WAR NEWS

Mar. 31. Germany is expected to make a big stroke either in the East or West shortly. The German Emperor is now at Berlin holding a war council with the German military commander of Constantinople and other leaders.

The British Cabinet is considering the liquor question and the stamping out of the evil, which is now one of the great problems of the nation.

When the ex-Premier of Greece returned to Athens after a short rest, a tumultuous reception was accorded him. He still declares that Greece must join in the conflict on the side of the Allies.

By the sinking of the steamer Falaba by a German submarine 111 lives were lost.

Sealing News

Up to press hour there was no encouraging news from the sealing fleet. The steamers were still jammed; the seals were slipping; and the Bonaventure is the only one reported with anything like a catch. The Terra Nova was at Cape North. She had 500 white coats.

Several icebergs, aground near Cape Race, are reported to be breaking up, and the 'growlers' will no doubt prove dangerous to shipping.

Mr. Henry Saunders, of the Anglo-American Telegraph Co., St. John's, was on Tuesday appointed superintendent of that company in place of the late Robert C. Smith.

We learn that Mr. C. B. Dunham, the esteemed superintendent of the Western Union Telegraph Co. here, has been appointed by the company. Mr. D. S. McNeil, now Dunham's assistant, now becomes superintendent. Congratulations.

WAR NEWS

March 30, 1915.—Secretary Harcourt wires that French Army captured Hartmannswillerkopf in Alsace. The Germans abandoned important material and left many dead and 400 prisoners; also that obstinate fighting favorable to Russians continues in Northern Poland, while in Carpathia in direction of Battfeld a new line of heights was captured on 23-mile front.

Petrograd officially reports that three Russian army corps have poured through Dukla Pass, Carpathian Mountains, in Hungary and captured five Hungarian towns in district of Saros; also that Russian troops have gained two new victories, one on Shawa River and another near Pilicia River in Poland.

Petrograd officially reports that Russian fleet has bombarded ports at eastern entrance to Bosphorus; apparently acting in concert with Anglo-French fleet forcing through Dardanelles.

British Admiralty officially reports British steamer Falaba, 4,800 tons, of Elder-Dempster Line, which left Liverpool Saturday for west coast of Africa with 120 crew and 140 passengers, was torpedoed by German submarine off Milford Haven, South Wales, and sank with loss of 120 lives. Ship refused to stop at submarine's order when overhauled. Those aboard were given five minutes to leave. Abandonment was not completed when torpedo was fired and ship sank speedily. Trawlers rescued survivors, some from boats and others from the ocean.

London reports British steamer Aquila, of 1204 tons, sunk by submarine off Bishop Rock, but crew 23 saved; also that Dutch steamer Amstel was blown up by mine.

London message says Lloyd George replying to deputation from Shipbuilding Employers Federation yesterday, who unanimously urged that total prohibition during war of sale of intoxicating liquors owing to drink causing delay in producing war munitions, said Britain was fighting Germany, Austria and Drink, and so far as he could see the worst of these enemies was drink. Lord Kitchener, General French and others favored prohibition, and the Cabinet would meet last night to consider matters.

He also said he had audience with the King that forenoon, who permitted him to say he was deeply concerned on this question, which concern was shared by all his subjects.

The 1914 Sealing Disaster

The terrible sealing tragedy of 1914 occurred a year ago on Wednesday. It took place during one of the worst storms ever experienced in this country. The Southern Cross went down with all hands somewhere in the vicinity of Cape Pine. A boat containing life-belts was washed ashore in December last on the Island of Coll, on the west coast of Scotland, and this is the only part of the wreckage discovered.

Or the same night and the following day 77 sealers belonging to the Newfoundland met their death on the ice-floes, while 11 others were ascribed for life, among the 11 being Thomas Dawson, of the Cross Roads, who was one of our smartest and most energetic young men. John Meador, of Marcell's Cove, and James Bradbury, of Shearstown, were among the number that perished. Sixteen years before that, on March 21st, 1898, 48 men of the Greenland's crew lost their lives on the ice-floes.

The year 1914 was filled with tragedies. The Empress of Ireland was rammed in the River St. Lawrence by the collier Stornstad in May and 453 persons were drowned, a large number being members of the Salvation Army who were on their way to England.

Then came the big war which is still raging, and in which thousands and thousands of men have sacrificed their lives or have been maimed for life.

