Brunswick, Germany, June 21Ernest August, Duke of BrunswickLucneburg and son-in-law of the exKaiser, who has been living in Gmund since the revolution waiting for better days, is reparted to intend to return to Brunswick and take up his abode in Blankenburg Castle.

This announcement gives evidence of the fact that the province of Brunswick is about to arrange for a final settlement of the problem of disposing of the property of the former reigning house. Like the Hohenzollerns in Prussla, the Brunswick grand-ducal family has been engaged in a law-suit with the state government.

The litigation is so much involved and is costing the state so much money, that a bill has been introduced in the provincial assembly by which the whole problem is to be settled by compromise. By the terms of the bill, the government renounces all claims to Blankenburg Castle, the forests formerly belonging to the grand ducal hunting estates, certain estates in Heimburg, Hessen and Lichtenberg, and a valuable stud in Harzburg.

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



## PICTURE ACTRESS SECURES DIVORCE

Tangle in Divorce Laws Involves Man and Two Women.

New York, June 21.—Major Thomas Conover of the United States Army, stationed at Fort Hamilton, was divorced by Mrs. Theresa Maxwell K. Conover, his first wife, who named his present wife, Mrs. Anna Vooris Con-

Conover, his first wife, who named his present wife, Mrs. Anna Vooris Conover, as co-respondent. Major Conover obtained a divorce in Pennsylvania in 1923 before marrying a second time, but Supreme Court Justice Wagner held the Pennsylvania decree invalid on the ground that papers had not been served legally on the defendant in New York State.

Mrs. Conover, who is a motion picture actress, said she had never submitted herself to the jurisdiction of the Pennsylvania courts, and that, although her husband claimed Wilkes-Barre, Paas his residence for two years prior to the date of the Pennsylvania decree, she was herself a resident of the State of New York. She also said she had not been served with papers in her husband's divorce suit.

"The entanglement of divorce laws," said Daniel W. Blumenthal, counsel for Major Conover, to the Court, "which from time to time have resulted in causing suffering to innocent children, has in this case caused much suffering to a good and innocent woman. There is no question that the present Mrs. Conover, who married Major Conover in Wilkes-Barre, and who is a member of an old and noted family, did so in good faith, believing that the decree of divorce granted to him in the State of Pennsylvania was binding in every way."

Mr. Blumenthal said later the suit illustrated the need for a uniform divorce law.

Justice Wagner directed that \$15 a week alimony be paid to the first Mrs. Conover.




