### TIDES OF THE LAND.

### Earth's Crust in England Moves Five Inches and in South Africa Eight

Darwin Traces History of Earth and Moon From Time Latter Was Thrown Off From Former.

That the attraction of the moon which causes such obvious periodic movements of the waters of the sea must produce a similar effect on land, the crust of the earth, has been recognized by physicists and astronomers for many years. On Monday night, for instance, Sir George Darwin, in addressing the Authors' Club at the weekly house dinner on the subject of the influence of tides on man, referred to the experiments he and his brother Horace had made twenty-five years before in an effort to measure the diurnal rise and fall of a given point on the land's surface under the influence of the moon. ### RARE SEA FOOD IS TAKEN FROM THE WATER ALL READY FOR THE TABLE

Lobsters Broll Thomselves a Beautiful Pink in Ocean Geysers; Planked Shad are Found in Virginia River; Soused Mackerel Astonish

BROWLED LOBSTERS CAUGHT IN THE SEA.

CRAWFISH, Me, Mar. 2—Almost incredible is the theory brought to this town by John J. Klaw, who says he has located a spot on the coast of Labrador where broiled lobsters any be caught by the thousands. As proof he brought with him a cargo of several thousand lobsters, every one of them broiled to a turn.

Mr. Klaw says he was attracted to the spot by what seemed to him to be volcanic action in the sea. Jets of hot water spouted in the air and clouds of steam were constantly arising.

"But what was more unusual," said the fisherman, "was the great number of lobsters in that vicinity. Near the geysers they were disporting themselves in high glee, all of them a beautiful pink. Other lobsters were coming in all directions. These would dash into the hot water as though they enjoyed it.

"It was plain that the lobsters, bent on saving a great deal of labor and trouble for a consuming public, were boiling themselves. After being thoroughly cooked they would swim to some sheltered cove as if awaiting capture.

"The young lobsters required but one bath to be thoroughly cooked, but the older ones took several treatments. I brought a large number of them back and shall transplant most of them in native waters, hoping to raise a crop of broiled lobsters here in Masine."

PLANKED SHAD ARE ARTISTS

SHADRACH, Va., Mar. 2—Great schools of planked shad have been observed coming up the James river. This strange sight is seen but two or three times in a century. Local residents recall a similar instance just at the close of the Civil War, when for many weeks thousands had planked shad fresh from the river for breakfast, dinner and support.

from the river for breakfast, dinner and supper.

Planked shad are very difficult to catch and the cost of shipping them is very high. For these reasons they are never seen in the city markets.

As it swims in the river, a planked shad is a most beautiful object, the silver fins forming a delicate contrast to the darker shade of the oak plank which grows on the opposite side.

Then the garnishing of green and the bulwark of mashed potatoes extending from the dorsal fin to the pink gill, gives a bit of color effect over which artists rave.

When the season starts it is thought that the largest planked shad may be bought for 40 cents, and the purchaser keeps the plank. In some large families enough kindling wood to last a year is thus obtained:


