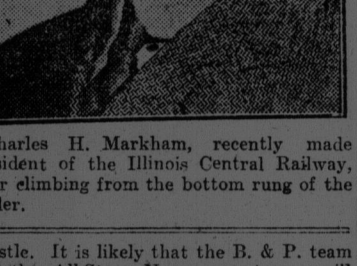

ST. JOHN TAKES JOYOUS BOUND IN NEW YEAR

Bank Clearings for First Week in January Show Increase 27 Per Cent Over 1910— Canada's Big Gain in Year

For the first week of January, 1911, St. John showed an increase of \$634,127 in bank clearings, or 27 per cent over the first week of 1910. In the percentage of increase this city was exceeded only by two others in the Dominion, Vancouver with an increase of 32.97 per cent, and Edmonton with an increase of 35.42 per cent. Halifax had an increase of 7.94 per cent. The bank clearings for the year 1910 set a record for the Dominion. Every city registers a gain. The total clearings for the year were \$6,135,701,587 as compared with \$5,294,955,339 in 1909. St. John stands eleventh in the list of cities. A comparison between Halifax and St. John shows that this city is rapidly going ahead while the sister city is gaining very slowly. In the last four years Halifax has made a gain of slightly more than \$2,000,000 while St. John shows a gain of more than \$10,000,000 in the same period. The figures for Halifax last year were \$63,853,316 and for St. John, \$7,843,546.

LOOKS BACK OVER YEAR IN ST. PETER'S

Father Duke, the Rector, Speaks of Spiritual and Temporal Advance—Would Like to See Saloons Wiped Out of City

In St. Peter's church, North End, yesterday morning at the 10:30 o'clock mass, the rector, Rev. A. J. Duke, C.S.S.R., read the annual statement in regard to the affairs of the parish, spiritual and temporal, and spoke very encouragingly of the prosperous condition of the church at the present time, and the success attained in the year just closed.

Both from a spiritual and temporal standpoint the rector, he said, had closed successfully. Many improvements had been made about the church, the chapel, the Sunday school library, the rooms of the Y. M. A., and Working Boys, and in this there was much to be pleased with, while from a religious point of view, the people of the parish in general had lived up to the requirements of their church, evidence of this being seen in the progress made in the various societies and organizations connected therewith. Another significant feature was the fact that there had been more than 30,000 communions.

Speaking of the temperance question, Rev. Father Duke, in a clear and forceful manner, said that liquor was causing a great deal of poverty and misery in the city, and he would like all to unite against it. "Would to God," said he, "that it were deemed unnecessary for me to say, I would like to see the places where it is sold wiped out of the city."
Father Duke then referred to the retreat which is to be started in the church on Sunday next, when Rev. P. Shehan, C.S.S.R., of Brooklyn, will preside. He urged all the parishioners to pray for the success of the retreat, and requested that they attend faithfully at the services, part of which will be for men and part for women.

ALL KINDS OF WEATHER IN DAY

Rain, Snow, Sunshine and Wind
Marked Today in St. John—
Likely to be Colder

Between early morning and evening yesterday there was a change of twenty degrees in temperature and a strong wind. This morning was accompanied by snow which later turned to rain and then this afternoon the sun shone for a while.

Yesterday was fine and clear in the early morning with the temperature seventeen above. In the evening the glass indicated a rise to thirty seven. Storm signals were displayed at noon yesterday, and this morning we had a moderate south east gale. At Point Lepreau the wind was blowing fifty miles an hour at 7 o'clock. About one inch of snow fell this morning, immediately followed by rain. At noon today the temperature was thirty-seven.

Signals are now displayed for a gale from the west and north. The center of the disturbance is in northern Maine. The indications are for a drop in temperature.

REV. MR. CAMERON GATCHES A THIEF

Clergyman Who Took Part In
