THIRTY-NINTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF
THE INDUSTRIAL REFUGE

CORNER McMURRICH AND BELMONT STREETS.

In the good providence of God, another year in the history of the Industrial Refuge has been brought to a close, and before entering on a record of it, we would express our gratitude to Him for His great goodness to the Institution in the past, in the bountiful support He has provided for it, and in the innumerable blessings He has bestowed on its inmates. One of the many blessings is, the spared lives of these inmates throughout the year, no one of them having been taken away by death.

Many in the Refuge testify to the good received since they entered it, and others who have left, but return from time to time to visit either the Matron or their former companions, acknowledge the help they, too, had extended to them, to lead a better life.

That they take an interest in the work done in the Institution, is shown by their earnings, which last year amounted to \$1,769.08 for laundry work, and \$19.60 for sewing and knitting, making a total of \$1,788.68. More than half the running expenses of the Refuge has been cleared by their own work.

On September 30th, 1891, there were in the Refuge 28. To these were added, during the year, 23, making a total of 51. Thirteen left before their time was up; three were removed by their friends, and nine went to service; leaving 26 in the Refuge, September 30th, 1892.

More than half of those received during the year are contented to remain the full time, and a considerable number have made it their home for years, and continue to be the most faithful workers.

As in former years the Managers have met with discouragements in their work, owing, often, to the restlessness of some of the inmates, who becoming impatient of the year's probation they are expected to put in, and thinking they are able to withstand all former temptations, leave before their time is completed, and, in most cases, when removed from the protecting care of the Refuge, yield to temptation and fall back into their old ways. However, most of these find their way back to the Refuge when tired of their miserable life.

These failures and re-admissions—generally confined to three or four of the inmates—are discouraging, but we must not despair, for God has said, "My Word shall not return unto me void, but shall accomplish that which I please, and it shall prosper in the thing whereunto I send it," and we are sure the guiding hand of Him who has said this, will lead many of those who have caused so much anxiety, to give up their evil ways and lead a respectable and Christian life.

The encouragements in the past have been many, but even had they been fewer, the reward would have been worth the labor and anxiety expended in connection with it. For

"'Tis worth a wise man's best of life,
'Tis worth a thousand years of strife,
If thou can'st lessen, but by one,
The countless ills beneath the sun."

Most of the individual management of those in the Refuge, must be done by Mrs. and Miss Spence, both of whom, though they enforce the rules strictly, show so much kindness in their dealings with those under their care, that the Institution is looked upon by them, not as a shelter merely, but as a home; indeed the phrase "coming home," is quite

a common way of speaking of returning to it, after a period of absence.

Early in the year these institutions lost by death, the faithful services of two of the Managers, viz.: Mrs. Clapp and Mrs. McCallum. Mrs. Clapp the wife of Dr. Clapp, who for several years had given his services as physician to the Aged Woman's Home, was a most earnest Christian worker, as well as collector, and the inmates were always glad to see her and listen to her advice. Mrs. McCallum had not been very long on the Board, but for many years had evinced a deep interest in the work, and, as a manager, nothing could exceed her kind thoughtful care for the best interests of the inmates.

At the beginning of the year Mrs. Chase joined the Board as Secretary, feeling an anxious desire to do her utmost to help the work, but she caught a severe cold and was only spared to her duties about three months. The Board regretted her death and deeply sympathized with her bereaved husband.

The New Year's entertainment given as usual by the Sabbath school teachers was thoroughly enjoyed, and we take this opportunity of thanking Westminster choir for the assistance they gave to make it a success, and also to all those who helped Miss McBride and Miss Wilkes, in any way, to add to the enjoyment of the evening.

Mr. James Brown, who was so long Superintendent of the Sabbath school, has been compelled, owing to the state of his health, to sever his connection with it. Mr. Brown still feels the deepest interest in the welfare of the inmates, and we may rest assured will not forget them at a throne of grace, nor, if health permits, cease to visit them with words of counsel and advice. Mr. Capelli kindly took charge during the summer, and a few weeks ago Mrs. Carmen assumed the duties with much acceptance to all. Mr. Alcorn still continues to take charge of the Sabbath morning service. The service each Sabbath evening is conducted by the following gentlemen, respectively: Mr. Hall, City Missionary; Mr. Anderson, Central church, assisted by

two young ladies; Wycliffe College students, and Mr. Chapman, of Westminster church. Should there be a fifth Sabbath in the month it is provided for by Mr. Hall.