Newfoundland has been called upon to mourn because of the loss of her sons on the Viking and the two other ships. Bay Roberts and Shearstown again shared in this toll of the sea, and three of our young men laid down their lives.

Our brothers are again in danger's pathway on the frozen seas, in search of the seal and on His Majesty's ships. The present outlook for a successful season is not very bright.

Our fathers' wrongs have, whose arm doth bind the restless wave. Who biddeth the mighty ocean deep its own appointed limits keep. O hear us when we cry to thee For those in peril on the sea.

Three Battleships Sunk

Story of Bombardment

London, Mar. 19.—The Admiralty tonight gave out the following statement regarding the operations in the Dardanelles—Minesweeping has been in progress during the last ten days inside the Straits. A general attack was delivered by the British and French fleets yesterday (Thursday) morning, upon the fortresses at the Narrows. At 1.45 a.m. the Queen Elizabeth, Indefatigable, Agamemnon and Lord Nelson bombarded Forts J. L. T. U. and V., while the Triumph and Prince George fired at batteries F. E. and H. Heavy fire was opened on ships from batteries and field guns. At 12.22 o'clock the French Squadron, consisting of the Suffren, Gaulois, Charlemagne and Bouvet advanced up the Dardanelles and engaged the forts at closer range. Forts J. U. F. and E. replied strongly. Their fire was silenced by ten battleships inside the Straits, all the ships being hit several times during this part of the action. By 1.25 p.m. all the forts had ceased firing.

The Vengeance, Irresistible, Albion, Ocean, Swiftsure and Majestic advanced to relieve the six old battleships inside the Straits. As the French Squadron, which had engaged the forts in most brilliant fashion, was passing out, the Bouvet was blown up by a drifting mine. She sank in 38 fathoms, north of Arankou village in less than three minutes. At 2.35 p.m. eight battleships resumed attack on the forts which again opened fire. Attack on the forts was maintained, while operations of mine sweepers continued. At 4.00 p.m. the Irresistible quitted the line, listing heavily, and 5.50 o'clock sank, having probably struck drifting mine. At 6.05 o'clock the Ocean also having struck a mine sank. Both vessels sank in deep water, practically the whole of their crews having been removed safely under gunfire. The Gaulois had her forward control position hit by heavy shell, which requires repairs. Bombardment of forts and mine sweeping operations continued until 8.30 p.m. Damage to forts effected by the prolonged direct fire of very powerful forces employed, cannot yet be estimated and further operations will follow. Loss of ships was caused by mine drifting with current, which were encountered in areas hitherto swept clear of this danger will require special treatment.

ing age, and protracted weakness, feebleness and infirmity from insult and neglect. It is true that some mothers have lost much of the respect that they might have retained, by neglecting to fulfill the duties that were laid upon them, or by unwise indulgence, or unfaithfulness in training the children committed to their care. But there are many children, who, with their superior advantages and opportunities, despise the uncourtesy and unseemly ways of their parents, forgetting the disadvantages that they have had in early life, and the trials they have endured to make that lot of their children brighter than their own; and so they despise in those parents that which was due to no fault of theirs, and in so doing they wrong their parents and harm their own souls.

The blessing of a long and happy life is not yours until you are old, but the man who fears God, and who thinks rightly, will cherish and revere those to whom he owes his existence, his training, and most of the privileges which he enjoys.

Time brings strange changes. A few brief years, and those who look with contempt upon old age may come to face its realities, and know for themselves just what it is to be old, and feeble, and neglected, and forgotten; and to understand the bitter anguish which is caused by the unkind words and deeds of thankless offspring. Our children are quick to learn, and if they see old age neglected and despised by us, they may soon learn to imitate our example, and bring back to their parents sorrows such as they have inflicted upon others; while if they see their parents exhibit filial love and reverence, they will learn the lessons and will practice them in their own lives.

Despise not thy mother when she is old. Health and strength, freshness and beauty, wit and wisdom, all may show signs of decay and failure; yet there is the past to remember; and the present has mere in it than you may imagine. The mother who still remains with you, the choicest gift of all your life, and on whom life itself depends, should have the best and most reverent gratitude. Let your most ardent support her in her weakness; let your kind acts provide for her necessities; let your tender patience smooth her pathway through the shadowy valley, and make bright the weary hours of closing life. Such loving care will go far towards reviving the waning fragrance of a withered life; it will bring forth that which the mother's character, before the sweetness of nature was crushed by toil and cankered by care. In the genial atmosphere of a loving home, many a poor old mother would revive and freshen, and be more like her younger and her better self. And the prayers and benedictions of such a mother will prove a heritage of blessing to children and children's children till this life shall end, and will cast their fragrance onward to the better world and to the life that endeth not.

Rev. G. P. Sparks At Cutler, Maine

On Friday afternoon Rev. Frederick Palladino, superintendent of the Buckport district of the East Maine Conference, came to town in the afternoon. At 6.30 p.m. a supper was served to a large gathering in the vestry of the M. E. Church, under the auspices of the Ladies' Aid Society. After the supper, Rev. Palladino addressed the congregation in his usual masterly way taking for his subject, Loyalty to Change. Following the superintendent's address the congregation was called to order for the fourth quarterly conference. Reports were read from the different departments of the church work, and the reports gave evidence of progress, especially the report from the Ladies' Aid Society, which, under the capable presidency of Mrs. G. G. Aldrich, has been most successful. After the election of the officials and committees for the coming year was taken up, and Rev. G. P. Sparks, who for the past year has filled his place in the Cutler charge with great efficiency, received an unanimous vote to be the pastor for another year.

On Sunday, both morning and evening, Rev. G. P. Sparks preached to large congregations in the M. E. church. He took for his subject in both services, Emancipation by Civic and Moral Forces. Both sermons were highly commented upon, but this is nothing unusual relative to Mr. Sparks and his ability in the pulpit.—Bangor Daily News, Mar. 2, 1915.

POSTAL TELEGRAPH OFFICES are operated throughout the Colony at all the principal places. Messages of ten words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word. A Government cable to Canso, Cape Breton, connects with the Commercial Cable Co.'s system to all parts of the world. There is no more efficient telegraphic service in existence. A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 85 cents to \$1.00. A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.50. To Great Britain, France or Germany—25 cents per word.

Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round to Steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass within the radii of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Bay. Telegraph messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Clerks on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the messages may be left with the P. M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.

Public Notice

Censorship of Telegraphs, Cables, and Wireless Stations.

By direction of the Chief Censor, London, the following Regulations will be in force on and after Friday next, January 15th, namely:

1. Cablesgrams in authorized editions of A.B.C., Lieber's, Scott's and Western Union Codes only may be exchanged between British, Allied or Neutral Territory on extra European Telegraph System, on one side, and British or Allied Territory, wherever situated, on the other side.

2. The term "Extra European Telegraph System" means the places outside the Telegraph System of Europe. Besides the places in Europe proper, the following are also counted as being on the European Telegraph System, namely:—Russia and Asia; the following French possessions in North and West Africa, namely:—Algeria, Mauritania, Senegal, Upper Senegal and Niger; and French Morocco. The Island of Cyprus is regarded as outside the European Telegraph System.

3. Until further notice cablegrams in the following three Codes, namely:—Meyer's Atlantic Cotton Code, Thirty ninth Edition; Bouley's Complete Phrase Code, not including separate Mining and Oil Supplements; Broomhall's Imperial Combination Code, not including Special Rubber Edition, are allowed only between United Kingdom and places in Extra European Telegraph System.

N.B.—As all messages sent under the above Regulations have to be decoded and censored the carrying out of this work will be greatly facilitated if persons sending such messages would hand in at the Telegraph Office, at the time of presenting the message, the translation of the same.

In a Belgian Loft

Affecting Incident of the War

(From 'Westminster Gazette'.)

There is a graphic little sketch in the United Free Church 'Record' of a Sunday morning in a Belgian loft. There had been a sharp engagement, and the British troops holding a village had been hurriedly forced by great masses of the enemy to retire. In the confusion three Scottish privates and a corporal had been cut off in the streets had hacked into the first open door they came to. The occupants had fled, and they made their way up a long staircase, intending to find the roof and watch events from there. But it ended in an empty loft, where there was only a skylight beyond their reach. "Better lie low for a while," suggested the corporal as they stood listening to the terrible sounds outside. The Germans were evidently burning, looting and killing. Now and again they heard screams and the discharge of rifles; sometimes an explosion would shake the building; while the smell of burning wood penetrated to their retreat. This went on for hours. The soldiers knew they would be discovered sooner or later, and expected no mercy.

Suddenly the corporal said: "Lads, it's time for church parade, let's have a wee bit service here; it may be our last." The soldiers looked a little astonished, but they piled their rifles in a corner and came and stood at attention. The corporal took out a small Testament from his breast pocket and turned over the pages. "Canna we sing something first? Try ye're hand at the 23rd Psalm. Quiet noo—very quiet."

"Yes, though I walk in death's dark vale
Yet thou art with me; and thy rod
And staff me comfort still!"

There wasn't much melody about the tune, but the words came from the heart.

"LET US PRAY!"

Then the corporal began: "Fear not them which kill the body but are not able to kill the soul; but rather fear him which is able to destroy both soul and body in hell. Are not two sparrows sold for a farthing? And one of them shall not fall on the ground without your Father. But the very hairs of your head are all numbered. Fear not, therefore, ye are of more value than many sparrows."

As he read there were loud thuds below; doors banged, and glass was smashed. But he went on:

"He that sinneth his life shall lose it; and he that loseth his life for my sake shall find it."

He ended, and his grave face took on a wry smile. "I'm no' a gude hand at this job," he said, "but we maun finish it off. Let us pray."

The corporal stood, with the book in his hand, and the others knelt and bowed their heads. A little haltingly, but very simply, he committed their way to God and asked for strength to meet their coming fate like men.

Make the Liver Do its Duty

While he prayed a heavy hand thrust open the door and they heard an exultant exclamation and then a gasp of surprise. Not a man moved, and the corporal went calmly on. Household Hints

Wash cloth with a flannel and warm water; when dry wipe afterward with a little warm milk.

Hang woollens out on the line dripping wet, without wringing them at all. If dried in this way, they will not shrink.

To find out if eggs are done, stick a clean skewer into the centre. If it comes out perfectly clean, the eggs are done.

When boiling an old fowl or tough meat add a pinch of soda to the water. Simmer gently, and the meat will be perfectly tender.

Sweeping linoleum with an ordinary broom is but scratching the dust. Slightly moisten a square of house flannel, tie it over the broom, and then sweep.

To prevent the hands getting cold and chapped when hanging up the clothes, wipe them thoroughly, then rub a little powdered starch into the skin.

If a piece of fat about the size of a nutmeg is added to the water in which any kind of greens are being boiled there will be no boiling over, and no stirring will be required.

A stale loaf put into closely covered tin, exposed for half an hour to a heat not exceeding that of boiling water, then taken out of the tin and allowed to cool, will be restored in appearance and properties to the state of new bread.

When curtains have been in use for some time they are apt to become rusty. To remedy this let them stand for a few minutes in a cup of water, to which a little ammonia has been added. Then remove and well rub, and they will look like new again.

Before using a new umbrella inject a small quantity of vaseline into the hinge portions of the frame. Vaseline will not spread like oil and will prevent the covering, and is a sure preventive against rust. Wet umbrellas should be stood on their handles to dry; this allows the water to run out of them, instead of into the part where the silk and ribs meet, thus causing the metal to rust and the silk to rot.

Baker's Buns.—After your bread sponge is made up stiff and you work down your bread the second time, take a piece of the dough about the size of a leopold. To this add (after the piece of dough has been poked into small bits) half the size of a walnut, one cup of medium warm water, and one-half cup of sugar. Mix this thoroughly with flour about as stiff as you make your light bread. Put in a greased pan and let raise about three hours. Make into buns and let raise three more hours. Then bake in a quick oven. Makes about 18 buns.

Pocket Ammeters



WHEREAS We deem it expedient and necessary to appoint a Term or Session for the holding of Our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Northern District of Our Island of Newfoundland, at the time and place hereinafter mentioned:

We do, therefore, by this Our Proclamation, declare to all Our loving subjects within Our said Island that it is Our will and pleasure to direct and appoint that a Term or Session of Our said Supreme Court on Circuit shall be open and holden at: HARBOUR GRACE, in Our said Island, on Tuesday, the Twentieth day of April next, and continue thence until Friday, the Twenty-third day of April next, both days inclusive; and, if necessary, the presiding Judge of Our said Court shall have power to extend the time thereof for two days, or for such further period as may be necessary for the conclusion of any matter or cause then in course of trial.

And of these Presents all Magistrates, the Sheriff, Officers of the Constabulary Force, Bailiffs, Constables, Keepers of Gaols and other Officers in the execution of their offices about the premises, and all singular other persons whom these Presents do, shall, or may concern, are hereby required to take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.

D., 1915, and in the Fifth year of Our Reign.
