STREET RAILWAY STRIKE SETTLED BY J. B. M. BAXTER

AGREEMENT REACHED ONLY AFTER A LONG DAY OF DETERMINED EFFORT; NEWS GREETED WITH GREAT CHEERS

Mr. Baxter Projected Himself Into Situation in Early Morning and at Eleven O'clock Last Night Brought the Contending Parties Together in Satisfactory Settlement-Thousands on Streets Broke Into Ringing Cheers When Word Spread—Troops Withdrawn at Once — Several Cars Forced to Run Gauntlet but No One Seriously Hurt.

The news that the street railway strike had been settled at a late hour last evening quickly spread about the city, and was everywhere received with expressions of satisfaction and relief. Earlier in the evening a report spread that negotiations for a settlement were in progress with good prospects of success but the news that the difficulty had been definitely settled was none the less welcome on that account. Many groups of men were still on the streets, and as the news spread it was greeted with cheers and other manifestations of pleasure.


It was largely through the efforts of J. B. M. Baxter, K. C., who in his capacity as city recorder and a citizen anxious to prevent further scenes of disorder, projected himself into the situation yesterday, that a settlement was reached, and the city relieved from prospect of a long and bitter industrial battle, not only likely to involve a heavy expense to keep the militia on duty, but fraught with grave danger of frequent disturbances of the public peace, riots and bloodshed.

Early in the morning Mr. Baxter had a conference with the union executive, and all day and till after eleven o'clock in the evening he was continually running back and forth between the directors of the company and the men's representatives, trying to effect a basis of settlement that would be accepted by both parties.

The company refused under any conditions to take back Mr. Ramsay, the president of the union into its employ, and this threatened the success of the negotiations, as the executive of the union and the men themselves were equally determined not to give way on the question of having him taken back in some capacity.

The deadlock on this point was finally broken by the resignation of Mr. Ramsay from the union.

Other points in the agreement were the subject of frequent overtures between the company and the men through the medium of Mr. Baxter, but in the end an agreement was arrived at which was accepted by the directors of the company and the executive of the union.

Mr. Baxter Gains Point and Will be Heard in Own Defence in Matter of \$500 Retainer, the Facts of Which were so Greatly Distorted by Liberal Press.

There was no lack of interest in yesterday afternoon's session of the hearing by the Royal Commission investigating the Dugal charges inconnection with the Valley Railway. Although the evidence itself was not especially interesting in its character there was a few minutes of active interchange between Mr. J. B. M. Baxter and Mr. F. B. Carvell, which caused the spectators to sit up and listen.

Some days ago Mr. Baxter applied to Commissioner Fisher for an opportunity to appear befoge the Commission and make a statement under oath regarding the payment to him of \$500 by the St. John and Quebec Railway Company as a retainer for professional services and which sum he returned as soon as he learned that the company intended to apply to the Legislature, of which Mr. Baxter is a member for increased assistance for the building of the road.

Commissioner Fisher communicated the request to the other members of the board and it was decided that Mr. Baxter, if he wished to be heard should appear before the commission and make formal application to that effect. Vesterday afternoon, shortly after one o'clock the decision of the commission was communicated to Mr. Baxter by Secretary elorge McDade. Mr. Baxter agreed to come to court as early as possible during the afternoon and state his case and it was for this reason that he appeared.

Mr. Carvell, whose temper has been gradually breaking under the strain of his fishing excursion into the accounts of the Valley Railway Company, was in decidedly vicious mood, and after he had objected to Mr. Baxter's appearance and that gentleman had made apirited reply, the chief counsel for the Dugal side of the case so far forgot himself as to refer to Mr. Baxter as a coward and a cur. The Real Value of a Silver Black Fox as Judged by its Pelt

a yearly value of \$110,000,000. The furs manufactured increase this to \$250,000,000. Of the 1,827,000 fox skins included in the above quotations, during the year 1909 (before breeding for pelts was discontinued by Island foxmen) but 4,300 were skins of the silver fox, and the best of these came from Prince Edward Island.

Meagre as the fur supply is now, there is an positive hope of any sudden or satisfactory change. The old medium of production trapping is rapidly becoming one of the lost arts, civilization is invading the wilds, and the only hope left for even partially meeting a fur buyer's demand lies in the Island discovered art of domestic pelt production.

Lampson, Nesbitt and Bras have have shown by figures and cash returns that the pelt of the Island silver fox is the most valuable in the world; the Island owns eighty-five per cent of all these precious pelt producers in capityity—these facts furnish proof that Prince Edward Island, is and always will be the fountain-head of black fox production.

On April 7, 1910, the Hon. Charles Dalton sold to Lampson, the fur buyer of London, England, a consignment of twenty-five silver fox pelts for which he received £6,835 or \$33,263.66. Three of these pelts brought prices over £500 each. One sold for £540 or \$2.628, the average for the twenty-five being £285.

Since early in 1911, practically no pelts have been sold from Island ranches, the exception being those of foxes that died from old age, disease or acledent, the demand for breeding stock having greatly exceeded the supply.

The pelt is at its best in November and December, the last week in December being the favorite killing-date for Island breeders. Some claim that a young fox has as full and large a skin as an older one, but this is disputed. A young fox has less silver than an older one and is held to be more valuable on this account by some ranchmen.