Of the two physicians, Dr. Britton and Dr. Moore, who so kindly and gratuitously give their medical services to the inmates in the Refuge, we cannot speak too highly, and we thank them heartily.

We are again indebted to Dudley & Burns for printing our report at greatly reduced rates; we thank them.

NINTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE AGED WOMAN'S HOME.

The Managers have very great pleasure in presenting the Ninth Annual Report of the "Aged Woman's Home," more especially as they have obtained,—what they have long been anxious for,—a home in every way suitable for the care and protection of respectable aged women.

It is usual, when any charitable institution removes to new quarters, to take a glance back to its beginning, to trace its progress onwards, ascertain where and how it stands at present, and what its prospects are for the future. But, before doing this, we, the Managers, desire to record with heartfelt gratitude the gracious guiding hand of our Heavenly Father. Wonderfully has He led us; under circumstances of comparative freedom from anxiety or much heavy care, to begin and carry on this building to its completion.

We commenced this work of providing a comfortable home for *respectable aged women*, in 1887, in a few rooms not required for our Industrial Refuge work. By shutting off these rooms from the main building, adding a separate entrance, and placing those admitted under the care of a separate Matron, we had two distinct and entirely different departments of work; but managed by the same Board of ladies. The accommodations afforded by the few rooms

was so limited that we were soon obliged to build an addition, and again, a second time to add some rooms; even then, we could only accommodate twenty, some of them not very comfortably. The year before last we were obliged to decide, either to further extend the building, or to erect a new Home altogether. And after most serious and prayerful consideration, we determined to build on the adjoining lot. The estimate for such a Home as we desired was \$18,000. We had on hand \$5,000 to begin with, and decided, in the meantime, to borrow the rest, not wishing to burden the liberal citizens of Toronto, who at that time were being much pressed for contributions to several new buildings intended for charitable purposes. At the same time we felt assured that we would, in the future, receive from our friends and a generous public all that is necessary when they came to *hear*, not only what we had done for these feeble aged women in the past (even with very poor accommodation) but to see what we were prepared to do for them in the future. This building will accommodate fifty with the necessary attendants. When the furnishing, fencing, sodding, etc., is completed, the debt will probably be \$15,000.

The running expenses of the Home have been met, hitherto, by the payment of \$5 and \$6 a month according to room. (*This sum being paid either by the inmate herself, her friends, or the church of which she has been a member*) and the Government grant under "Schedule B," with some special donations given us when collecting yearly, for the Industrial Refuge, and we propose to follow the same plan in the future only the charge will be higher. We are admitting those from the old Home at the same rate they paid there, but we do not intend to make any new admissions under \$6. On the second floor are several larger rooms for which we will charge more. During the nine years the Home has existed we have been singularly fortunate in securing the class of women we were so anxious to succor; by far the larger number, being over 80 years of age. In these nine years 20 have died, their ages varying from 81 to 86

and ten from 68 to 76, in all 30. These had all been tenderly cared for and nursed, and the gratitude expressed by themselves and their friends has been very gratifying to us. Many of these were earnest Christian women, and we feel assured passed away to be for ever with the Lord who redeemed them. Of the 15 at present in the Home one is 93 years old, nine over 80 and 4 over 70. Their great age, their helplessness and often saddened lives, their loneliness (lonely in the sense of being separated from all near and dear to them), appeal to our very best and kindest sympathies. Many have brought up families but have none near them now to comfort or cheer; either their children are far away, or they are careless and indifferent, or perhaps have *gone before*. In any case they need and must have our help, and no one who has ever *felt* or *had* a mother's care could possibly refuse to succor such women, and we fearlessly appeal to those present or who may read this report, to assist the Managers in getting rid of the debt on the building, "Blessed is he that considereth the poor, the Lord will deliver him in the time of trouble."

Miss Featherstonhaugh still retains her position of Matron, with much acceptance to both Managers and inmates. If the admissions increase as we expect, we may be obliged to add a sub-Matron, but at present we have entered this Home with the same number of attendants as before.

In carrying on this work we have been assisted very materially by ladies outside the Management. Mrs. James Bain and Miss Crooks kindly invited the old women to their own homes in the summer and entertained them most hospitably. Mrs. Saunders and Miss Mary Crooks attend regularly to the religious instruction on the Sabbath. The choir of Westminster church gave two musical services, pleasing and cheering the old people very much. The C.E. Society of St. James' Square church, also most kindly gave musical entertainments. The "Pansy Mission" paid them a weekly visit, not only with flowers, but often besides, with some little delicacy such as jelly.
